Liquidation of construction company leaves people worried about the security of their home build deposits

A number of local families and individuals are worried about the security of their savings with the liquidation of Jason Bennett Builders Ltd and his company JB Cabins and Homes based in Lakeside Park Ruakākā. Rahui Gupta has worked long hours making coffee and serving pastries at La Nonna Bakery at the Ruakākā roundabout on State Highway One to save up almost \$50,000 as a down payment for a house in Sunset Way off Marsden Point Rd. alongside the Encounter Church in Ruakaka. The construction of his house has not yet begun and he fears that his deposit, the result of three years of hard saving, has gone.


Dennaye Wright said she and her partner had paid out \$130,000 to one of Mr. Bennett's companies. They made a down payment in 2020 and then progress payments on a home the company had undertaken to build for them also in Sunset Way The partially built house has now been left with its framing exposed to the weather.

They have been in touch with another builder to see about the buildings completion. He told them that an

Fighting for Fair

It is always great to have a chance to speak with you directly via your very own Bream Bay News.

Did you know our government is paying the Three Waters Reform Chief Executives sala-

ries of up to \$815,500? And that current estimate for the establishment of the 10 new water entities is about \$3 billion?


Last year, Whangārei went to the High Court (alongside Waimakariri and Timaru District Councils) to question the meaning of 'community ownership', and in June 2023, we received the High Court ruling on the matter. In essence, they said they didn't feel they were the right body to make that decision – which is why we're now challenging this outcome at the Court of Appeal. With the value of our Three Water assets sitting at over \$800m (as of 30 June 2023), and with a replacement cost of \$1.4b (as at 30 June 2022), the outcome will have a big impact on the future of all New Zealand councils within the planning processes.

We know we're not the only council with strong feelings about this situation, as we're one of 30 councils in 'Communities 4 Local Democracy', an action group representing around 1.2 million people from New Zealand, and now with the backing of the Auckland Council representing an additional 1.7 million people, takes the total to over 50% of the country.

If the Three Waters Reform goes ahead, the control of Whangarei District Council's water assets (and services) will be shifted to the Auckland based 'Entity A', which includes the Far North, Kaipara and Auckland Districts. As a result of our Council losing these assets from our balance sheets, we will no longer be receiving water rates from our District, and we will no longer be able to borrow against the income we receive from those water-associated rates. This could have an impact on our credit rating, which would mean we may not be able to get the low interest rates we're used to. In effect, our Council is not only losing a lot of income, but we may also be losing the ability to secure lower-interest rate loans for future projects. This is bad news for Whangārei District. While other Districts may need more support from central government to help manage their Three Waters asset debt, we're in a completely different situation.

I'll leave you with one last question. Imagine if that estimated \$3 billion being spent on the new 10 water entities was actually spent on fixing our country's water issues, wouldn't that make more sense right now?

We are well looked after

I seem to have undergone so many health checks lately. Not because I am unwell. Just routine stuff that is offered to people of my age. After a bit of nagging in the form of letters and text messages from t Te Whatu Ora – the Ministry of Health I went up to the breast testing clinic in Whangārei for a mammogram. I turn 70 next year, which is the age these tests finish at and I was thinking, "Great, I won't have to bother about that anymore."

When I got home, however, there was a letter asking me to take part in a bowel cancer-screening programme. I went along with it as, although I prefer not to dwell too much on my digestive system or to think about the possibility of cancer, I know it is wise to take advantage of such screening opportunities when they are offered and I did feel a bit bad about all the notifications I had ignored from the breast cancer screening clinic before I responded.

Then from the Bream Bay Medical Centre I get a request to come in for a blood, and blood pressure tests to make sure the blood pressure medication I take is doing its job.

Earlier this year I had a Covid vaccination booster and a flu vaccination, both provided at the medical centre so I feel pretty well cared for.

Doctor John Chapman and General Practice Nurse Karen Chapman are stepping back from their leading roles in the Bream Bay and Marsden Cove Medical Centres. I congratulate them on what they have achieved in setting up and maintaining these practices.

