### Neighbours alarmed at size of proposed Waipu Caves Farm Park campground

People living in Waipu Caves Rd. Waipu are a bit alarmed at the size of a planned adventure holiday park development there.

Businessman and entrepreneur Ian Fox has spent the past four years developing Waipu Caves Farm Park, with a 220 site camping ground, offering recreation activities such as hiking, rock climbing and cave exploration.

He said consent applications for the development are about to go before the Whangārei District Council but he doesn't anticipate any problems.

"I am not building a coal fired power station or a chemical manufacturing plant. What I am doing is good for the environment. The farm park will encourage people to explore and appreciate the natural environment and will help to promote tourism in this area."

One of the concerns neighbours have is that Waipu Caves Road is very steep, narrow and windy but Ian says it already carries a lot of tourist traffic travelling up to the Whangārei District Council's popular freedom camping site at the caves. He suggests that if people want the road tar sealed they should be in favour of his development. He wonders if the concerns are held

### It doesn't help young people if you give them excuses to behave badly.

The sun is shining this morning (Sunday 8 January) - most unusual. The traffic on the highway has all been fleeing the rain and heading south over the past few days and the campgrounds have emptied out but for those who stayed on - moving their clothes and sleeping bags into the middle of their tents to stay dry - this clear sunny morning is the reward for their patience. However, if last night's TV1weather forecast is correct I believe there is more wet weather on the way.

Christmas is over. The pohutukawa, which were glorious in early summer, have long finished flowering and the crimson carpet spread beneath their branches have been swept away by the rain. I packed away all our Christmas tree decorations this morning. The visiting relatives have gone home and its back to work for most people tomorrow.

What will the year bring? Who can say. The weather certainly is unpredictable but then thinking back over the years, it always has been. I did feel sorry for the Whangārei Racing Club staff who have worked towards the club's big January meeting for months only to have to call it all off half way through because the misty falling rain made things dangerous for the jockeys. The Waipu Lions are hoping the Waipu Bike and Car show on Sunday 5 February doesn't meet the same fate.

I came across that burned out car (pictured in the Police Report on page 8) at the bottom of Doctors Hill Rd. on Friday afternoon (7 January) and having that morning heard from Senior Sergeant Simon Craig about a car stolen from One Tree Point I took note of the registration number. Sure enough it was the very car in a much-altered state. Who did this?

I think the young criminals who smash their way into shops and take cigarettes and cash, steal cars and destroy them or trash public property should be made to pay for every last cent of the damage they cause. In this way perhaps they will understand about the value of things and how much effort and hard work it takes to run a business and to build and maintain public and private facilities. The army of social workers who sympathise with these young criminals and their traumatic childhoods should be replaced by some tough taskmasters who can stand over these kids while they work at planting trees along riverbanks, picking up rubbish from the sides of the roads, sanding buildings in preparation for new paint, clearing weeds from parkland, stacking boxes in warehouses - whatever it takes to make full reparations to the people they have wronged. I think most of the people in my generation would have had pretty traumatic childhoods by today's standards It doesn't do young people much good to give them excuses to behave badly.

Tell them instead how they are privileged to live in a country, which provides its citizens with free education and health care and gives people funds to buy food and pay rent if they are unable to earn a living for themselves. Explain that it is business and working people who pay taxes that provide all these things. If you break into a service station or dairy, threatens the business owner, damage property and steal goods you are doing this to someone who has been helping to look after you.

My advice to the young people in my own family is to find something useful to do with their talents and to hone their skills through study or practice so they become truly valuable individuals. I tell them this, rather than by following purely selfish pursuits or relying on bluff, as some attempt to do, is the way to a happy, successful life.

Perhaps in the process of doing some honest work a few of those young ones who seem lost to society will discover that there is indeed mana in mahi and will find a place for themselves in this world.

### **Races cut short**

The Ruakākā Racecourse family fun day on Friday 6 January had to be called off after just four of the scheduled eight races because of poor visibility for the jockeys whose goggles were getting steamed up in the warm, wet weather.

