# **Meridian Energy gets** final consent for its Ruakākā Solar Farm

Subject to final decision by the Meridian Board, construction will begin mid year

Meridian Energy has been granted final consent approval by the Environment Court to build its 120MW Ruakākā Solar Farm on 172 hectares stretching alongside State Highway 15, McCathie Road, Marsden Point Road and Rama Road.

Initial consent was granted by the Northland Regional Council in September, after which an appeal was received regarding some environmental aspects of the development. This was resolved following discussions between Meridian, the appellants and interested parties, and Meridian will now further enhance the protection of natural wetlands and dunelands, and restoration of wetland areas.

Meridian Chief Executive Neal Barclay said "Solar farms and batteries are part of the solution to strengthen and grow our electricity system. Along with our hydro stations and wind farms, they'll build resilience for tough years and help to reduce the cost of electricity for Kiwi homes and businesses."

The solar farm is Stage 2 of Meridian's Ruakākā Energy Park, which also includes a 100MW battery energy storage system that is expected to be fully operational by April 2025.

Subject to final investment decision by the Meridian Board, expected in March, construction of the Ruakākā Solar Farm is planned to start in mid-2025 and to be completed by early 2027.

# **Insect Bites**

Insects that bite do it to get access to your blood as that is what they feed on. Biting insects include mosquitos, fleas, sand flies or midges and bedbugs.

In New Zealand, biting insects do not carry diseases such as malaria, dengue fever or lyme



disease, as they do in other countries. But the result of an insect bite is frequently intense itching, as the insect injects a small amount of an anti-clotting substance so that the blood may be fed on more easily. This often develops into a raised reddened lump at the site of a bite, and may also blister. The major problem with these bites is that the itching results in scratching the area, causing infections and sores to develop, which may take some time to heal, and may also cause scarring.

In order to treat an insect bite you need to relieve the itch. There are many preparations available from your community pharmacy that will help to treat the itch, as it may continue for several days after the bite if you are particularly sensitive to that insect. Often people that are new to an area may have a more severe allergic response to the insects that inhabits that region. Travellers or those on holiday often have a more severe reaction to insects than those that live locally, as an immunity to the insect appears to develop with repeated exposure or bites in the past.

Preparations that your community pharmacist may advise you to use to treat the itch of insect bites include soothing, numbing or mild steroid creams and lotions. If there are many bites, or your reaction is severe, then antihistamine tablets may also be helpful to deal with extended periods of itching. The itch of bites tends to worsen at night when you are in bed and this is when antihistamine tablets are particularly helpful.

As with all preventable conditions, the best treatment of insect bites is not to get bitten in the first place. Regular flea treatment of cats and dogs and good household and personal hygiene will help to remove fleas and bedbugs. It is also helpful to remove or cover pools of water to deter mosquitos.

Your community pharmacist is also able to advise you of suitable products to use to repel biting mosquitos, sand flies and other insects; as well as advise you about how to discourage insects from being attracted to you or your surroundings.

It's not too bad at Uretiti beside the campground, which is my main track to the sea. I was just this morning thinking that, while most of the year I enjoy the space and solitude, it can be nice to watch and interact a little bit with people enjoying themselves here.

A young couple out for an early morning jog gave me a start as I headed down the Tahuna Track just after sunrise. A little boy and a grey haired grandfather were digging in the sand and looking at the sand hoppers and worm that somehow survive there while they waited for a tug on their fishing rod, an Indian man smiled and nodded as he headed down to the waves with his two little children.



# What is happening here? Waipu Development discussed by the Whangārei District Council "in committee"

A mysterious item entitled "Waipu Development" was listed at the bottom of the Whangarei District Council's minutes for its last meeting of 2024 held on 12 December.

The item was discussed "in committee" meaning away from the public eye, with no description of what was said or decided recorded in the minutes.

The Bream Bay News pointed out that under The Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act a reason must be given whenever the Council discusses an issue "in committee" and that reason must fit into criteria set out in the act.

The Council's Senior Communications Advisor Ann Midson inquired about this and came back with the explanation that the Council moved into committee to enable it to carry out commercial activities "without prejudice or disadvantage "which is one of criteria permited under the act.

# Contractor told to cut back mowing of Uranga Park to just four times a year

Government's cost-cutting has arrived at Uranga Park in Ruakākā.