There are no fewer that nine general practitioners listed on the Bream Bay Medical Centre website, which is surprising when you understand how difficult it can be to attract GPs to rural practices. Most of these doctors I believe work part time and they work between the two centres. I imagine allowing people to put in as many or as few hours as they want to helps the Bream Bay Medical Centre maintain such high staffing levels. My brother in the Far North tells me he sometimes has to wait six weeks to see a doctor, so I am grateful for the availability of a doctor when we need one here in Bream Bay.

Another aspect of the Bream Bay Medical Centre practice that impresses me is how streamlined it has become. If I need to renew my prescription I phone up and leave a message on the medical centre answerphone and then, miraculously, I get a text from Orrs Ruakākā Pharmacy to say there is a box of pills waiting for me. I did wonder at first about the reliability of this system but it has never let me down and I am routinely asked to come in for checkups so I get good medical oversight. I can view the results of all those tests on my telephone by logging into the portal Manage My Health without taking up valuable nurse or doctor time.

Nursing staff enjoy the same flexibility as do the doctors and several have commented to me that another reason they stick with the BB Medical Centre is its supportive work environment. Maintaining this happy workplace atmosphere is a difficult skill in itself.

It seems now that Doctor John and Karen Chapman are able to step away from the practices and they will continue to run smoothly without them, which is another impressive achievement.

These two dedicated medical professionals have been working in Ruakākā for 38 years. We have a lot to be grateful to them both for, not least that we have an on going well staffed, well run general practice service here in Bream Bay.

inspection which should have been carried out on the buildings piles never took place and that the work they had paid \$130,000 for was only worth around \$66,000.

A notice of appointment of liquidators for Jason Bennett Builders Ltd. trading as JB Cabins and Homes and JB Frames and Trussess was published in the NZ Gazette on 18 July and advises the creditors to make their claims know by 10 September 2023.

However, Dennaye and her husband] had a contract with another of Mr. Bennett's companies - Bream Bay Construction Ltd. The ownership of this company was transferred from Jason Bennett to his partner Natalia Kot three days before Mr. Bennett's other companies went into liquidation.

It's not just prospective homeowners left smarting

Garth Mortensen of North sawn Lumber said Jason Bennett owned his company a significant sum of money.

"He burned us big time."

The Waipu Ttmber Mill Northpine is waiting to be paid for a small consignment of timber purchased by Bream Bay Construction. Company Director Bruce Larsen said, although this company was not officially in liquidation, he would be in contact with the liquidators and attempting to recover the timber that has not been paid for.

Dennaye has tried to get in touch with Jason Bennett and Natalia Kot to no avail and has heard rumours they have left the country.

The Bream Bay News also tried calling the advertised JB Frames and Trusses number only to get a recorded message to say the number is not currently in use. We also called around at the company's former base in Lakeside Park Road, Ruakākā to find a padlocked gate.

A perfect morning for a big concrete pour



The concrete floor of the new Ruakākā Community Wellbeing Building is poured on a cold fine morning on Tuesday August 1. Darryl Trigg whose company Trigg Construction has the contract for the project said conditions were perfect and even some light rain later in the day was helpful.

Tuesday morning 1 August was cold and clear, perfect for a big concrete pour to lay down the floor for the new Ruakākā Recreation Centre building. The concreting team from Trigg Construction had been at the site from 5am.

Thirty-two truckloads: 160 cubic metres of concrete were poured onto the prepared foundations and the team was kept busy spreading it out and smoothing it down.

Watching over all this were Christine Thirling, the Recreation Centre Manager, who had worked long and hard over eight years securing funding for the project and Darryl Trigg CEO of the construction company. A planned pour the previous week had to be called off when rain was forecast.

The cool weather though on the first morning of August was ideal, as the concrete didn't set too quickly and even some light showers later in the day were helpful as the concrete had set by then and at that stage needed to be watered to ensure it cured slowly and didn't crack or shrink.



