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## Police swoop on Ruakākā base of alleged crime syndicate

A tip-off from Customs and a six-month-long investigation by the newly established Northland District Police Organised Crime Unit has led to the arrest of members of what is alleged by Police to be a major crime syndicate whose key leaders; all members of the Headhunters Motorcyle Gang and the Mongrel Mob, were living in Ruakākā and Takahiwai

Police units from around Northland and Auckland swooped on six residential properties in Kepa Rd and Takahiwai at around 10am last Friday 12 November in a major operation involving the Police helicopter and numerous Customs and Police officers.

Search warrants also took place in Morningside, Rāwhiti, and Whananaki, as well as in Rotorua.

Eleven men aged between 27 and 56, and a 25-year-old woman were arrested.

Other charges include conspiring to import methamphetamine, MDMA (ecstasy) and pseudoephedrine, as well as participating in an organised crime group. Overall 17kg of methamphetamine, 5.44kg of MDMA and a kg of pseudoephedrine were seized, with a combined street value of \$8m. Police also seized around \$240,000 worth of assets, including a motorbike, boat and vehicles, under the Criminal Proceeds (Recovery) Act.

Nine of the 12 appeared in the Whangārei District Court on Saturday 13 November and to face a raft of serious drugs charges relating to the importation, man-

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

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### **EDITORIAL**

## Surprisng how long it has taken to blow open the Ruakākā based drug syndicate

Ruakākā and Takahiwai have apparently been the epicenter of a crime syndicate importing drugs from overseas and distributing them throughout Northland. Many local people have suspected this was going on for some time. The most surprising thing is how long it has taken to blow it wide open. There is a certain fascination we have with these gangsters. They drive around in big black cars and. They throw money around and seemed (until last Friday) to have magical powers of avoiding Police detection. It's all very glamorous and entertaining until your child, who once held so much promise, becomes entangled in the web of drug dependency and criminality they are spinning.

I am shaking my head in disbelief at the woman who, attempting to evade the Police barricade at Te Hana, drove along the beach at Mangawhai and got her vehicle stuck in the sand right on the boundary of the wild life reserve. She had a dog in the car with her and right alongside where they both spent the night shorebirds, including fairy tern, which are on the brink of extinction are nesting. What was she thinking? I imagine she had some desperate human need. I feel this a bit myself. I haven't seen my three grandsons, who all live in Auckland for nearly four months. She probably didn't know about or see those tiny birds hunkering down to protect their eggs, amongst the shells in little scrapes in the sand.

I am a protester from way back. When I was 16-years-old I helped organise a march to protest against New Zealand's involvement in the Vietnam War in my home town of Dargaville. I joined the anti-apartheid marches and the Nuclear Free New Zealand movement. I believed passionately in all these causes. But these protests for personal freedoms so the Covid 19 virus can be spread far and wide - what are they about? The crazy things these people are saying - its like some dangerous, parasitic worm has got inside their brains. I find myself agreeing with Hone Harawira who on RNZ this morning described these protestors as *freedums*. If I were to take up another protest banner it would be to urge our government, governments around the world and people in general to take stronger action to halt climate change. This is the biggest and most important challenge of all. I wish these demanding freedum people would stop grabbing so much attention and wasting everyone's time.

After having to cancel the Ruakākā skateboard competition twice, once because we were in Level 3 Covid 19 lockdown and then because of the weather we finally got to hold it on Saturday 6 November. After all the fun events and activities that have had to be called off it was good to finally get something off the ground. We were treated to a fantastic display of skating expertise. I hope some of the local children took inspiration from this and will practice their tricks for the next competition. Who knows, one of them could become an Olympic champion.

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## Not much support for Oruku Landing proposal at Ruakākā Have Your Say event

Lots of people turned up to the Whangārei District Council's "Have Your Say on the Oruku Landing evening on Monday night 8 November: so many in fact that there wasn't room to accommodate them all, along with Covid 19 social distancing requirements and all the councillors and staff on hand to jot down people's comments, in the upstairs lounge room of the Ruakākā Recreation Centre.

Around 20 people who hadn't realized they needed to pre registered to attend held a separate meeting outside the front door of the centre with some Council staff remaining outside to answer their questions.

