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## Warm weather stimulating weed growth in the Wilsons Dam cause of musty taste in Ruakaka's tap water

The Whangarei District Council is recommending people in Ruakaka store tap water overnight in the fridge before drinking it.

Andrew Venmore, the Council's Water Services Manager said, "The warm weather has impacted the taste of the water. The high temperatures have increased organic growth in Wilson's Dam and this can lead to the water having a musty or earthy taste.

"Although it is safe to drink it is recommended water is stored in the fridge overnight as this usually improves the taste.

He said Water Services have been flushing the pipes to try and bring fresh water into the network. However, if people are experiencing ongoing problems they should contact the Council Call Centre (09 430 4200) and contractors can flush the pipes in the individual streets where problems persist.

The advice about storing water in the fridge before drinking applies to Ruakaka and not Waipu, where the town supply water is mostly sourced from the Ahuroa River.

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**EDITORIAL**

**We could redirect some of that rage**

I have been thinking about the rage the whole of New Zealand flew into over those unruly British tourists. They were pretty awful but there are plenty of people visiting or living in Bream Bay who are just as bad. Just look at all the rubbish dumped in Te One Place pine forest or the people who tear down the fencing at the Peter Snell Rd. beach entrance with no regard for all the work put in by volunteers to repair the damaged dune. I have picked up many bag fulls of rubbish from the rest area on State Highway One in the last few months and it is now as bad as it has ever been. It looks as though someone has stopped to enjoy the view and while there emptied all the rubbish from his or her car onto the grass.

I think we should direct some of the outrage we felt

towards those British tourists to the locals and visitors who repeatedly undo the cleaning up and repair efforts of local volunteers and treat our beaches, parks and reserves as their rubbish bin.

If you see someone walking away from their beach picnic rubbish ask him or her politely to pick it up. You may cop an earful of abuse, as I have on occasion, but don't be deterred. If you see someone confronting a person about their left behind rubbish, stand behind them to give them solidarity. If you are in the passenger

seat of a vehicle and a McDonald's chip box or a coffee cup comes sailing out the window of the car in front, take a photo of the vehicle's number plate with your phone and send it to the Whangarei District Council. Put pressure on our local Councilors to make sure some action is taken when we send in the evidence.

District Council signage warning people not to dump rubbish doesn't seem to make much difference. All the ranting I do in these editorials about this problem doesn't make much difference either. It is going to take a concerted and combined effort by local people to point out that this kind of behaviour is totally unacceptable and highly offensive to those of us who live here and love this place.

I have just picked some grapes for the Waipu Sharing Shed and arranged them artfully in little cardboard trays. The grapes are delicious this year, sweet and black and there are lots of them. I have eaten so many I have come out in hives, which is a salutary lesson about being greedy.

When Tracey Collins and the other good people first set Sharing Sheds at the Bream Bay Trust and on One Tree Point Rd. outside the Lifepoint Church, I thought I prefer to give any surplus in my garden away to family and friends or people who I knew needed the help. But often I don't have the time to make visits. I think a lot of people are in this position. There are occasions I have picked a bag of lemons for someone suffering a bad cold only to find they have a tree full in their garden, so the Sharing Sheds with their mantra: "Take what you need. Give what you can" make sense. I hope some people pick up those grapes and enjoy eating them – without getting hives.

The Waipu Sharing Shed, for those who don't already know, is at the end of the driveway to Waipu Playcentre, off St. Mary's Rd.

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# Wilson's Dam still ninety percent full

Despite nearly two months with very little rain, water supplies in Bream Bay are holding out well.

The heavy rain on Christmas Eve, which caused problems for the Waipu Christmas Parade, filled the Wilson's Dam which is the back up supply for Bream Bay's public water supply.

Andrew Venmore, the Whangarei District Council's Water Services Manager said the dam was 100 percent full after Christmas Eve. which was a good situation to be in at that time of the year.

As of last Friday 9 February, Wilsons Dam was still 90% full, which Mr. Venmore said, "is a normal level for the time of year."