The project got underway in 2020 with a \$2.5 million grant from the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment back in 2020. The Whangārei District Council agreed to allocate \$1 million towards a new carpark alongside after strong public submission from Ruakākā residents in its 2021 -2031 Long Term Plan. This has since been added to with a \$900,000 grant from Foundation North and a further \$800,000 grant that came from Central Government via the Whangarei District Council with some money that was made available under the Three Waters Reform Better Off funding."

Project manager Paul McDonald said the extra funding was needed because of price escalations that have occurred since the project was first proposed in 2019. The new building will include: a community room, a unisex and women's gym space, an office, a small meeting room, storage space and a kitchen.

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

The old course out to the bar went around by the Ruakaka Domain Beach Holiday Park and around the edge of the bird sanctuary dunes on the Bream Bay drive side of the river.

However, since Gabriel that has all changed and the main Ruakaka river chanel instead of veering to the right opposite the campground now veers to the left alongside the Dwparment of Conservation land on the left. 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Police Report

Observant neighbour helps police catch burglar

A 33-year-old Far North Man will be appearing in the Whangārei District court on 14 August. He is facing 15 charges, including breaking the conditions of his release from prison. He has been remanded in custody.

More than twice over the limit

A 38 – year – old Ruakākā woman will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on a drink driving charge after she was stopped by Police while driving on Marsden Point Rd at 4.30pm on Sunday 30 July. When breath tested she returned a reading of 563 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath, more than twice over the limit of 250 micrograms for drivers aged 20 and over.

Concerned about Local Government Funding Agency

I wonder how many know about the" Local Government Funding Agency" that the Whangārei District Council has joined along with 30 other Councils around New Zealand. This agreement is a guarantee and indemnity document of 116 pages. This is an agency made up of overseas bankers that loan money. If WDC gets a loan from this agency to repay the debt they can hike the rates up or can legally confiscate your property because in the agreement are every ratepayer's land ID, information . We as ratepayers are at a risk of losing our properties if WDC can't repay the loan.

Extremely unlikey any risk to private property through NZLGFA borrowing

It is extremely unlikely that there would be any risk to private property through borrowing with the NZLGFA.

The NZLGFA was incorporated in December 2011 with the purpose of providing debt funding to local authorities in New Zealand, and it has a current credit rating from Standard and Poors of AA-.

Membership of the NZLGFA enables Councils to save significant interest costs and to borrow over longer terms that in the general market.

Council is a shareholder of The New Zealand Local Government Funding Agency (NZLGFA). Central Government is a 20% shareholder in the LGFA which has 63 guarantors.

Council uses debt as a funding source for the development of major assets to allow us to share the cost across all users; in other words all the people using an asset pay for it over its lifetime. The spreading of costs over multiple years is known as 'inter-generational equity'.

Five months after cyclone storm water outflow pipe has not yet been repaired

This damaged outflow pipe on the beach at Ruakaka near Te Kamo St. is still waiting to be repaired by the Whangarei District Council five months after the concrete pipes were broken by the heavy seas generated by Cyclone Gabrielle.

Stormwater flowing out onto the beach here continues to cause further erosion of the dunes behind and now there is a further concern that the



orange plastic netting placed around it to prevent people falling into the hole has been damaged and pieces of orange plastic are likely to end up in the sea.

The Mair Rd and Te Kamo St sets of wooden stairs swept away in the storm are also still to be replaced. The Department of Conservation has a plan to install some sand ladders but is waiting on materials from suppliers.

Just as the Bream Bay News was heading to the printer we got word from the Whangarei District Council that contractors would be at the beach tomorrow (Tuesday 15 August) to clear away the broken concrete.



Government gives go ahead for detailed design of Marsden Point Rail Link

Kiwi Rail has been given Government go ahead to develop a detailed design for the Marsden Point Rail Link.

In a press release last week Northland Rail Upgrade Programme Director Eric Nennephof said this will include "engineering investigations into geo-technical (below ground conditions), track, signaling, flood modeling, drainage design, earthworks, and confirmation of construction delivery methodology."

