Rural roads in the worst state they have been in for years

Neil Boniface has been delivering timber from ITM around the back roads of Waipu and says the state of local roads is the worst he has ever seen them.

He said coming out of onto Hayward Rd recently his truck bounced across the roads on the corrugations.

When he phoned the Council to complain about the state of this road he was told a grader had been up it the previous week. He is pretty sure this didn't happen There are so many corrugations the roads are unsafe to drive on and the wheels just about shake off his truck every time he drives up one. He wonders about the safety of children travelling on the local school bus routes.

He doesn't think the roads are being graded as regularly as they have been in the past and even when the grader does turn up they "don't get much more than a scratch." The Bream Bay News asked Rural Delivery contractor Steve Jones if he agreed with Mr. Boniface.

He said the biggest problem is all the corrugations and that he hasn't seen a grader for some time.

Steve Slack who lives on Brooks Rd. said the state of this road is terrible. Brooks Rd. residents' cars are getting wrecked travelling up and down it and he has had to pull several vehicles back onto the road after they drove off the edge while trying to avoid big potholes. Parts of the road, particularly on the hills are just clay with all the metal washing off whenever it rains.

He believes the first three kilometres of Brooks Rd.

EDITORIAL

Waipu owed a lot to this little old man in his tattered cardigan

Sometimes you go to a funeral and come away thinking, "What a wonderful person! I wish I had known him or her a bit better than I did."

This was the case with the service held in the Waipu Presbyterian Church last week for Trevor Lloyd McKenzie, who gave 67 years of commitment to the Waipu Fire Brigade and served for 21 years on the Whangarei County Council, not to mention scores of other local committees he put time and effort into.

I did have the pleasure of conducting an interview with Trevor at his home in South Rd. in 2014 when his wife Lois was still alive and he had just been awared a Civic Honour by the Whangarei District Council. After that I would meet him from time to time at the Waipu shops and exchange a few words. I would wonder how many of the people passing us by as we talked

understood the debt the town of Waipu owed to this little old man in his tattered cardigan.

Last August I attended the ceremony at the Waipu Fire Brigade where 96-year-old Trevor was presented with his long service gold medal by Colin Kitchen, a Past President of the United Fire Brigades Association of New Zealand. Despite his obvious frailness Trevor retained his keen intelligence and had a lovely, humble appreciation of the honour being afforded him both by the Fire Brigade and his family who spoke at the ceremony.

What strikes me about

Trevor McKenzie is that, despite his many achievements, he was a very unassuming person. He accepted his Civic Honour and his Fire Brigade medal with a quiet dignity. He wasn't full of the bluster so many people who stand for political office are. He had a strongly developed sense of civic duty and he just got on with the job.

I enjoyed the excerpt read from Trevor's diary describing a beautiful sunny day and the strawberries in his garden starting to ripen. It is good to think that in between all those fire brigade call outs and committee meetings he had time for these simple pleasures.

Our local government elections will be held again around October this year. I am wondering if there are people in our community who are interested in standing for election. I believe democracy is better served if we do have an election, rather than if the incumbents are just re-elected unopposed.

I also hope local people will take an interest. In the 2016 elections the national voter turnout was just 43%. If any of the following concern you: the state of our roads, the need for more footpaths, more oversight of development, the water quality in our rivers, the water quality coming out of your taps, protection of our shoreline, rubbish collection, the cost of taking rubbish to the transfer station, stormwater drainage, the litter around our roads, the maintenance of our parks, waste water treatment, the need for more sports fields, then you need to listen carefully to what the various candidates for the Whangarei District and Northland Regional Council say and cast your vote accordingly. I meet a lot of people who say, with a certain amount of pride, that they are just not interested in politics. I think they need to be.

I came across this quote from the 35th President of the United States, John F Kennedy recently.

"The ignorance of one voter in a democracy impairs the security of us all."

One voter alone perhaps could make much of a difference but the problem is that all these single vot-

> ers add up. there are just too many people who don't understand or care enough and this puts us all in jeopardy.

Taking an active role in resident and ratepayer groups is a good start for the uninitiated. To this end I think I will offer both the Ruakaka and Waipu associations free space to advertise their monthly meetings.