He said, "We have no worries over the Bream Bay water supply this summer."

The Christmas Eve rain also gave farmland a good soaking. Jared Halse runs a dairy farm operation in Ruakaka said the rain was great. It is only over the last few weeks that the ground has started to dry out."

Graham Hargreaves who runs a dairy farm in Waipu said, "Its just our usual Northland summer. In Northland we farm for dry summers and wet winters. If we get a wet summer it's a bonus."

Milking is still twice a day on the Hargreaves farm.

The litres of milk his herd produces is dropping due to the dry hot weather.

By feeding out supplements – maize and millet grown on the farm and bailage and fodder beet which is bought in they were managing to keep the herd in good shape.

Graham said this seasons maize crop was growing well.

"Some of the crop on nobs or dry parts of the paddocks was starting to get a bit stressed from lack of moisture but most of the crop was looking good.

So far there is no sign of armyworm, which strips the leaves and can be devastating. A parasitic wasp which helps to control this pest is present in good numbers in his

## Deputy Principal in charge at Waipu Primary

**Jo Brown, the Principal of Waipu Primary, was working "offsite" last week and Deputy Principal Glenice Andrews was Acting Principal as the school's board of trustees worked out the best way to handle the situation that arose after Police carried out a search of Ms. Brown's home in The Braigh in central Waipu on Friday morning 25 January.**

Following a series of burglaries in the district, Police executed a search warrant at the address and found a quantity of jewelry, electronics and firearms along with a significant amount of methamphetamine and other drugs.

Three people who were staying at the house were arrested and have been charged with a number of crimes including: burglary, possession of cannabis, possession of methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine for supply and possession of firearms.

Ms. Brown subsequently sent out an email to parents and guardians of children at the school saying that she knew nothing about the crimes being committed

in her home.

She said she had been supporting someone she considered to be a friend, with health issues, to find "his way in the world and start up a carving business." This man had been using space in her house and had access to the shed and the house.

She had been away for several weeks over the summer holidays and during this time a number of people had been staying at or had access to the house. These people had been involved in criminal activity.

Mr. Brown's email was followed by a message to parents from the Waipu School Board of Trustees, which read:

"In relation to the email you will have received earlier today from Jo Brown, the board of trustees (BOT) were advised by the NZ School Trustees Association (NZSTA) on Friday that there was no further action the board should take until we are contacted by a regional advisor from the NZSTA this week. Once the board has received further guidance from the NZSTA we will meet to consider the facts and recommendations and will inform you of any update to the situation at that

time."

In a media statement sent to the Bream Bay News last Friday, 9 February, the board said it was taking "this matter seriously and continues to work closely with the Ministry of Education and New Zealand School Trustees Association so that we address it in line with best practice. While we work through it, Jo Brown is working offsite and our DP is acting principal. Our school has had wonderful staff, parent and community support and this is ensuring there is no impact on students."

Chris Ngarimo, the man who had been living at the Braigh property with Ms. Brown appeared in the Whangarei District Court on 31 January and was remanded in custody. He is due to appear in court again on 18 January for a bail hearing. The other two people who were arrested after the Police search will also be appearing in court on 18 January. They are 37-year-old Corey Hanuera of Waikato and a 17-year-old woman. Mr. Hanuera is remanded in custody while the 17-year-old has been released on bail to an address in Helensville.