He said the design work would focus as much on how to build quickly and cost effectively, as the technical design itself. It will also allow Kiwi Rail to establish how much work could be delivered by local firms. Mr. Hennephof said, "This is an important step forward for the Marsden Point Rail Link project, and we will be engaging with mana whenua and other stakeholders about it in the weeks and months ahead." The detailed design is expected to take at least 18 months to complete



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Ruakākā Community Library launches an appeal to buy sets of readers to boost literacy in local schools

The Ruakākā Community Library is hoping local business and individuals will support an appeal it is launching to support a Structured Literacy programme in local schools.

Shirley Winters, Principal of One Tree Point Primary School and the leader of Bream Bay Kahui Ako (Community of Learning) is convinced that using a Structured Literacy approach, which focuses on the structure of language where children learn about sound – syllable correspondences and syntax is a more effective way to teach children to read.

Carla McNeil, who runs a company called Learning Matters, which supplies structured reading texts, said throughout New Zealand 20% of children failed to learn to read and claims that scientific research into how the human brain acquires the ability to read unequivocally supports this method of teaching.

Shirley described how children who were struggling to learn to read fluently have been helped by the structured reading approach.

She said One Tree Point School had spent \$25,000 (funds raised by the school's PTA) on Structured Literacy readers. These contain sets of words which children are able to decode having already learned what the letters and syllables in those words signify.

Deputy Principal Gemma Bradford said children are excited at finding they can read these books. The method worked well for children with dyslexia but was effective for all children.

Teacher and team leader Pam Weir said One Tree Point School struggled to get enough structured literacy texts at the various reading levels required. She said buying whole sets of the readers is expensive and there is a constant need for copies to be replaced as they get lost or damaged. Sometimes teachers had resorted to photocopying the booklets.

Asked if Structured Literacy is supported by the Ministry of Education, Carla said the ministry "is moving in this direction."

For the past several decades the most widely used method of teaching children to read in New Zealand has been what is known as "Balanced literacy" which includes word study, memorization of high-frequency words, and leveled reading texts where children are encouraged to use context, grammatical features and letters and sounds to decipher words they don't immediately recognize. In Balanced Literacy, there is a greater focus on using pictures or context to identify meaning in the text.

Kāhui Āko - Communities of Learning were initiated The Bream Bay News sent a query to the Ministry by the Ministry of Education in 2014 where schools in of Education asking about the need to fund raise to

a defined geological area work collaboratively holding joint teacher training days and sharing human and physical resources. Waipu, Ruakākā, One Tree Point Primary Schools and Bream Bay College all belong to the Bream Bay Kāhui Ako. Funds raised by the Ruakaka Library appeal will go towards purchasing readers for all these schools.

Sharon Booth, Chairwoman of the Ruakākā Library, is enthusiastic. She said, "This is such a great project for the whole of Bream Bay so whatever we can do to get as many people and businesses involved the more our children will benefit."

"This fund will support all four Bream Bay schools, so we are hoping to get as much support as possible from Waipu as well as One Tree Point, Ruakaka and Takahiwai

She said donations can be dropped off at the library and is also planning to set up a bank deposit arrangement. The Bream Bay News sent a query to the Ministry of Education asking about the need to fund raise to purchase these sets of readers and received a reply from Pauline Cleaver, the Ministry's Associate Deputy Secretary, for Curriculum, Pathways and Progress.

She said, "We have released a series of readers for young students called 'phonics plus". This series was introduced to strengthen the explicit teaching of literacy. Schools receive these books free of charge. Supplementary resources will be provided to teachers to ensure they have a suite of tools for working with students.

"We will also soon be releasing the Common Practice Model (CPM). The purpose of the CPM is for the Ministry to share with teachers the evidence-based approaches to teaching literacy and maths from the first years at schools – when it is important young children build the skills needed to 'crack the code' – right through to the more senior years. This approach will help to ensure all young people grow the literacy skills they need for future study, work and life."