Camp Waipu Cove's annual site holders get five more years

The Department of Conservation has told the Waipu Cove Reserve Board that its practice of leasing sites on an annual basis must cease with current annual site holders allowed a five-year leeway.

The Reserves Act of 1977 states that except with the consent of the Minister, the owner of any vehicle, caravan, tent, or removable structure shall not permit it to remain on a reserve for a total period of more than four weeks during the period commencing on 1 November in any year and ending with 31 March.

In a letter to the board, Louisa Gritt, the Department of Conservation's Whangarei Operations Manager, said that this section of the act is intended to "control permanent occupation of reserve by individual campers during the main holiday season to the exclusion of others on an unequal basis"

Since 1998 the Waipu Cove Reserve Board has been granted a dispensation to allow sites to be offered at a fee for the exclusive use of established site holders. This gave the camp a guaranteed income and allowed it to negotiate loans for capital works and the upgrade of facilities.

The Department of Conservation letter states, "It is the Department's understanding that the ASH (Annual Site Holder) financing of capital developments and the upgrading of facilities is no longer required as loans have now been repaid and financial needs have ceased." Ms Gritt said the Department had continued to grant dispensations each year as no new annual sites were being issued and annual site holders had been declining in numbers. In 2012 there were 112 site holders, whereas last year there were 77 remaining. However last year only one annual site was relinquished and the Department had concerns that at this rate it would take a very long time until the annual site holder practice would cease.

Reserve Board Chairman John Henderson subsequently wrote to the 77 remaining Annual Site Holders informing them that from the end of the camping season 2014/2025 the Camp Waipu Cove will no longer accept the reservation of annual sites.

He said the Department of Conservation letter was "unwelcome although not unexpected."

He said the board expects some site holders might want

Waihoihoi Park, an unofficial freedom camping site



Freedom campers in the carpark of Waipu's Waihoihoi Park at around 9am on Saturday morning 6 April. A third van pulled out of the park as the Bream Bay News photographer arrived.

Despite Waihoihoi Park not featuring on the Whangarei District Council's list of freedom camping sites, camper vans regularly pull up there for the night. People who live alongside say that most nights there are at least four vans in the reserve's carpark.

Tony Solomon, who voluntarily helps to empty Waipu's public rubbish bins said the campers deposit their household rubbish in the bins making extra work for him. He recently found the bins stuffed with old clothing.

Nina Quann said she doesn't object to the freedom campers per se but thinks, if the Whangarei District Council is going to allow freedom camping it needs to manage it better than it does, providing more rubbish bins, more regular clean ups and regular inspections.

She said although Waihoihoi Park does not show up in the list of Whangarei District Council permitted freedom camping sites it is listed on several freedom camping websites as a place were campervans are permitted to stay and freedom campers she has spoken to understand it to be a place where camping is permitted.

The Bream Bay News was able to find two sites *RV explorer* and *Freedom camping rankers NZ*, which listed Waihoihoi Park as a place where people can freedom camp.

Riki Taiaroa said the Whangarei District Council should understand that someone arriving in New Zealand from Germany isn't going to know about the Whangarei District Council or its website and is more likely to take advice from a dedicated freedom camping site. He suggests if they are going to allow freedom camping to continue, the Department of Conservation and territorial authorities throughout New Zealand should band together to create a comprehensive freedom camping on-line guide.

And there he was bare-chested with the zip open on a black and white cow outfit with a tail and a hood with horns. It was 10am on Sunday morning 31 March and he had a beer can in one hand and a cigarette in the other. His fellow party goers were sipping on cans of Vi but perhaps this young man was feeling a bit

The onsie man confirmed that yes the ute was his and he directed me to where it was positioned in the river. He gave his name as Alex Stoneman and he said he was from West Auckland.

How did he come to drive into the river?

"Poor life choices", was his reply.

Mr. Stoneman wanted to make it clear that he hadn't been "hooning"

and the circular wheel marks all over the paddock were made by someone else.

He had been transporting a generator across the culvert and along the track beside the river when the bank had given way underneath his vehicle.