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

**District Council candidates should have a vision for the future and a road map on how to get there**

Thank you for your editorial, which struck a chord. I completely agree with you that more savvy and energetic women (of any age) are needed in leadership positions as well as political offices. But I'd like to add that we also have to expect a vision from our next set of district councillors, no matter their age or gender. I imagine that quite a few of us voters will fall again for slogans like "proven experience" and "keen as ever", but given the challenges we're facing in the short-term and medium-term future more of the same and preserving the status quo won't do it. The purpose of our local government (in fact any government) is not to get re-elected – it is to govern. I expect that candidates who have been around a bit longer understand and accept how the world has changed, and that they use their experience and wisdom to adapt to these changes and present us a vision and a path to a circular, sustainable and low-emissions economy, a safe and healthy environment, and a community based on equality and fairness in our region. And this path might very well be a bit rocky and full of inconvenient truths and unpopular actions, because what has worked and how we have lived for the past five or six decades is most likely not going to work and be sustainable in the future. Only then do seasoned candidates deserve our respect, not because of their age or their track record. Unfortunately I haven't met any respectable, Nancy-Pelosi-like candidates in our area yet – but I have met quite a few younger people who are frustrated by some older people's indifference, and who have given up trying to engage with them.

I understand where this indifference comes from, though. We are bombarded every day with bad news and doomsday scenarios, and after a while we just tune it all out and stop listening, reading, thinking and caring, because we don't want to hear it anymore, and we don't know what to believe, let alone what to do and where to start. This is why a vision for our future and a roadmap how to get there, despite the many obstacles, is so essential.

And I wouldn't mind if the next council also had a few more young members, who will have to live for the longest time with the crucial decisions we'll have to make over the next few years. Hopefully this time we'll treat any younger candidates better than last time in 2016, when one of our Bream Bay ward candidates wasn't taken seriously by some of us who thought he should rather be on the Youth Advisory

Group than running for councillor. And I would like to see the number of council terms limited to three, or maybe even just two. It would reduce the risk of tunnel vision and complacency, and encourage councillors to focus on making their mark and getting things done, rather than getting re-elected again and again...

**Nesting shorebirds fared no better on the north side of the Ruakaka Estuary**

Unfortunately the north side of the Ruakaka estuary has fared no better than the south side. All three variable oyster catcher nests have failed. A fourth was disturbed and evicted apparently by two Te Araroa trampers who ignored fencing and signs. Sadly these last two birds have, so far never returned.

Two New Zealand dotterels, however have apparently successfully reared two chicks. Having fledged, hopefully, the chicks will survive.

The elements especially king tides, have always proved a problem but in recent years it has been human disturbance that has been the principal cause of loss. It is not so long ago that there were fourteen pairs of breeding oyster catchers in the immediate vicinity of the dunes., now there are only four. The situation has been no better on the south side. Some difficult decisions are going to have to be made if our shore birds are to survive and nest in peace.

The Ruakaka Wildlife Refuge has the distinction of being one of the oldest refuges in Northland. Last year it turned over 60 years of age. However, how long will it be able to continue to be a sanctuary for bird life.

# A plan to install sixty-four colourful tartan plaques in Waipu

When Ross and Wendy Boyd visited Cape Breton in Nova Scotia five years ago they were impressed by a set of eye catching plaques displaying tartans and coats of arms of various Scottish clans and thought this was an idea that could be transported to Waipu.

The Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association, which they are both active members of, has been applying for grants and seeking approvals for this proposal.

A total of sixty-four oval shaped plaques displaying the clan tartans of the people who came to Waipu with the Nova Scotian migration will be installed back to back on thirty-two power poles along the Braigh, part of Shoemaker Road and for a short distance along Nova Scotia Drive.

Ross has gained permission from both Northpower and the Whangarei District Council to install the plaques on the poles and has searched the registrar of Scottish tartans on the internet. As most clans have more than one tartan he has spoken to descendants from the various families with Waipu links to sort out the most appropriate tartans to display and to

check on the spelling of their family names.

The plaques are made of a durable material called ACM, which has two layers of aluminum with a rubbery substance sandwiched between. The tartan fabric has been treated so it won't fade in the sunlight. Ross said the plaques shouldn't need their fabric covers replaced for at least seven years.

The Waipu Residents and Ratepayers has a \$5,000 grant from the Lotteries Board for this project. Along with additional donations this is enough to cover the cost of the plaques themselves. However, they still need to find around \$11,000 for their installation.

crop so he is hopeful he will get through the next five weeks until harvest time without army work taking hold. He is also growing millet.