Peter Hope, one of those kept out of the meeting asked if it was correct that the Council had sold a parcel of land the Oruku conference centre would be built on four years ago for \$1.4 million and now was considering buying a portion of it back for \$10 million.

"What great business skills", he commented.

Upstairs at the main meeting Simon Weston, the WDC's General Manager of Infrastructure, was running through the pros and cons of the Oruku proposal. High on the pros list is that this is a one-off opportunity to secure \$60 million of central government funding.

He said the Government needed an answer from the Council about whether it was willing to take up the offer and commit to a further \$57 million by 30 November, which is why the consultation was so rushed.

He told the meeting the cost of building the centre had gone up by \$13.5 million in the latest set of estimates and the Council would need to underwrite the project against further price rises.

The planned structure for the Ruakākā consultation event was that after listening to Mr. Weston, attendees would have the opportunity to talk to WDC Councillors who were seated along one side of the room with two staff members each to help them record comments.

However, Chris Townsend said he would be interested to hear the views of other people in the audience and this is the main reason he had come to the meeting. Mr. Weston agreed to a question and answer session.

Barry Pyle said he would like to hear some opposing views. For example he wanted to learn more about an alternative proposal to convert the old Forum North building into a theatre.

Mr. Western said, "We wouldn't have the \$60million Government Funding to do this."

Mr. Pyle replied, "That's OK"

Mr. Townsend asked what the parking availability would be on the site.

Mr. Weston said there was not much space for a car park but perhaps a shuttle service could be arranged to bring people to the centre from the CBD.

Mr. Townsend also pointed out that the one off 6% rate increase would remain and be compounding on ongoing rate charges.

"We are not going to get a minus rates increase for the following year."

Warren Daniel, a long time secretary of the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association said he was concerned that expenditure on the Oruku Landing development would result in other projects listed in the Council's Long Term Plan having to be dropped.

Hamish Fryer asked how much money had been spent on the project so far.

Mr. Weston said the Council had put in \$1 million and the Government had matched

ufacturing, and supply of methamphetamine.

They were remanded in custody and were granted interim name suppression

Between March 2020 and June 2021, Customs officers intercepted 15 separate air cargo or mail consignments and found drugs hidden in books, clothing and framed art.

Detective Inspector
Bridget Doell of the
Northland CIB (Criminal Investigations
Branch) said the syndicate's offending spread
across New Zealand

"Its members have allegedly tried to import, manufacture or on-sell drugs into the Northland market, which currently has some of the highest drug use per capita

wastewater readings in New Zealand."

She said methamphetamine use is a major driver of crime across Northland and that "drug users are known to commit high volume crimes - such as car thefts, burglaries, and fraud – in a bid to fund their drug habits."

"Criminal groups hurt communities by exploiting people's drug addictions. They have little regard for the devastation or harm caused to vulnerable people in our community. Having a relative, friend, or neighbour who is addicted to methamphetamine doesn't just affect them, it affects everyone around them, and the impact is significant."

this with a further \$1 million to investigate the project. Debbie Walters said she was angry that this much public money had been spent without any consultation. She felt there should be more information available.

"How is the average person who hasn't looked into the background of this going to make a decision?"

Neil Troost said some people he knew who were planning to build a house had found the cost had gone up by 20% in the months it took to prepare for the build "We have learned tonight that the cost of this project has gone up by \$13.5million. Is this price increase going to be out of date by 30 November?"

Jules Flight said, "If you don't start work on projects like this than they don't happen. He said he had some reservations about this particular project but his experiences living in other New Zealand cities had left him feeling that "Whangārei has been left behind. We need to take advantages of opportunities that will help Whangārei catch up with the rest of New Zealand."

Stu Neil asked what benefit the Oruku Landing development would have for people living in Bream Bay. He said most of the benefits would go to those living in Whangārei and he asked how many conferences are being held in Whangārei and pointed out that the city already has a conference centre.

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
## **Bream Bay College** response

Bream Bay College Principal Wayne Buckland said the trees that were removed from the school boundary were wattle and acacia, which are weed species. Some had fallen over and were blocking the passage of the school mower.