One of his fellow partygoers had then tried to assist by towing the ute from partway down the bank but this didn't go well and the vehicle rolled the rest of the way down the steep bank into the river.

He was worried about how much this adventure was likely to cost him. He had already been told that the hydro vac, which had been used to suck fuel from the pool where the ute was imbedded, had incurred a charge of \$2,700.

The first tow truck to arrive on the scene hadn't been able to drag the vehicle up the steep bank, so a second truck had to be called out. The costs were piling up. The party to celebrate the birthday of two young people from West Auckland had been advertised as a "Cave Rave" on facebook.

According to one young man still at the site on Sunday morning, around 80 people had attended the party. Mr. Stoneman said the Cave Rave was an annual event. Colin Dall, the Northland Regional Council's Manager of Regulatory Services, said last week," As with any incident involving the illegal discharge of contaminants to water, the council will be considering

Resource Management Act is warranted. However, the council's first priority was to ensure the clean-up of the fuel and oil was done promptly and properly, and has not made any decision on further action at this stage.

He said, "The council will be seeking recovery of the costs of the clean-up from the owner of the ute, but has not yet received the invoices for the use of vacuum tanker and towing truck."

The Northland Regional Council investigating officer did not observe an outflow from the pond when he arrived at the accident site and the fuel and oil discharged from the ute appeared to be fully contained in the pool. However, because rain was forecasted and the pond could overflow, the officer arranged a vacuum tanker to remove the fuel and oil and a tow truck to remove the ute from the pond. Booms were also deployed to help contain/concentrate the fuel and oil. The clean-up operation successfully removed most of the fuel and oil discharged from the ute, although a small amount oil had soaked into the bank of the

Neighbours describe the music on Friday and Saturday nights as thunderous and say alcohol and drugs appeared to be in plentiful supply. They were concerned about drunk or stoned young people leaving the party to drive down the tortuous Caves Rd. Although the facebook post had exhorted party goers to respect the environment, locals picked up broken glass, bottles, cans and discarded clothing left behind by the revelers although some of this may have been left by the many freedom campers who overnight at the Waipu Caves throughout the summer.

The Waipu Caves is a Whangarei District Council designated freedom camping site. Alcohol and dogs are banned from the area. A row of bollards is in place to prevent vehicles driving onto the grass paddock but one of these had been smashed to allow vehicles to get through onto the mown paddock alongside the

The young west Aucklanders also had several dogs with them, one of them a large great dane wandering freely. Dogs are banned from the site.

Trevor Lloyd McKenzie 22 July 1922 - 20 March 2019

Trevor McKenzie, a former Whangarei County Councillor, was farewelled in the Waipu Presbyterian Church on Tuesday 26 March.

It was a simple ceremony as this is the way Trevor would have liked it.

His eldest daughter Marie read the eulogy, a great granddaughter read a poem she had written and a granddaughter sang.

Trevor was a member of one of Waipu's founding families. His great, great grandfather Duncan McKenzie was part owner of the Gazelle, which brought the first Nova Scotian Settlers to Waipu in 1853 and it was he who wrote to Governor Grey asking if he knew of a suitable place where a god fearing, hardworking group of Scots could settle.

Trevor was brought up in the family homestead in Applecross Rd., where his brother Les still lives. He attended the North River School in Helmsdale Rd. and left at the age of 14 for a job slashing teatree with his older brother Alex. Alex was killed in Italy during the Second World War.

In an interview with the Bream Bay News in 2014 Trevor said, as one of the older students the teacher had left him to teach the younger children and he felt he might as well go out and get a job where he would be paid.

When he turned 16, Trevor enlisted with the territorials and joined the North Auckland Mounted Rifle Brigade. He was discharged in 1943 having gained the rank of Sergeant. In 1948 he married Lois Barrot, the local sawmiller's daughter. They purchased a dairy farm on Mountfield Road. His brothers David, Leslie and Norman each had farms nearby. They united under the company name McKenzie Brothers and for a time were the largest suppliers to the Maungaturoto Dairy Factory.

Trevor and Lois had five children and, with Lois' support and help on the farm, Trevor became heavily involved in the civic life of the district.

He served on the Whangarei County Council from 1956 to 1977 and played a major role in upgrading the district's rural roads.