Jared said on his farm "We are knuckling down and using our silage. We have enough to last until the end of March.

He is hopeful there will be some good rainfall before then as this will be needed for good grass growth before winter.

Jared practices a less intensive style of farming, relying solely on grass grown on the farm. From November he milks the herd just once a day.

He said that small amounts of rain after dry conditions are not helpful as this can stimulate the growth of the pasture fungus that causes facial eczema so is hopeful that when the rain does come it will be a significant amount. Jared said the cooler overcast weather of last week had been welcome as it slowed down the drying of the pasture and gave

his cattle some relief from the heat.

Bream Bay water contractors say they are busy but not frantically so, perhaps as there is a second supplier in the form of The Water Guy on the scene this year.

Duncan Mackay of the Big Red Truck company said he is getting busier as the dry weather continues and he urges his customers to book in for a tanker load of water before their tanks are dry.

Suz Kinghorn and David Gray of *The Water Guy* say as this is their first year in business they have nothing to base a comparison on but they are getting a steady stream of orders.

Suz suggests people keep an eye on the water levels in their tanks and phone in for a load of water ahead of when it is desperately needed.

**Burglaries**

- A commercial site in Station Rd., Ruakaka was broken into overnight on 28 January. Some bull bars and a winch were stolen from a vehicle at the address.
- Police are investigating repeated burglaries of a residential property in Marsden Point Rd. and have taken from the house for forensic examination. Police ask people living near the Marsden Point Rd. and Salle Rd junction to keep a look out for any suspicious behaviour and to contact police with any concerns.

**Farmer finds carcass of partially butchered steer**

On or around 29 January a black angus steer was slaughtered on a McCathie Rd. farm. The offenders had begun to butcher the animal but had not completed the job, leaving the carcass for the farmer to find. Police would like to hear from anyone with information about this incident.

**Dangerous driving with excess breath alcohol on SH1**

On 31 January at 6pm Police stopped a vehicle on State highway One at Waipu. The driver, a 64-year-old man from West Auckland was arrested and charged with dangerous driving and driving with excess breath alcohol after he was breath tested and blew an alleged 706 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. The legal driving limit is 250 micrograms of alcohol. He will appear in the Whangarei District Court on 20 February.

**Family harm incident leads to arrest on multiple charges**

On 2 February Police were called to a family violence incident at Oruawharo, south of Kaiwaka. A 26-year-old Whangarei man attempted to flee Police and drive away from the scene. When breath tested by Police he blew an alleged 801 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. He was arrested on a charge of drunk driving, burglary and threatening to kill. He has been remanded in custody to appear in the North Shore District Court on 28 February.

**Attempted break in at Rec Centre**

On 2 February an attempt was made to break into the Ruakaka Recreation centre. The locks on the men's shed and the women's gymnasium were both damaged but no entry was gained. The offender also tore branches from a small Pohutukawa tree in the Recreation Centre compound. Security cameras captured footage of the vandal and would-be burglar at work.

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# Balance Agri Nutrients to build new customer service centre at storage facility at Marsden Point

Balance Agri Nutrients will be moving a large part of its Northland operation to Marsden Point.

The company is close to securing a site for the construction of a large coresteel building.

Mark Adams, the company's projects manager, said the building will be multi use. It will have a customer service centre and to supply customers south of Whangarei.

It will also be used as storage for products coming in through Northport.

A third use will be to take the overflow of granulated sulphur produced as a byproduct at the Marsden Point oil refinery, when the refinery's storage for this product is at capacity.

Mr. Adams could not say yet exactly where the new warehouse and service centre would be built as negotiations were ongoing with the site owner.

He said it needed to be a big site capable of storing 8,000 tonnes of product. The building would be a large Coresteel structure and construction is expected to be completed by the end of this financial year.