Mr. Buckland said that the plan is to remove all the trees along that boundary to make way for a new fence. He explained that a high aluminum unclimbable fence, which would cost \$1 million, is to be built around the entire perimeter of the school to keep a special needs student safely inside. Once the fence is built a planting would be made along the border Mrs. Hicks is concerned about.

## A new exhibition acknowledges Tangata Whenua at the Waipu Scottish Migration Museum

There have been a number of gratifying developments at Waipu Museum over the past few months, but we are proud to announce two in particular.

Before any discussion of what has been happening it is important to understand the background to the current focus of the Museum and the historic story that it tells. The Museum was built in 1953 as a memorial to the original migrants and to house artefacts and the genealogy pertaining to the migration of almost 1000 Gaelic speaking Scots from Nova Scotia in the 1850s. The Museum was built in the style

of a highland croft and entirely funded by descendants of the Nova Scotian migration. They celebrated their history at a Centennial celebration in 1953 when the Museum was first opened and given the name "The House of Memories".

The original Nova Scotians had founded a successful farming and maritime community in Cape Breton following their departures from regions around the Scottish Highlands during the Highland Clearances. The community prospered for thirty years but was struck by the same potato famine that struck Ireland in the late 1840s. The story of their journeys and the eventual settling in Waipu is told in our Museum.

As part of the celebration of 150 years since the Nova Scotian arrival in Waipu an extension was built in 2003. Eventually, in 2008 a modern storytelling, world class exhibition was opened which focused on telling the story of the migration from Scotland and then on to Waipu and other associated settlements. The central theme is one of the high levels of cooperation that was part of their Highland culture which enabled them to survive against challenging odds. At the time of selecting this theme, the Museum Board saw that this held important messages for today's world.

To retain this focus on the migration story and in order to clarify its central theme our current Museum Board has consulted with key stakeholders and chosen to expand the name to Waipu Scottish Migration Museum. Our research suggests that today's museum visitors are more interested in specific local stories. The Matakohe Kauri Museum has a similar local focus as does the Masterton Wool Museum.

The second but no less significant news is that we are proud to have finally moved forward to acknowledge and include elements of the story of Tangata Whenua. This has been a long time coming. A small but important exhibition has been created at the entrance to the current museum exhibition.

Patuharakeke are descended from a number of tribal groups who over many years have had interests and connections with Waipu. Their marae is situated at Takahiwai.

Waipu has been intensively inhabited at different periods and there are many recognised Pa sites that have been notified in the area. Come and visit the new exhibition to find out more.

Recently a wonderful collection of taonga was gifted to Patuharakeke for display at the Museum. These taonga were gathered over generations by the Cullen family from their farm in Te Waionehu valley. The collection has been gifted by well-known and revered local artist/ craftsman Lloyd Cullen.

The exhibition development was overseen by representatives of Patuharakeke with contributions from other hapū members and from Museum Volunteers. The wonderful skills used to fabricate the exhibition were provided by Bruce Hayes and Richard Cullen who have contributed their skills to a number of museum projects.

Due to the current Covid restrictions a small gathering attended a blessing for the exhibition, but when it is possible, we will be attributing to it the importance it holds for all of us, and we will hold a great celebration for all to share!

Eventually more great stories will be told both inside the museum and in the surrounding district.

Opportunities abound for dedicated volunteers for they are the life blood of preserved heritage!

## Vaccinations at the Takahiwai League Club

Ngātiwai Trust Board in partnership with Patuharakeke Trust Board, Takahiwai Marae and Takahiwai League Club held a twilight pop up vaccination clinic at the Takahiwai League Club on Tuesday 2 November. Two Ngāti Hine Health Trust mobile vans fitted out as clinics were parked up alongside the clubhouse from 4pm to 7pm with nurses administering 37 vaccinations in those three hours.

Inside the clubhouse Junie Shelford was singing to entertain the people sitting out their post vaccination waiting times. There were tables stacked

with bags of gifts including some rongoā Māori medicines for each person who received a vaccination and packs of hot hangi were being handed out. The names of vaccine recipients also went into a draw to win \$200 worth of petrol vouchers, a night for two at Oceans Resort in Tutukaka, \$200 worth of Soil & Sand Clothing or a UE Boom box.

