

Arrests made in relation to Peter Snell Rd. homicide

Police arrested two men over the weekend in relation to the death of in the 24-year-old Teina Pickering, killed in Peter Snell Rd. early on Thursday morning 12 October.

A 29-year-old man was arrested on Saturday 14 October, and appeared in Whangarei District Court on a charge of unlawful possession of a firearm.

He has been remanded in custody and is due to reappear on Tuesday 17 October.

Another man, aged 28, was arrested on Sunday morning and charged with weapons and firearms related offences. He was due to appear in Whangarei District Court on Monday morning, 15 October.

Police say they are not seeking anyone else in relation to Mr. Pickering's death but that further charges are likely.

They would still like to hear from anyone with rinformation about what happened at in Peter Snell Rd. at around 4am on Thursday 12 October. You can make contact via the Police 105 phone service or online at www.police.govt.nz. Please use the reference number 231012/4721

One woman told the Bream Bay News she heard the squeal of car tyres at around 4am in the morning and thought that whoever was behind the wheel must have been pretty angry.

Later she learned about the young man's death and when she saw whanau gathering near where he lay while the Police forensic team was at work she and



EDITORIAL

Why does this keep happening in the Ruakākā Village?

Another act of senseless violence and another young life lost. Why does this keep happening in the Ruakākā Village?

My thoughts are with the family of the young man who was killed. How terrible to lose a son in this way! From what I have been told he had a bright future, having only just moved to Ruakākā and found a job and somewhere to live.

My thoughts are also with the people who live in the village with so much recent tragedy in their community.

Last month a man was stabbed in Rakutai Place and taken to hospital. The victim refused to tell the Police who his assailant was.

And village people are still reeling from the terrible events that took place in the early morning of May 15, when two young children were killed in their beds. A 25-year-old woman is in custody charged with their murders. Her lawyers have entered not guilty pleas on her behalf. A three-week trial has been set for March 10, 2025. Why does it take so long for justice to be served?

What is the reason for all this violence?

The Ruakākā Village sits right beside the beach. Bream Bay College and all the opportunities the school offers for education and advancement in life is just up the road. The Police station is just opposite.

The Bream Bay Community Trust, which offers life skills programmes and has youth and community workers always ready to listen and help anyone with a problem, occupies a light filled modern building at the top of Peter Snell Rd.

That wise and good man Phil Paikea runs a Safe Man Safe Family centre alongside ready to offer non judgemental support to any man who asks for it.

There is the Ruakākā Skate Park, built by the community for the area's young people and the Ruakākā Recreation Centre with a new \$7million building under construction.

Most crucially there are many kind and caring people living in the village. When the whanau of the young man who was killed assembled to stand near where he lay while the Police conducted a scene examination villagers set up a gazebo offering them shelter, coffee and sandwiches.

"It was all we could do", one resident told me sorrowfully.

We need to understand more about what led to each of these tragic events. Are there any common factors? If we knew more perhaps we would have a better idea of

After many years of Santa arriving in Waipu on Christmas Eve, he has had to change his schedule.

The iconic Waipu Christmas Eve Parade has a new date and time. The parade will now be held at 4pm on Saturday 16 December.

David McKenzie, a long time Waipu resident, said he believes the Waipu Parade has been held on Christmas Eve since it first began in 1956 and he thinks it would be a shame to change this tradition. He wonders if a parade held on 16 December will attract the same crowd as many young people living elsewhere for work or education return to their families in Waipu for Christmas.

Promote Waipu, which runs the parade, advises the reason for the change is that there is now a compulsory requirement for qualified traffic management and there are no traffic management staff available after 21 December. Volunteers are no longer able to manage traffic and because Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday there are no professional traffic management staff available.

Promote Waipu believes there are positives to come out of the situation.Whangarei is not having a parade this year so Waipu can expect more visitors from around the district to view its parade and this will be a great boost for Waipu retailers

The Marsden Lions Ruakākā Christmas Parade is scheduled for Saturday 9 December so fortunately not a clash with the new Waipu date.

A Promote Waipu press release states the parade is "expected to be bigger and brighter than ever with lots of prizes for the best floats"

The chain has now arrived but there is still no definite start date to install sand ladders and Richard Morris, Secretary of the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association said in his newsletter to association members, "We will be lucky to seen them this side of Christmas."

others went across "to awhi the family".

Uncle Phil (Phil Paikea) set up a gazebo and we made coffee and tea and sandwiches. When they left to follow the hearse to Auckland we wrapped the sandwiches up for them to take. It was all we could do.

Teina Pickering had recently moved to Ruakaka where his brother was already living. He had found a job and organised somewhere to live. People who had met him thought he was a fine young man.

"He was getting on well and then this happens." A woman in her 70s living nearby said a neighbour called to ask if she was OK. This was the first she had heard about the homicide and coming on top of the death of two young children in and a stabbing just a month ago it was not good news to wake up to.

"My thoughts are with the young man's family. She finds it hard to understand why people are so angry and violent saying there are so many good kind people living in the village and that the Bream Bay Community Trust has many services offering help to those who need it.