He also held numerous local committee positions including: Chairman of the Waipu Fire Brigade, Chairman of the Waipu Centennial Domain Board, President of the Marsden Combined St John Ambulance Brigade, President of the Waipu Rugby Club, Waipu Delegate for Federated Farmers, Honorary Ranger for the Lands and Survey Department and Chief of the Waipu Caledonian Society. He was a founding member of both the Waipu and Ruakaka ratepayer associations and was made a Justice of the Peace in 1967.

He took on the job of MC at local dances - lining everyone up for the limbo and spinning the bottle for the monte carlo, thoroughly enjoying the fun and interaction with his community.

Trevor and Lois moved to South Rd. in Waipu in 1977.

Marie said her father's favourite saying was "Where there is a will there is a way" – which she said he understood as "If I write a lot of letters to those concerned it will eventually get done."

She said her father was a meticulous record keeper writing in a diary every day since 1950. As well as keeping tabs on all the meetings he needed to attend he wrote down observations such as "It's a beautiful clear day. The strawberries are starting to ripen."

In 2014 Trevor was presented with a Whangarei District Council Civic Honour.

As recently as last December he was still manning the radio at the Waipu Fire Station during call outs, sometimes getting up in the dead of night to head to the station.

At 96 he was the oldest still active fire brigade member in New Zealand. Trevor calculated he had at least 10 years on the next oldest serving member.

Last year at a special ceremony at the Waipu Fire Brigade he was presented with a gold star long service medal. Although the medal was for 37 years service with the brigade, Trevor had in fact served for 67 years.

Although starting to look

frail he said at the ceremony, "I am far better doing something than just sitting at home."

Former Waipu Fire Chief Trevor Vaile said Trevor or TL as he was known by the members of the Waipu Brigade, liked to see things done properly and had taught him a lot about the correct way to conduct a meeting. TL had helped to found the brigade when he was a County Councillor and regarded it as "his special"

baby". He was always interested to meet new recruits and their families and to know what was going on. Trevor said there are many little handwritten notes left around the station by TL, which would give reminders of him for many years to come.

Members of the Waipu Fire Brigade formed a guard of honor as his coffin was piped out of the church into the waiting hearse.



Beverly Doull organises the weekly games which are held every Sunday from 1pm. She said it is sometimes hard to keep the numbers up but "We battle on. We play by the rules and we take part in a couple of tournaments a year. We enjoy it."

Beverly said people over 60 are welcome to come along and try the game to see if it is for them. If they decide to play regularly they will have to join the 60s Up Club but the cost for this is only \$10 per year.

to reserve their former sites as casual campers for part of the following summers, storing their caravans and cabins somewhere nearby.

The letters makes the offer - "If requested we can help you identify contact persons for possible local off site storage."

But he acknowledges this would be easier for the site holders with caravans than for those who have constructed cabins on their sites.

"There are no villains here", said Mr. Henderson.

"I think everyone understands the Department of Conservation's position. On the other hand when people have been coming to the camp ground for so long as the annual site holders have they are understandably a bit unhappy about this. "For the board's part most of our members feel the ASHs have made a positive contribution to the camp. Having people who comes back year after year has

added something positive to the mix. We would have preferred to let the ASH practice come to an end through natural attrition.

"We haven't issued any new annual sites for 12 years and the sites are help by individuals and cannot be transferred to the children of the current site holders." To give the site holders as well as members of the local community a chance to put their case to the Department of Conservation the reserve board is organising a meeting with a neutral moderator at the Waipu Cove Surf Lifesaving Club from 7pm to 8pm on Friday 12 April.

Rural roads in the worst state they have been in for years

from State Highway 1 is the most densely populated section of unsealed road in Northland.

At the Waipu Ratepayers meeting held on Wednesday 26 March to discuss the Council's annual plan, residents of Massey Rd. complained bitterly about the state of that road with one woman telling the Council that parents in rural Waipu were afraid to let their children ride on the school buses and were driving them to school themselves.

Councillor Phil Halse is a vocal critic of the Northland Transportation Alliance, which was set up in 2016 to manage roading maintenance across the whole of Northland.