It was a big disappointment for Whangarei Racing Club's Operations Manager Rebecca Swords who had spent months preparing for what is usually the biggest day of the year at the Ruakākā track. With last year's January meet called off because of Covid 19 restrictions, Rebecca was counting on a big crowd this year.

She had spent many hours the previous day battling with the wind to get all the tents and marquees ready.

However, she agreed that having to forgo half the races was preferable to having a serious injury on the track.

The children's games, held earlier in the day, went ahead with the kids not minding the weather too much and the crowd sheltering in the stands enjoyed live music by Syah Folau and Friends, from Auckland.

### New dune lakes

New dune lakes have formed in the Uretiti Campground as a result of all that spring rain. The water table beneath the sand is so high that fresh rain is unable to drain away. The water levels went down a bit in the fine weather between Christmas and New Year but fresh rain has filled the lakes up again.

As a result the campgrounds capacity limit has been decreased from its usual 1200 people to 750 and campers don't have as much space to spread out as they usually do.

Some campers have retained their sites to return when the weather improves. For those that have stayed on the camp has a few organised activities - movie nights in the Waipu Surf Club building, a day at the Waipu Bowling Club and yoga in the hall.



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

### Whangārei District Council should have taken measures to protect Northpine

I was concerned to read that the proposed South Road development behind Northpine seems to have placed the developer in a more advantageous position than a significant Waipu employer. The zone change will place pressure on the operation

> of the Northpine mill as residents "rub cheeks" with an industrial operation.

The developer is trying to determine "what can be done to mitigate the effects of the mill's operation on the new housing development". Surely, the argument needs to support Northpine, the local business that has been in Waipu for 23 years, "What should the Whangarei District Council have done to mitigate the likely effects of a new housing development now permitted to be adjacent to Northpine mill?'

The key issue is going to be noise. The mill is required to operate at 55 decibels at its boundary and a 3 metre high fence has been declined by the developer because it is likely to reduce saleable sections. There will be complaints about noise as the new residents will expect a quiet rural setting and will complain about loss of amenity value. The sales advertisement for South Road notes "provides a relaxed coastal lifestyle for families or the retired alike", but neglects to mention the mill will be a neighbour. Will these complaints place pressure on the Northern Regional Council to discuss with Northpine a further reduction in the noise of its operations or even close?

So how loud is 55 decibels? Consumer suggests that normal conversation is 65 decibels and a vacuum cleaner comes in at 70. A lawn mower is likely to approach 90 decibels. Could Northpine complain about the noise from normal residential activity?

One hopes a compromise can be reached to enable Northpine to continue, but it will need the developer to be more accommodating with his noise mitigation plans than the current report suggests.

# Fingers crossed for fine weather for the Waipu Car and Bike show on February 5



Seven hundred cars and trucks and 150 motorbikes were on display at the 2021 Waipu Car and bike show

The next big event on the Bream Bay calendar is the Waipu Car and Bike Show in the Caledonian Park on Sunday 5 February from 9am to 2pm.

This is the eighth time the show has been held. It is a big fundraiser for the Waipu Lions with over \$100,000 raised so far, all of which has gone to local community causes.

This year's major beneficiary will be the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway Trust, which needs additional funds to extend the trail.

Classic car owner Ron Cave, who initiated the event, commented in 2015, the year of the inaugural Waipu Car and Bike Show, how surprising it was to see what local people had hidden away in their sheds. Since then the event's reputation amongst car and bike enthusiasts has grown and the show is recognized as the biggest of its kind in Northland attracting car and bike enthrusiasts from around the upper North Island. At the last show in 2021 over 700 cars and trucks lined up in the park as well as 150 motorbikes. Ron is anticipating around the same numbers or perhaps even more to show up this year.

There are 11 category prizes for cars including: Best Vintage, Best Hot Rod, Best American, European, British, Australian and Japanese and best commercial vehicle and five for bikes: Best British, European, Japanese, European and Custom. there is also a People's Choice Award show attendees get to vote on and prizes for the best-dressed man and woman (usually in the vintage fashion of their vehicle) and this year, for the first time, a prize for the best-dressed child.

Entry is \$10 for adults and \$30 for a family pass. Children under the age of 12 get in for free.

Northpine is the show's major sponsor with many other local businesses also giving support.