FBL which contracts to LINZ (Land Information New Zealand), which manages crown land, now wants the park mowed just four times a year and has stipulated the months of March, June September and December when this will occur. Currently the contractor Bain McGregor mows the park whenever it needs it between eight and ten times a year.

Bain is concerned that in the spring the grass will grow quickly and then as it dries out in the summer become a fire hazard.

After rain or heavy dew students walking through the park on their way to school will arrive with wet feet and the long grass will hide bottles and broken glass which will endanger people walking through the park in bare feet, as they often do. This will also be hazardous for the tractor operator as the bottles shatter in the mower blades.

Bain said he usually picks up dumped rubbish when he does the mowing and the situation could get really messy if it is left too long.

Ruakaka Village resident Tui Roman said Bain has been mowing the park for many years and takes pride in keeping it tidy. She said the park is well used when it is mown.


"There are families out there an children playing ball games together." She said when the grass in the park is long it is hard to see the hollows and humps and she cannot walk there.

My question is: Why is the W D C immune from prosecution for transgressions of the law and also how are staff from the offending plants immune and untouchable unlike farm staff


Isn't it time we had a level playing field and the darts stick to all who are at fault. It's not the law that is at fault it is the administration of the law

# Ruakākā school lunch scheme remains for another year

The Ruakākā School lunch scheme, where local people are employed to prepare lunch and morning tea for the school's 291 children remains in place, at least for another year. The school has a commercial kitchen set up in what was the staff room especially for the lunch scheme.

The coalition government however has signaled that by next year schools where lunches are prepared on site will receive just \$4 for each child's lunch. At present the allowance is \$6.77 per child.

When the Bream Bay News visited the school last year lunch was a ham and salad sandwich on whole grain bread, an apple and muffins had been served for morning tea. Children sat together to eat and all seemed to be enjoying the camaraderie and the food. Teaching staff reported that the full tummies as well as the ban on sugary drinks and food made a big difference to the children's ability to concentrate and learn throughout the afternoon.

Neither Waipu Primary nor One Tree Point School qualifies for the lunch scheme.

Only the top 25% of schools in what is now called the "equity index" where families face the most socio economic barriers are eligible for the scheme.

Belinda Bunny, the new Principal of Waipu Primary School, was welcomed with a powhiri in the school hall on Monday 3 February, the first day of the school year.

The following day your Bream Bay News reporter had a chat with her in her office and asked about her ideas on education.

She said, "first and foremost its about the kids. We need to do everything we can to make their experience of school better. Quite often organisations are set up to support the adults but not to be focused on the kids."

She believes in teaching the basics well but also understands the importance of outdoor and environmental education.

"We are so lucky here with the bush and the beach. The climate is amazing. We have the world at our feet." Mrs. Bunny comes to Waipu from Gladstone School in East Carterton in the Waiarapa where she has been Principal since 2019. She has three grown up daughters and son in Year 12 who has remained in the Waiarapa with his father to complete his secondary education. She is currently house sitting a home in Waipu and is looking around for more permanent accommodation and is a little bit torn between living in Waipu village or closer to the beach at Waipu Cove.

# Start of year rolls at Bream Bay schools

# Local Government Elections coming up in September - Who will be putting up their hand?

Local Government elections are due to be held this year with postal voting from 9 September to 11 October 2025.

Candidate nominations open on 4 July and close on 1 August.

In Bream Bay we get to vote for two ward councillors, the Mayor of Whangarei and a Northland Regional Councillor representing the southern coastal section of Northland.

Those on the Māori Electoral Roll vote for two councillors in a district wide Maori ward and two NRC Councillors in Te Raki Māori Constituency for the NRC.

At the directive of the Government a referendum will be held alongside the election asking if whee Counicls should retain the Maori Wards.

We have over 400 people working for us and we spend about \$50million a year. It's not a part time job and it is important to have some governance experience under your belt. You need to be able to work with other people and to accept that you are not always going to get your way."

Councillor Phil Halse say it's too early to have made up his mind as to whether he will stand for election once more in September

He has been a Whangārei District Councillor for a continuous 33 years. If he gets elected again it will be his 12th three-year term. He served three of those years representing the Okara Ward after he and his wife Flo moved to Whangārei but although he still lives in Whangarei, at the last election after the resignation of Councillor Shelley Deeming he was voted in once more as a Bream Bay Ward councillor. He thinks his 33 years might be close to a national record.