Asked if the current poor state of Waipu's rural roads is due to this new arrangement he replied – "Short answer 'ves."

The following are extracts from a document explaining how the NTA would work.

The NTA will co-ordinate staff and resources to benefit all Northland road users. By combining our staff and resources Northland can improve consistency of services and efficiencies of scale e.g. specialist skills and purchasing power.

This new arrangement will help each council to stretch their dollars further, as we make better decisions about maintaining and renewing our transport assets. We will also gain savings by coordinating our work programmes to smooth out the peaks and troughs so we aren't competing for contractors with neighbouring councils. As time goes by we may find other opportunities for savings in things like the way we procure and manage contact services.

The document explained that existing roading maintenance contracts would remain in place but as time went on:

Collaborating to create larger contract areas can enable the contractors to pass on savings from better investment in equipment and staff, better utilisation of their resources, and the application of greater levels of specialisation.

Councillor Halse, who was chairman of the Whangarei District Council's Works and Services committee for 12 years says he used to be able to phone up the relevant Council staff member when there was a roading problem and get it sorted. Now he has to put all his requests before the Council's CEO who passes it on to the NTA.

"I don't have any more influence that any other local resident.

"Local people are best placed to give the Council

feedback about the state of the roads and any problems they encounter. We should be making use of this knowledge and not relying on a report written by someone from the NTA."

Councillor Halse says another problem is a lack of funding. He said ten years ago 42 cents in every dollar the Whangarei District Council received went into roading. This has now dropped to just 24 cents. Whereas ten years ago the Council spent \$34 million on roads in this year's budget it will spend \$32 million

"Effectively this is a 50% drop in funding as the cost for road works has doubled in that time."

Councillor Halse said, "With contributions of developers and the rural share of the rates, there should be enough to keep our rural roads in a really good state."



Change of plan for the Waipu to Waipu Cove cycle and walkway

The Waipu Cycle and Walkway group has revised its plans for the next stage of the trail between Waipu town and the Cove.

The group hopes to start work before the end of May on a section of the route between the Cove and Cullen Rd. on the western, landward side of Cove Rd.

This is a reversal of previous plans to keep the entire trail on the seaward side of the road but has become necessary because one property owner has not agreed to an easement along the road edge of his property. Another reason for taking the route to the western side of the road is that it fits in with an application by the

Whangarei District Council to the Provincial Growth Fund to build a cycleway between Mangawhai and One Tree Point. The proposed route for this trail goes through forest roads from Mangawhai, down Cullen Rd and then along Cove Rd. on the landward side.

The Cycle and Walkway group's Chairman Tim Manning said construction of the Waipu Cove to Cullen Rd section on the landward side would be "a relatively low cost addition to the planned stage 2 route."

In addition this link would provide recreational and safety benefits to the growing population in Cullen Rd.

Waipu parents driving their children to school because they feel the state of the rural roads makes travelling on the school bus too dangerous

The unsealed state of Massey Rd. was the hot topic at the Whangarei District Council's Annual Plan meeting in Waipu held on Wednesday 27 March in St. Peter's Church in Nova Scotia Drive.

The residents said the road was treacherous. School buses travelled up and down the road every weekday but many parents felt the ride was too dangerous and drove their children to school themselves.

One woman, who declined to be named, said a vehicle had recently veered off the road taking out four letterboxes in the very spot where her children waited for the school bus

She said the lodge near the top of the road regularly hosts weddings, which brings hundreds of vehicles often driven by people who are often unfamiliar with winding metal roads up the road every Saturday.

Bob Mullins said when he first moved to Massey Rd. 20 years ago there were just five houses in the road. Now there were close to 50. He asked where all those extra rates the Council is now collecting are being

spent.

Councillor Crichton Christie said the reason very little road sealing is being carried out in the district is that a government subsidy, which paid for 60% of the cost, had been removed. The Council had previously operat-

ed a scheme where if the residents agreed to pay 20% of the cost through a targeted rate, the Council paid the remaining 20%. Councillor Shelley Deeming said it was unfortunate that Massey Rd. was not sealed before the central government subsidy was removed around 10 years ago. She said Massey Rd had been at the top of the list.