"It was horrific.We just had to pull them all out and replant as quickly as we could. Fortunately we now have a lot of our crops growing in tunnel houses. But we lost what we had planted out in the open."

Kāinga Ora working to ensure state house tenants can remain in the neighbourhood

Although the redevelopment of 17 Kainga Ora (Housing NZ) homes in Peter Snell Rd., Tamingi St and Tiki Place has not yet got underway and the people who live in the homes have not yet been informed of a timeline it appears the redevelopment is still likely to go ahead.

Jeff Murray, Regional Director - Northland said in an email reply to the Bream Bay News last month, "Our customers are our priority and we will be contacting them in the coming weeks to provide an update on our redevelopment plans. We acknowledge the early planning stage has taken longer than anticipated, however, customers can be reassured that this is largely due to the work we are undertaking to ensure those affected by our plans can remain in the neighbourhood."

The Bream Bay News had pointed out that living in a state of uncertainty was unsettling for affected residents.

The Kainga Ora tenants received letters in August 2022 advising them their homes were under consideration for re-development. A plan was displayed at the Takahiwai Marae to the Patuharakeke Trust Board, but not to the affected tenants, showing 36 new homes

of various sizes replacing the 17 existing homes. The affected tenants are still waiting on an update.

There are already six new Kāinga Ora homes being built in the Ruakākā Village. The development is underway at the racecourse end of Peter Snell Rd. The six new homes six homes at 88 Peter Snell Rd. have been purchased by Kainga Ora from a developer and are expected to be ready for occupation late this year or early 2024.

Bream Bay Shared Path group to put its case to the Whangārei District Council

Members of the Bream Bay Shared Path group, which This could go from Marsden Cove alongside a drainage aims to establish off road cycle trails around One Tree Point and Ruakākā, will be putting their case at the overbridge to link with Marsden Point Rd. where there next Whangārei District Council meeting to be held on Thursday 26 October at 9am.

Shared Path group representatives: Steve Gibson, Jules Flight and Grant Brown met with Juliane Chetham of the Patuharakeke Iwi Trust Board, Councillor Phil Halse, Jim Sephton General Manager of Infrastructure for the Whangārei District Council, Sarah Irwin, WDC Infrastructure Planning Manager and Nick Marshall who is Road Safety and Traffic Engineering Lead for the Northland Transportation Alliance last week and requested a feasibility study be undertaken to look at various route options.

Councillor Phil Halse said four possible routes are on the table with the priority being to establish a safe cycling route between Marsden Cove and the Ruakākā Towncentre separating walkers and cyclists from heavy traffic heading to the port.

A second possibility is a trail from Marsden Cove to the southern edge of Bream Bay Village in Marsden City, and through a disused dairy herd tunnel to get across SH15.

There are also easements, which might make a loop out to Takahiwai possible and a fourth route is along the Channel Infrastructure pipeline, which run through the Bream Bay dunes although this option necessitates crossing the highway leading to the port.

Councillor Halse said work had already begun on mapping a route from Mangawhai to One Tree Point as part of a national cycleway network. This study had suggested the pipeline route but as this left cyclists contending with traffic heading to the port, a feasibility study of the alternative route suggestions could be undertaken as part of this project.



Burglars target Marsden Cove Four Square and Ruakākā liquor store

Burglers broke into the Marsden Cove Four Square at around 1am on Monday 9 October. It is unclear if they stole anything but then then went on to the liquor store in the Ruakākā Shopping Centre and broke into that store. They were driving a stolen vehicle reported missing from Kamo. Police are working with CCTV footage to identify the three offenders.

Generator stolen from Ruakaka engineering company

In the early hours of Wednesday 11 October, a large generator valued at \$15,000 was stolen from the engineering company Obelisk, at the former SPIND site in Marsden Point Rd. The thieves cut through a security fence and used a Ute to steal the trailer mounted generator. Police are following leads provided by CCTV footage.

Vehicle thefts from Marsden Cove and OTP

Two vehicles and a set of number plates from a third were stolen from Marsden Cove in the early hours of Saturday 7 October. Police believe the three thefts are all linked with one of the vehicles being recovered and the second a silver Toyota Hiace van still missing and now likely to have yet another set of number plates.

Crowd of boy racers block Police from making an arrest

Two Bream Bay Police officers were surrounded by a crowd of boy racers and prevented from making an arrest after one of the racers put on a drifting display in the middle of Marsden Point Highway on Friday night 29 September.

A 50 strong convoy of boy racer cars had made its way to Ruakākā and a large group of spectators had assembled on the road. Bream Bay Police had been allerted to the gathering by the Bream Bay Community Patrol.

The boy racers completely out numbered the two officers and jumped on the bonnet of the two Police cares allowing the offending driver to get away.

However, he didn't get too far as his vehicle was spiked by Police just south of Whangārei. A 20-yearold Whangārei man has been charged with: driving while suspended, operating a vehicle on a public road with a sustained loss of traction and failing to stop for Police.

Both local Police officers were unharmed although their vehicles were damaged.

Sergeant Simon Craig said he believed the boy racers were not from this area but had driven down from Whangārei where there have been a number of similar incidents.

