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## Ruakaka Village residents startled at speed and size of proposed Transitional Housing development

Ruakaka Village Residents were a bit startled last week to receive a letter in their mailboxes from Kainga Ora, a new government entity charged with delivering social housing.

The letter states an application for resource consent for a 31 unit Transitional Housing development will shortly be lodged with Whangarei District Council.

Work will begin in January 2020 and be completed by 30 June 2020. The houses will be built off site and assembled on site "so they can be in place quickly to meet an urgent demand." There will be 22 two-bedroom homes and nine three- bedroom homes as well as a site office and community space. The letter states the houses will be "warm, dry and built to modern building and design standards."

It explained that Transitional Housing is used to "help clients stabilize their housing and support needs where they can learn to live independently before moving to a more permanent housing solution."

The houses will be managed by contracted providers who will be responsible for looking after the families living in them, helping them to access social services and budgeting advice if these are needed.

Families are expected to stay in the homes for an average of 12 weeks but longer if required. The families

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## **EDITORIAL**

## We desperately need more social housing but if this development was happening in my neighbourhood I would be asking some of the same questions

Kāinga Ora, the new government department charged with delivering public housing, is certainly moving quickly on the transitional housing development it has planned for the Ruakākā village.

Last week people living near Te One Park, where the development will be built, received a letter explaining that 31 houses, 22 two bedroom and 9 three bedroom homes will go up on the site, with work beginning in January 2020 and completed by June 2020. They will be built off site and assembled on the Te One St. land. Residents are invited to phone a woman with the title "Senior Stakeholder Relationship Manager" to find out more.

There has been a lot of talk around the village since the arrival of these letters. I have received a number of phone calls and emails from concerned residents.

The questions people are asking include: Who are the people who will inhabit these houses? Where will they come from? There are many elderly people living in the village and if the transitional housing brings social problems and crime this will be upsetting to retirees who should be able to live their lives in peace. How good will the support be which will be put in place for the transitional house residents? How will the people who will be housed in these new homes find affordable permanent accommodation within the twelve weeks, the letter says will be the average stay? Affordable rentals just aren't available any more. Will the presence of this transitional housing development lower property values? Will residents get a chance to object to this development?

Our local medical centre is already stretched and struggling to find more qualified medical professionals to meet the needs of the people already living here. Will the people coming to live in the 33 transistional houses make significant extra demand on our local Police?

I can appreciate all these concerns. I think if this development were going up in my neighbourhood, I would be asking some of the same questions.

On the other hand I know how desperate the housing situation is. I think it is unacceptable in New Zealand that people don't have homes and live in their cars, on the streets of our cities or crowd into garages and sheds.

I believe the government should be able to provide basic housing for everyone and that there should be a way to build cost effective, comfortable, warm, tidy housing quickly for people who have nowhere else to go. But solutions to complex problems like this one are never easy. Look at all the objections to the social housing development in Puriri Park in Maunu. It seems where ever an attempt is made to provide housing for those who desperately need it, there will be objections. I spoke to a long time resident of the village yesterday who remembers when Te One Park was a football field and the original home of Bream Bay United. It was also the site of two playgrounds, one for smaller and one for older children and a tennis court. There was a communal hall down the road where people could meet and the village held its own Christmas Parade.

When a number of Electricity Corporation Houses were passed over to the Housing Corporation for social housing new people arrived and things changed. The village lost some of its community atmosphere. The playgrounds were repeatedly vandalized and had to be taken down. The tennis court wasn't maintained.

I think in recent years the Ruakākā Village has reclaimed some of that community spirit. The volunteers who contribute to the Ruakākā Recreation Centre and the Ruakākā skate park, built largely by volunteers overseen by the late Tony Jelas (See obituary on page 10) is proof of this. However over Labour weekend the skate park and its adjacent toilet block was extensively graffiteed. The Recreation Centre Committee members say that it is usually over long weekends and holidays when out-of-towners arrive that these things happen. How can we guarantee that the people who come to live in these transitional houses will respect the Ruakākā Village community and it's hard won facilities and sense of unity?

I will be on the phone asking questions on behalf of the Ruakākā Village residents tomorrow (Monday) morning. I am wondering if the "Senior Stakeholder Manager" would agree to a public meeting where residents can put forward some of their concerns.