He currently holds the position of Deputy Mayor, and is deputy chairman of both the Finance and Infrastructure Committees. He sees these roles as mentoring the district's future leaders.

Phil says Bream Bay has everything going for it. Four of the biggest industries in Northland are based here. It has a farming community and fast growing residential areas

The new Ruakākā Waste Water Treatment plant is a big exciting project just getting underway with tenders invited just before Christmas.

Phil said anyone considering standing for election to Council should think carefully.

# Would like to continue to work on the Northland side Knowledge Hub

Councillor Ken Couper also seems to be enjoying his role. He is Chairman of the Strategy Planning and Development Committee and is excited about working to set up what he calls a "Knowledge Hub" based in the central city but with satellite centres to serve the whole of Northland. This involves building facilities and inviting tertiary education providers such as the University of Auckland and Skills NZ to set up branches here.

Ken said the Hub would bring together education, job training and creative activities all in one place.

He is concerned that many of Northland's young people never undertake tertiary education of any kind and are consequently stuck in low paying jobs for the rest of their lives.

He understands that many young people will need to be supported to succeed at their chosen field of study and proposes to have people in place, camp mothers to provide pastoral care.

Ken said he would like to serve a third term on Council so he can see this project through.



# Car burglaries and thefts in Ruakākā

There has been a space of car burglaries and thefts in Ruakākā. A vehicle was taken from Tamure Rd., Ruakākā and then recovered in Station Rd. Another vehicle taken from Ruakākā was later found in Onerahi. Vehicle break ins have been reported from Bermuda Place in One Tree Point and Bream Bay Drive in the Ruakākā south area.

# More fraud incidents reported

More fraud incidents have been reported. One person had money taken from their bank account after handing over their bank access codes to a fraudster who had phoned them to ask if they had recently made a purchase at Mitre 10. The answer was no so the fraudster told the victim he would close down their account and to do this needed the account access numbers. Sergeant Simon Craig said this is a common scam and warns people to never hand out bank passwords to anyone.

There have also been more cases of people losing their deposits on items that seem to be incredibly cheap on Facebook Marketplace. Sergeant Craig warns people not to hand over any money until they have seen the item they intend to purchase.

# Concern for the survival of Ruakākā Forest's beech trees

Robyn Armstrong of the Ruakåkå Forest protection group is raising concerns about the survival of the forests regionally significant hard beech trees.


Robyn said We are concerned that while the Kauri up there are regenerating really well and producing heaps of seedlings so far we have only managed to find 16 hard beech trees, one came down in cyclone Gabriel, another one that was struggling has since died and we are unable to find any beech seedlings in the immediate vicinity. This does not bode well for the future of hard beech in Ruakākā Forest."

Robyn said the mix of kauri, podocarp, broadleaf and beech found in the forest is "apparently quite a threatened system and one of only 2 in Northland."

"This is a treasure unique to Ruakākā and we need to nurture it before sometime in the future the last hard beech in the forest falls into the gully."

Possum trapping efforts by the protection group have helped the survival of the remaining beech trees.

This particular tree is looking much healthier since this work began.



# In search of coastal maire



Coralie Roberts, Manager of the Waipu Community Nursery, is keen to get hold of some seed of the Coastal Maire from shrubs or trees growing in the Waipu area Coralie said she knows of only two trees growing in Waipu and neither of these have produced any seed.

Coastal Maire can be found in the exposed margins of coastal forest, on exposed ridgelines and rocky slopes. It is a stocky spreading tree or shrub growing up to 10 metres in height. It has leathery, wavy, glossy dark green leaves that are pale green on the underside. Its flowers are pale or yellowish green and 2.5 to 2.9cm in diameter and are without petals. The trees botanical name Nestegis apetala refers its paired leaves and the apetala (no petals). Fruit are oval shaped and yellow or purple when ripe. Rats love to eat them, which is most likely why the New Zealand Plan Conservation Network lists this plant as an "at risk" species.

# The Ahuroa

The Ahuroa River begins its journey along Waipu Gorge Road, flowing from the foothills of Piroa (the Brynderwyns) and tumbling down a 20 metre drop at Piroa Falls. Piroa Falls is more than a scenic waterfall. It is a sacred place. It was once an important ceremonial site for Māori, where ancient rituals were performed to prepare warriors for going to battle as well as welcoming them home. This is evidenced by the significant pā site in the upper reaches of Piroa called Te Taumata Tirohanga.