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## A shortage of bus seats for students travelling to schools in Whangarei

Parents are having to make private arrangements to get their children to secondary schools in Whangarei. The Leabourn's bus company runs a 22 seater bus to Whangarei Girls and Boys High Schools each day charging \$500 for a term pass. However, at the start of term this bus was full to capacity with no available seats for some students.

Lyndon Leabourn the bus company's General Manager said on Monday 11 February, there were eight students on a waiting list. However he was working on a solution with one of the company's driver undergoing some extra training to qualify to drive a bigger bus.

Some years ago Ritchies also ran a service using buses it brings workers from Whangarei to the Marsden Point Oil Refinery to backload students up to Whangarei. At present one of the three buses travelling on weekday mornings from Whangarei to the Refinery is used to take students up to Pompallier Catholic College on a Ministry of Education funded run. However, the other two buses can only pick up students outside the area zoned by the Ministry of Education as Bream Bay College territory.

Bream Bay College Principal Wayne Buckland said, "Ritchies is our bus contractor, they do not provide cross busing in their school zones unless it is a complete charter service."

Anyway this will all become irrelevant in the next few weeks as the Marsden Point Refinery is changing the

structure of its shifts.

Jack Bowman Ritchies' Whangarei operations manager said from 1 March, instead of working four day, 10-hour shifts, refinery staff will work five, eight-hour days a week and the buses will need to arrive at Marsden Point later than at present at around 7.45am which does not leave enough time to pick up students in Ruakaka and get them up to Whangarei before the start of the school day.

Mr. Bowman said Ritchies has had to organize a separate bus for the Pompallier College run.

Meanwhile Mr. Buckland suggested, "A more interesting question is why Bream Bay College is not allowed to remove its enrolment zone, which means that an out of zone enrolment does not count for property space. Because of roll growth, the school was required to put in an enrolment zone."

He said Whangarei Girls and Boys High schools, Tuararoa Area School and Otamatea College can all enroll students from Bream Bay and get allocated roll growth classrooms for these students, Bream Bay College, because it has an enrolment zone, does not get this entitlement.

He said, Bream Bay College has looked at running a bus or two to bring students from Whangarei but the Ministry of Education will not treat Bream Bay College in the same way as it does the above-mentioned schools.

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## Ruakaka only school with roll increase

The large number of new residential properties built in Bream Bay in the past year hasn't resulted in a corresponding growth in the number of children attending local schools.

The start of year rolls of both Waipu Primary and One Tree Point Primary schools have dropped significantly and of Bream Bay College slightly in comparison with 2018 start of term one rolls

Ruakaka Primary by contrast started the year with a roll of 250, 23 more children than it began with last year.

Last Monday the roll at Waipu Primary was 208, compared to 228 at the start of 2018. One Tree Point school started the 2019 school year with 207 children down by 17 on its 2018 start of year roll.

Bream Bay College had 550 students enrolled on Tuesday, seven less than it did in 2018 and reversing a steady growth trend the school has been experiencing for the past few years.

The popularity of Ruakaka Primary's bilingual classes is one reason for the school growth.

Falling rolls at Waipu and One Tree Point schools may be due to the high cost of housing in these areas putting them outside the affordability range for many families with children.

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# Ruakaka Educare children and staff move into new centre

A blessing ceremony at the new Bream Bay Educare Centre early on Monday 4 February morning prepared the way for staff and children to move into their new building this week.

The new centre will cater for up to 85 children – 35 more than at the old premises and has separate play areas, inside space and bathroom for younger (up to two years) and for the older children.

In one corner of the play area is a whare, which head teacher Lisa Hayward explained is where they hold karakia asking each morning that the day goes well.

There is also a puppet theatre and a fort, a sand pit, a water feature, which can be turned on and off, shade sails overhead and soft fall material underfoot. Shrubs have been planted and grass turf laid.

Several big logs and some play equipment that

were in the playground of the old centre have been brought across from the old site so the children will find some familiar items when they move in. The children and staff have been watching excitedly from across the Takutai Place car park as the new building went up and the playground was built and have made frequent trips across to observe the cranes and trucks at work on the site.