Ban on cell phone use in classrooms at Bream Bay College "has helped somewhat" says Deputy Principal Mark Bayer

With all the discussion around a cell phone ban at schools as proposed by the National Party we asked Bream Bay College Deputy Principal Mark Bayer how a ban put in place at the college a year ago had worked.

Mark said while phones are meant to be kept in students' bags they did pop out from time to time but the ban "has helped somewhat."

He said there is also an issue with students looking at social media sites on their tablets and laptops, which they use for their schoolwork.

Mr. Bayer said, "The vibe is currently very positive

around the College, however and we plan to keep it that way".

This was mostly due to other factors though such as the arrival of a new principal and the new science labs and year seven and eight classrooms.

Former Principal Wayne Buckland decided to bring in the ban at the start of the third term of 2022 after a visit by educational psychologist Kathryn Berkett who said people can become addicted to social media and video games and that video games can encourage violence and risky behaviour.

She suggested that if teenagers become distressed

when asked to hand over their phones or leave them in a designated place outside their bedrooms overnight they are possibly showing signs of addiction.

Mr. Buckland said the no phones policy was in response to concerns about phones being a distraction, being used for cyber-bullying and preventing healthy face to face communication between students."

He said cell phones were useful at school when students did not have other devices such as laptops and chrome books but now all students have these.

Julian Cosgrove - Bream Bay College's new Principal "This is a really well set up school and students here have lots of opportunities."

Julian Cosgrove, the new Principal of Bream Bay College said he is happy with his move north. He is now living in One Tree Point with his partner and two young daughters and the family is settling in well.

He comes from a position as Deputy Principal of Kelston Boys High School in west Auckland. He grew up in Wellington and has a degree majoring in History and Anthropology. He has taught geography and history and says he has sometimes "pretended to be a physed teacher.'

He has played both rugby and cricket.

"You had to be into sport to teach at Kelston Boys High."

These days he exercises taking group classes at a gym, which he says is also a good way to socialize outside of the school environment.

He likes what he has seen of Bream Bay College so far.

He came up to have a look when he heard about the principal's job coming available.

Retiring Principal Wayne Buckland showed him around and he was impressed by all the new classrooms and by the staff and students.

He said he has found "a warm staff environment" and he has been made to feel very welcome.

A big consideration for Julian and his family was travel time between here and Auckland. His dad and a sister and her family live in Auckland and his mother in Thames. He taught at Kerikeri High School from 2014 to 2018 but found that the distance made trips south to visit whanau infrequent and his young children had to relearn their relationships with their cousins. aunty, uncle and grandparents on each visit. He thinks the relatively short trip between Bream Bay and Auckland is much more manageable.

His oldest daughter is enrolled in a Māori immersion class at Ruakākā Primary while his youngest child is at the Marsden Child Care Centre.

He said, "We are a pakeha family but we are keen for our children to be bilingual. We live in New Zealand so we want them to be able to speak Te Reo Maori" He said he and his partner were really pleased with

what they saw at Ruakākā Primary with "happy attentive faces" in all the classes they visited. He was the leader of a Kahui Ako Community of

Learning Group in Kelston and has held a meeting with the Bream Bay group comprising this areas three primary schools and the college. He said the Bream Bay Kahui Ako already has a number of successful collaborations in place and is further down the track with than the Kelston grouping.

He is pleased to see local schools working together

and supporting one another rather than then traditional situation with schools competing for students. He said this demonstration of co-operation and helping each other to achieve sets a good example for students.

He has good impression of all three local primary schools and thinks it bodes well for Bream Bay College that its three feeder schools are so well run.

He acknowledges the importance of Patuharakeke as well as the rich Scottish history of Waipu and says recognition of these cultural backdrops are important aspects of a community Kura. He sees Auckland as "a big melting pot with many different cultures" while by contrast here there are some clear cultural guides of who we are in this community.

Asked his thoughts on the large number of students who bus out of Bream Bay to schools in Whangārei and elsewhere he said this happens everywhere.