There will be food carts and stalls as well as stalls selling motor vehicle paraphernalia.

With all the unseasonable rain we have been having Ron and the Waipu Lions members as well as the members of the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway trust are crossing their fingers that the sun will shine on show day.

### Fourteen people found drink driving by Christmas and New Year Police road checks

Over the limit breath alcohol levels ranged from 318 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath to 717 micrograms. The legal limit for drivers over the age of 21 years is 250 micrograms. Senior Sergeant Simon Craig Officer in Charge of the Bream Bay Police said, "It is extremely disappointing that so many people show contempt for other road users by drinking and driving."

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### Upgrade for the Waipu Cove to Langs coastal track By Melinda Butt

On Friday 23 December the Waipu Coastal Walkway was reopened. Thanks to a dedicated team of volunteers the path has been secured and strengthened to create a safer walking track. Since February 2022 members of the Wairahi Tracks Charitable Trust (WTCT) have been working with the goal to restore and create a more stable path along the coast from Waipu Cove to Langs beach. The track has had precarious slippery sections for some time, and after an extremely wet winter additional damage had occured. With the permission of the Whangarei District Council, WTCT trust members, along with other local volunteers, have been hard at work reducing the dangerous sections and improving the safety and standards of the track. It has been a laborious task to carry materials in to create steps...

While the women shoveled shingle into sacks, the men carried it down to the sites in need of repair. Some sections have required cutting and digging through mud and thick kikuyu to create steps and tabling on flattened areas. Lugging in planks of wood and heavy sacks of shingle isn't for the faint hearted. so it's been a valiant effort by all those involved.

Mary Sinclair, a member of Wairahi Tracks Charitable Trust, said, "This has been a real community project with local businesses such as Northpine and ITM offering materials at a discounted rate and Mountfield Quarry donating the metal. Mary said, "We also had a fantastic response from the community with people donating anywhere from \$50 upwards". The track was originally developed by members of the Waipu Lions Club around 15 years ago led by the vision and achieved through the perseverance of one of the club's members, the late Alan McKenzie. Alan, who lived on one of the properties alongside the track, recalled earlier times when the public enjoyed free access to the little beaches and elevated views along that section of coastline. He and

his wife Marjorie restored the native vegetation at the bottom of their property and placed it under the protection of the QEll Trust.

Thanks to Alan and Majorie's efforts as well as the support they received from the Waipu Lions, overseas tourists and locals alike have been able to enjoy the spectacular views on offer along this special coastline. Many consider this track to be the jewel in the crown when it comes to local attractions. This has been the key motivation behind the restoration process. "This is a highly regarded walkway with unique rock formations and a beautiful coastline," says John Tapper of WCTC.

John and the Wairahi Tracks Charitable Trust have a vision to create a series of integrated tracks throughout the area. The trust is now calling on additional volunteers to help with the labour involved in improving our local walking tracks. In the meantime the Waipu Cove to Langs Beach path is now open and ready to be explored.

#### Dispatch from the Waipu River Walk Committee January 2023

What a year 2022 was! It has been an absolute joy to see how well-used and loved the Waipu River Walk has become for the community and its many visitors.

There have been some significant milestones reached for the WRW in the last year. The completion of the entrance sign design and installation is one of those. The signs include a map of the walk showing significant landmarks, a kaperua design created by Patuharakeke artist Marino Duke specifically for the Waipu River Walk, and the iconic WRW logo designed by Baly Gaudin. The reo (Māori language) on the signs includes kupu (words) specific to Patuharakeke.

Patuharakeke Trust Board led the blessing and unveiling of the entrance signs at the official opening of the Waipu River Walk, held during Matariki in July. The beautiful sounds of the bagpipes (played by local Logan) led people from the walk river entrance up to the hall, where 80 or so attendees partook in whakanoa (removing the tapu or sacredness of the event) through morning tea and then art games for the younger ones.

Across a number of group working bees in 2022, people of all ages (7-80+!) mucked in and contributed countless hours of mahi clearing rubbish, cutting down privet, gorse, wild ginger, and mulching, preparing and planting out natives, steadily improving the walk surrounds and experience.