The water quality of Piroa Falls is frequently monitored by LAWA (Land Air Water Aotearoa) during the summer months. The results reflect the levels of E. coli in the water. At Piroa Falls the long-term grade is 'poor' as the majority of its results are in the red zone. This means it doesn't meet national guidelines for swimming and there is a high risk of illness.

According to LAWA, 'E. coli is a type of bacteria commonly found in the guts of warm-blooded mammals (including people) and birds. E. coli can survive for up to four to six weeks outside the body in fresh water, making it a useful indicator of faecal contamination and the presence of disease-causing organisms. Common sources of E. coli bacteria are human wastewater discharges, animal waste, bird droppings and stormwater run-off.'

Further downstream, the Ahuroa River is siphoned into the treatment plant that supplies water to the Waipu township. The Whangārei District Council has confirmed that the water is treated using chlorine (1.5g per cubic metre) and caustic soda to make sure the pH level is 7.2 (which is alkaline). Caustic soda, also known as sodium hydroxide, is an industrial chemical with multiple uses. It is used in water treatment to stabilise pH levels, remove heavy metals and soften water by removing calcium and magnesium ions. It is also used to remove organic pollutants and bacteria, and to prevent pipe corrosion. The Ahuroa water treatment plant also uses a 'multi-barrier approach' to manage risks, which includes a filtration system with stones and UV light, as required under the Water Services Act 2021.

The Ahuroa River then wends its way towards the centre of town where it joins the Waihoihoi and Waipu rivers in a three-pronged fork part-way along the Waipu River Walk. The Waipu River then flows past the Waipu Boat & Fishing Club, Waipu Cemetery and out to Te Moana Nui a Kiwa (the Pacific).

The Waipu Cemetery offers a restful outlook of the Waipu River. There are approximately 1,700 people interred there, including my grandparents Walter and Noeline Draper. Unfortunately burials and cremations can have a negative impact on the environment. Burials leach embalming chemicals into the soil and groundwater, including formaldehyde, arsenic, ammonia and chloride. While a single cremation produces an average of 534 pounds of carbon dioxide - roughly a quarter of the amount the average petrol-powered car emits in a year. In some parts of the world alternatives to cremation are starting to gain momentum, such as resomation (water cremation) but we are yet to see this available in Aotearoa. There is a natural burial option offered at Maunu Cemetery where the body is either wrapped in a cotton or silk shroud or placed in a casket made of organic material such as wood or willow, with no metal joinery. The burial is in a shallow grave where the humus is active in a bush-clad section of the cemetery. Waipu's rivers contend with human-induced hazards at (almost) every turn. But thankfully Waipu Waters



# Waipu community garden uses regenerative gardening methods

Waipu 2000 is a Charitable Trust, which keeps Waipu looking clean and tidy and develops and funds community projects often in partnership with other groups.

Alan Nordich, who mows and weed eats many of the towns public spaces, empties the village rubbish and recycling and provides a cheery smile and chat for many residents is employed by Waipu 2000.

Despite losing some its Whangārei District Council mowing contracts the Trust continues to use funds to complete community projects and assist with others.

The Community Orchard next to the Fire Station is one such project, using the nutrient dense food crops method based on

regenerative farming philosophy.

Some people have voiced concern that it looks a bit messy without mown lawn under the however, under the guidance of Tony Robinson, a nutrient dense food crops practitioner with 30 years experience, the orchard has been designed to grow all year round sustainable and nutrient dense tree crops without the use of toxic chemicals. With the use of cover crops and companion planting the community garden should be self-sufficient with minimal inputs required by local volunteers.

As cover crops protect the soils and fix soil nutrients, the Trust has planted lupins, mustard, wildflowers, and herbs such as borage and calendula. The cover crop has been cut down and left to mulch. Compost and natural fertilisers have been used to enrich the soil.

Tony believes over cultivation destroys soils, causing the loss of active soil biology and killing off worms. This method soaks up the rain and retains soil moisture, very important for this area, as there is no water on site. The trust is grateful to neighbours Bevan and Margaret Holmes who have assisted over very dry patches.



Already some very young trees (have produced some fruit although tin this first year these may not fully mature. In the future it is hoped there will be an abundance of produce to share with the community.

The trust invites people to enjoy this garden and to let them know when something might need attention but "don't expect it to look like orchards you see elsewhere where weeds are controlled by constant mowing or the use of herbicides.