He said, "We don't want them down here and we will be on the alert to stop this happening again."

Drink driving offences

On separate occasions Police have found three people to be driving with excess breath alcohol in the fortnight Saturday 30 September to 14 October. With breath alcohol levels over 400 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath all three will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on drink driving charges.

A day in the park to support mental health

A fundraising event for the registered charity Gumboot Friday, which provides a free mental health counseling service for young people, is planned for the Waupu Caledonian Park on Saturday 4 November from 10am to 2pm.

The event is being organised by a local family, who has experienced the loss of a loved one to suicide.

Karen Cave's son Andrew took his own life eight years ago. She is organising the event with the help of another son, Josh Preece and his partner Jamie Halpin.

Karen said, "Josh has wanted to do this for sometime - it's his dream to honour his brother in this way. It's been a roller coaster ride since losing Andrew and it's a journey no family should endure.

We're providing a family fun day and raising as much money as possible for Gumboot Friday, but we also hope for courageous conversations around all things suicide because we know that connection and understanding can make such a huge difference. I hope people come and talk with us."

New Zealand has the highest youth suicide rate of the 38 member nations in the OECD (Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development).

The Gumboot Friday organization recognizes that an overworked, underfunded, and under resourced public mental health service has led to long wait times for young people needing immediate help. Using fully qualified, licensed practitioners from the private sector it enables young New Zealanders, 25 years of age and under, to book a session with the counselor or therapist of their choice at www.gumbootfriday.com

In the 2022-2023 financial year Gumboot Friday offered 27,586 free counseling sessions to 17,181 young people at a cost of \$3,625,062 all provided through community fundraising

In the Caledonian Park on 4 November there will be: family entertainment showcasing local music and dance talent, face painting, a bouncy castle and food and coffee carts.

Local sports clubs and activity groups will attend and the Bream Bay Sports Trust will hand out lists with contact information for a variety of local sports clubs.

There will be a Men in Kilts game of touch between Waipu Rugby and Takahiwai League and, for the children, a petting zoo. The Waipu Fire is thinking about running a gumboot throwing competition.

The Bream Bay Community Trust will be present to explain the services it provides and there will be a selection of holistic health and well being practitioners.

RRT (Rapid Relief Team) is coming with food and care parcels to give away, and has indicated a special interest in supporting the mental health of farmers and explaining how they can offer practical supports.



New group to look after the ecology of the Ruakākā Forest

The Ruakākā Forest will be given a higher level of environmental protection if a group of local conservation enthusiasts have their way.

The forest covers 1,699.3ha comprising: forest, shrub and wetland and is described in the Department of Conservation's 2007 survey report of Natural Areas of Waipu Ecological District as "one of the largest and most diverse areas of indigenous forest" in the survey area.

It is located on steep hill country inland of Ruakākā, rising to a high point of 262m at Kukunui ridge. It stretches from Ormiston and Kukunui Roads in the west, to Prescott Road and around to Mountfield Rd. in the southeast and includes the catchment area of the Wilson Dam as well as catchments for a number of streams which flow into the Doctors Hill wetland.

The forest is partly managed by the Department of Conservation, with the Whangārei District Council

controlling the Wilson Dam catchment. In addition private landowners hold some areas.

Robyn Armstrong said many people don't know the forest exists but it has some high biodiversity values, including a rare association of hard beach and kauri. The DOC survey also lists: maire tawake, gully tree fern and tree fuchsia as regionally significant species found here.

There have been recent reported sitings of native bats and Robyn is on the look out for dactylanthus taylorii, the wood rose, a rare parasitic ground growing plant producing a strange wooden flower and an abundance of sweet nectar much enjoyed by bats, which assist with its pollination.

Over the past few years trap lines have been established and maintained around the Wilson Dam and already there is a marked increase in birdlife in

those areas as well as an improvement in the health of native trees. Robyn said getting rid of possums has led to an influx of pigeons, as there is now more food for them.

There is a lot of work ahead. Gregg Chisnall said while many possums, rats, weasels and a few stoats have been caught in his traps it would take a massive effort to trap throughout the entire forest.

There is a plan to establish a wetland at one corner of the Wilson Dam, this made possible by the dam's edge remaining permanently under water since the closure of the Marsden Point Oil refinery, which has meant a sharp decline in water take for the Bream Bay area. Jess Buhr, a teacher at One Tree Point Primary School is keen to involve school children in the restoration work as well as the trapping. Bjorn Leigh, formerly of the Department of Conservation with an interest in fresh water ecology is willing to lend his expertise.

Jacqui Wairepo of Kūkūwai Consulting Ltd. (a

civil engineering and ecological consulting company) has suggested surveys be undertaken to check for gheckos, kauri snails, Hochstetters frogs and forest birds, rodent densities and that automatic bat monitors be set up.

To protect against kauri die back spread, shoe-cleaning stations will need to be set up and tracks improved before they can be safely opened to the public.

Graham Mathews, River Catchment Co-ordinator for the Piroa Brynderwyn Landcare Trust is in close contact and one option is to come under the umbrella the Piroa Trust, although some members have a preference for an independent Ruakākā based organization.