"In west Auckland I could walk out into the street and see school uniforms from all over Auckland. We don't want them to go though. We hope that they will make the decision to stay with us and to realize they can stay in their community school, enjoy their time here and thrive.

"There are a lot of really good healthful activities for kids to get involved in at Bream Bay College.

"Just this week we have had a visiting theatre group, an in-house volleyball competition. Last week we hosted students and teachers from our sister school - Higashi Senior School in Japan. There are surfing trips and many sports teams.

This is a really well set up school and students here have lots of opportunities."

Stu is a former resident of Albany Road. Paul said when he called in to Land and Sea a few weeks ago he had one of those "I know you from somewhere moments." Two opportunities to meet general election candidates

Candidates standing in the Whangarei Electorate in the 14 October New Zealand General Election have been invited to speak at a public meeting in the Waipu Presbyterian Hall at 7pm on Thursday 21 September. To date Shane Reti - National, Angie Warren Clarke - Labour, Rick Bazely - Greens, Gavin Benney -New Zealand First and Diane Burgess - Democracy

NZ have accepted the invitation. There may be more, as nominations don't close until

15 September. The evening is being jointly organised by Promote Waipu and the Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association.

Names ill be drawn from a hate to establish the speaking order and each candidate will be given nine minutes to set our their respective partys' policies and to say why they would be the best person to represent the elctorate of Whangarei in Parliament.When this round is completed there will be an opportunity to ask questions from the floor.

Supper will be served afterwards giving attendees a chance to chat with the candidates.

The Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association will also be organising a Meet the Candidateds evening. This has not been set in concrete yet but is likely to be on Tuesday 12 September, the date of the RRRA next monthly meeting at 7pm upstairs in the Ruakākā Recreation Centre.

Ruakākā solar farm viability still under investigation

The viability of the 200 - hectare solar farm planned by Meridian Energy for farmland alongside Marsden Point Rd., including land across the road from the Ruakākā Towncentre is still under investigation.

Benjamin Mossman, Renewable Development Programme Manager for Meridian said the energy generator and retailing company had "gone to market" to see if there was interest from contractors and had a good response. The next stage would be to seek costings.

He said a solar contractor in Australia would be likely to lead the project, as it was important to use a company with experience in solar farm development. However, there would be lots of work for subcontractors and the involvement of the Australian company would provide a good opportunity for local contractors to gain experience in this field. He said this could be useful as there are likely to be more solar farms built in Northland.

The suitability of the site is also being tested with panels in place to test the amount of salt spray landing there. Drainage issues would need to be addressed and some of the hollows in the topography filled in so that machinery can easily be driven along rows of panels while maintenance is underway.

Meanwhile up at the Port Marsden Highway and Rama Road intersection preparation of the platform for the Battery Electricity Storage System - BESS is well underway. The site has been raised to withstand a one in a 1,000-year flood event. A layer of brown rock will be spread over the platform and cabling would be laid to connect its 80 batteries, all housed in shipping containers, to the nearby Bream Bay Sub Station.

Electricity will be taken from the grid and stored when the hydro lakes in the South Island are full and would help to reduce New Zealand's dependency on carbon fuel generation. The Ruakākā Energy Park storage system will be capable of storing 100 megawatts of electricity, enough to supply the whole of Northland's 60,000 homes with two hours of energy on a cold night. Completion date for the BESS project is expected to be September of 2023.

Ruakākā Town Centre's stormwater drainage project is in preparation for future development

The drainage work being undertaken on farmland along Marsden Point Rd. opposite the Ruakākā Towncentre although on or alongside the Meridian land purchased for the proposed solar farm is being undertaken by Town Centre Properties, the owner of the Ruakaka shopping centre.

Ken Orr a director of this company said it was "a big piece of work" providing better storm water drainage for the whole shopping complex as well Takutai Place and extending to include the site of the Marsden Tavern.

Three big concrete refuse traps have been installed alongside the roadway to capture rubbish blowing into the drain before the stormwater enters the Ruakākā River.

Mr. Orr said it made sense for the drainage work to take into account future development.