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

# Vandalism “heartbreaking” after many hours of volunteer work by the community

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The Department of Conservation is frustrated at the repeated vandalism to the fence on the seaward side of the sand dunes at the Peter Snell pedestrian beach access. Last week DOC staff had a look at the latest damage inflicted on the fence, trying to work out a way to prevent this happening again.

Two years ago an illegal vehicle entrance here was blocked off with a line of rocks along the roadside and the wooden fence was built to block vehicles at the seaward edge of the dunes.

A defined pedestrian access track was formed, the dune was rebuilt and members of the Bream Bay Coastal Care Trust and other volunteers have been working

under the guidance of Laura Shaft, the Northland Regional Council’s Coastcare Co-coordinator to plant native dune binding species.

Comparison of an aerial photo taken before the restoration began and one taken recently show how successful the work has been with pingao and spinifex spreading over the loose white sand. However, this could all be destroyed if vehicles begin to drive over the dunes once again.

The closure of the vehicle entrance was a combined effort by the NRC, the Whangarei District Council and the Department of Conservation and the wooden fence was built by the WDC to support a new vehicle free zone south of the Ruakaka River Mouth. However, as the fence is on Department of Conservation land, its repair and maintenance falls on this agency.

Robyn Hembry, a spokesperson for Bream Bay Coastal Care, said “It is quite unbelievable the wonton damage to our beach and dunes. To see this damage after the hours of voluntary work put into restoring the dunes and beach is heart breaking. I would imagine the children from the local primary school who participated in planting, would be very disappointed to learn of the vandalism.”

Robyn noted that a post has been removed from the fence, which would have required brute force or a vehicle.

She asks that anyone who sees the vandals in action or vehicles driving in the vehicle free zone between the Ruakaka estuary and the northern edge of the Ruakaka village to report to the Northland Regional Council hotline 0800 504 639, the Whangarei District Council – 430 4200 or the Ruakaka Police with full details and a photo if possible.

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# A 70 year old motocross champion

Neil Boniface returned to Waipu from Wanganui earlier this month with his third gold medal from the New Zealand Masters Games Motocross event. He first entered the event in 2004 taking part in the over 50s race which he won. He went back in 2013 to compete in the over 60s competition which he also won and on 3 February 2019 competed in the over 65s class. Neil, who is aged 70 years, won all three of the races in the event; although he admits he had to ride hard to beat one of the other competitors.

Aren't all those jumps a bit hard on a 70-year-old body? The secret Neil says is to keep fit. He exercises on a cross trainer and works three days a week at ITM "throwing timber around" as he loads up trucks. He first rode motocross as a 27-year-old living in Invercargill and says he practiced the sport for 12 years and won "some quite good trophies". He gave the sport up for 50 years before trying the Masters Games. He urges every local sportsperson over the age of 35 to have a go at the Masters, which are held on alternate years in Dunedin or in Wanganui. "Every sport imaginable is represented there and it's a great atmosphere." After his success at the 2013 games Neil decided it was time to give the sport away and bought himself a rally car instead. But he says he just couldn't get the same thrills he gets out of motocross. The jumps might not be as high in the veteran classes as they are for the young riders but Neil says that doesn't matter. He still finds it exciting and what he might lack in youthful strength he makes up for by going about the race "a bit more tactically."

On the starting line in the over 65s class it's "all very humorous." "Someone will say 'Did you bring your lunch' but when the flag goes down that all changes."

Neil is coaching four local youngsters on a track he has built at his home. He says he likes to be giving something back to the sport. He regularly attends Thursday night practices at the Maungaturoto motocross track and plans to take part in the Northland Competition due to be held there on 3 March. He will be competing against 35 year olds whom he doesn't think he has much chance of beating but he says the competition will be good for him. Later this year he plans to compete at the Nationals. He thinks he will try the 60s plus age group, which he expects, will have a bigger field and stiffer competition.

We enjoy coming to shows like this. Its good to support the various charities they collect funds for.