Hūhana Lyndon, Raukura CEO of the Ngātiwai Trust Board said the Ngāti Hine Health Trust team had been working all day and had already delivered 80 vaccinations in Whangārei prior to coming to Takahiwai.

She said the vaccination vans are travelling around

Northland doing their best to ensure people in hard to reach communities are protected against Covid 19. This vaccination event was a part of the Ngātiwai Trust Board campaign called 'Ngātiwai ki te hoe' which reaches out across the Ngātiwai tribal territories providing twilight vaccination events to dive deep into coastal communities and provide access to vaccination services. The Ngātiwai Team will be returning to the league club in three weeks time to provide a second round of vaccinations for those who had received their first dose there last week.

## First fairy tern eggs of the season

The fairy tern nesting season 2021/2022 has begun A fairy tern nest on the Waipū sandspit has two eggs and a single egg has been laid in a nest at Papakānui on the Kaipara

Department of Conservation asks people to keep well away from taped off areas. Dogs should be kept out of the wildlife refuge – there is a sign on the beach just north of the campground to show where this begins. Recently DOC staff came across a vehicle with a woman and a dog inside parked at the entrance to the wildlife refuge an Mangawhai.

The woman had breached the COVID-19 Alert Level 3 border restriction to enter the area and had got

her vehicle stuck in the soft sand and had to stay overnight. She was escorted out of the reserve and police were notified. She will also be receiving a DOC infringement notice for breaching Northland reserves bylaws with a potential fine of \$800

Craig Deal, DOC operations manager Whangārei, said, "It's concerning to see such a blatant breach of wildlife refuge and COVID-19 border rules, especially with the tara iti / fairy tern breeding season just starting."

With fewer than 40 birds remaining, the tara iti/fairy tern is teteering on the brink of extinction

## Bird protection fence goes up



Steve Johnson and Xavier Watson took turns hammering in the posts while Luana Pirihi firmed up the sand around them. The 60 posts for the fence were donated by North Sawn Lumber.

Members of the Bream Bay Coastal Care group who look after the bird breeding area on the northern side of the Ruakākā Estuary were grateful for the help of the Patuharakeke Taio (Environmental ) Unit in getting a bird protection fence in place. It usually takes the coastal care volunteers weeks to carry fence battens from the racecourse beach entrance down to the estuary.

This spring the group gained Whangarei District Council permission for Ari Carrington, Taio Unit manager to bring his Four wheel drive ute onto the beach to transport the posts and Ari along with Xavier Watson and Steve Johnson hammered the posts into the sand in the space of an hour.

Oyster catchers and dotterel breed at the estuary and it is a high tide roost for thousands of godwits which migrate here each summer from Alaska.

Bream Bay Coastal Care asks for the cooperation of beach walkers in keeping outside the fenced in area. Dotterel and oystercatchers lay their eggs in small scrapes in the sand. If the parent birds are disturbed and leave their nests for even quite short intervals the eggs can overheat killing the chick inside.

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
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"My father was a paramedic and when I graduated high school, I was thinking about going into something medical. You can do this trekking across the Sahara or going on a ship across the Atlantic. So, it just opens up all these doors and it's really appealing for me. It acts as an enabler for me to travel."

"The Bachelor of Nursing has changed my life. I'm the first in my family to get a degree and they are all really proud of me. It opens up so many doors and gives you so many opportunities in life."

## Bream Bay Police help with Far North road block

The Bream Bay Police team was deployed to Kaeo in the first week of November to help patrol the border imposed in the far north after cases of Covid 19 were discovered in Taipa. Whangarei Police were sent to Bream Bay to provide cover in the absence of our regular officers.

## Concern over high number of drink driving incidents

- Police stopped a vehicle which was being driven erratically in Tamingi St., Ruakaka on Saturday 6 November. The driver was breath tested and returned a reading of 1009 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath more than four times over the legal limit. A 40 year old Ruakākā woman will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on drink driving charges on 24 November.
- On 9 December at 3.30pm Police stopped an unregistered motorcycle on Peter Snell Rd. When breath tested the rider returned a reading of 600 mcg of alcohol per litre of breath. A 23 year old One Tree Point Man will be appearing in the Whangarei District Court on 1 December.
- On Sunday 7 November at 7.30pm Police pulled over a vehicle which was being driven erratically on Cove Rd. in Waipū. The driver was breath tested and returned a reading of 958mcg of alcohol per litre of breath and will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on 24 November.

Senior Sergeant Simon Craig of the Bream Bay Police said he is very concerned at the high number of drink driving incidents over the past two weeks and he warns that his team will be making a special effort to keep drunk drivers off local roads in the lead up to Christmas.

## Eighteen family harm incidents

In the fortnight Friday 29 October to Friday 12 November Bream Bay Police were called out to 18 family harm incidents.

## Marsden Bay area at 90% first vaccinations

Vaccinations rates around the Bream Bay area are rising slowly. Marsden Bay (which includes Marsden Cove and One Tree Point) with 84% of its residents over the age of 12 fully vaccinated last week, and 90.9% with at least one vaccination shot, was the most highly vaccinated area in Northland.

Ruakākā stood in second place with 74.8% of its people over the age of 12 fully vaccinated and 86% having had at least on shot.

Last week 75.6% of the over 11 year old population of Waipū was fully vaccinated while 84.7% had received at least one shot.

Of the people living in the electoral unit classed as Bream Bay: the rural area between Waipū and Ruakākā as well as Takahiwai, 72.3% of those eligible had received both vaccinations, while 83.2% had received at least one shot.

In the Oakleigh/ Mangapai area 72.7% of the eligible population had received both vaccination shots, while 82.6% had received at least one vaccination.







## Ogopogo Berries - grown in magical black peat soil at Takahiwai

It's a lovely sight all those rows of ripening berries at the Ogopogo Berry Garden in Takahiwai.

There are blueberries, strawberries - growing under the blueberry bushes, boysenberries - fruiting prolifically in a new section of the garden and tayberries, which Dean Odea, who set up the garden with his wife Kathleen Kort, says are his favourite.

"They are sweet like a raspberries but more aromatic."

However, the vines are very thorny and after talking the job of pruning them last autumn he isn't planning to expand on the few trial vines he already has.

Dean and Kathleen purchased their block in Takahiwai Road five years ago. They fell in love with the property but first they needed to test the soil. Luckily they found it was ideal for growing blueberries.

Dean explained that although nearly all the flat land at One Tree Point and Ruakākā has peat soils some are too acidic to grow berries in.

They took over a bare block and have worked hard: designing a house and having it built as well as setting up the orchard and gardens.

Dean has a horticultural degree from Massey University and served his cadetship on a stone fruit orchard in Kauri near Hikurangi. He met Kathleen while travelling in Canada.

He says the rich black soils of Ogopogo are magic and in addition to the berry garden, which is roughly the size of a rugby field, they have planted out a large orchard and a vegetable garden.

The orchard has many varieties of citrus, macadamia nuts, bananas and a row of 50 feijoa trees with different varieties to extend the harvest. Apart for a few months of the year there is always some kind of fruit ripe in the orchard.

In the vegetable garden there are long rows of lush looking agria potatoes, way too many for a single household. Are they growing potatoes commercially as well?

Dean replies, "What is commercially? Whatever we have surplus ends up in our shop or market stall."

The Ogopogo shop is open each Friday afternoon from 3pm to 6pm. Jennifer Rodrigue of Belle Chevre Creamery brings along some of her cheeses and people arrive in droves. It doesn't take

long for the shop's fridge full of cardboard cartons of berries to empty out.

Dean and Kathleen enjoy this interaction with their customers who are usually very appreciative of the produce they have grown.

The name Ogopogo is the name of the Loch Ness like spirit that lives in the Okanagan Lake where Kathleen grew up in Canada.

"I wanted to bring a little bit of home with me to my new country", she said

Ogopogo Berry Garden is a member of the Roving Rural Market co-operative of local growers and next month, on Friday 3 December from 3pm – 6pm, it will be hosting the monthly twilight market.