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# Rusting drums outside Ruakaka plant likely to contain toxic substances

Four years after the Ruakaka solvent recycling plant ceased operating in 2015 the removal of solvents from the site has not been completed and a collection of rusting drums remain outside the building

The plant is located behind the Lakeside Industrial Park in Marsden Point Rd. less than 500 metres from the Bream Bay shoreline. The plant shut down after the Northland Regional Council found there had been illegal discharges of hazardous substances onto surrounding land and brought charges against the plant's owners Brian Smith and several companies he is a director of.

Colin Dall, of the Northland Regional Council said "The NRC is working with a number of agencies "on the management of waste at the site."

The Northland Regional Council began carrying out investigations at the solvent plant site in 2014 and brought a prosecution against Mr. Smith and two of his companies the following year. Asked why the clean up is taking such a long time, Mr. Dall said it was agreed that the Environmental Protection Society should handle all media enquiries.

Asked if the rusting drums contain toxic solvents, Erina Marwick of the Environmental Protection Authority said, "Yes, due to the nature of the site, some of the containers will contain solvents."

She said, "A number of agencies are working with the companies responsible for the solvents at the site.

The Environmental Protection Authority is in a coordination role.

The EPA and WorkSafe New Zealand are monitoring and providing technical assistance where required.

Back in 2015 Mr. Smith had a potential buyer for the plant: Solvent Services NZ Ltd. However Manus Pretorious, one of the directors of this company, said the sale had not gone ahead because Mr. Smith did not meet the terms of the agreement, specifically in cleaning up the site.

Mr. Smith confirmed the sale had "fallen over". Asked what was in the drums outside the plant he said he had not visited the Ruakaka site for many months and referred the Bream Bay News to Phil Bailey of Work Safe NZ whom he said was looking after the site.

However when the Bream
Bay News reporter
contacted Work Safe
NZ she was once again
referred to the EPA.

Alex Wright, a Whangarei District Council Mayoral candidate in the recent local government elections was given the photograph of the plant by an anonymous source and has become interested in



this issue. She has asked a number of questions of the Northland Regional Council, the Environmental Protection Society and the Whangarei District Council under the Official Information Act.

Her questions include:

- Can you identify all the chemicals stored at this solvent recycling plant?
- What are the quantities stored, of the above mentioned chemicals?
- What are the Councils' plans, if any, in cleaning up this site?
- When will the Councils inform the public of the toxic hazardous chemicals on the site of this solvent recycling plant?
- What are the estimated costs in cleaning up this site for the Whangarei District Council?
- Who will pay for the clean up?

Mrs Wright said, "There is now concern with some that this site poses an environmental risk to the underground water system and how widespread the contaminants have travelled through this sandy wetland.

She said she has grave concerns that this environmental issue at the solvent recycling plant has been allowed to go on far too long.

will continue to receive support for three more months once they move into more permanent accommodation. The letter also states that the use of the development could change "to meet housing needs of the future." The letter promises, while construction is underway

The letter promises, while construction is underway "there will be site and traffic management plans in place to minimize disruption to the community" and that work will begin at 7.30am and finish at 6pm each weekday and from 7.30am to 12 noon on Saturdays with no building work on public holidays and Sundays.

It is unclear if Ruakaka Village residents and affected

agencies such as the Bream Bay Police will get an opportunity to have their say on this emergency housing Ann Midson, the Whangarei District Council's Senior Communications Advisor said, as an application for resource consent hadn't yet been received, it is not yet known if it will trigger a public consultation process. Checking on the Whangarei District Plan map, Te One Street Park has a Living One zoning, which permits residential housing at a density of one unit per 500 metres if the buildings are connected to the reticulated sewerage system. Te One Street Park covers 1.8728 hectares; so 31 houses can be built on this site within

this density requirement.

However, Ms. Midson pointed out that Housing NZ had voluntarily decided to publicly notify its proposal to build social housing in Puriri Park in Maunu despite the land here being zoned for residential use.

The Housing NZ website states, the Puriri Park voluntary notification decision "took into consideration the length of time the land in question has been vacant, leading to most of the local community mistakenly considering it to be a public park."

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## No venue for the fight night

Head Hunters gang member Herbie Rata was left without a venue to hold a "fight night" when the police warned the owners of Marsden Tavern off holding it there.

Herbie said he has trained up 18 young men from Otangarei and Ruakaka and was preparing to bring up 18 opponents for them from the Head Hunters fight club in east Auckland

He had already sold over a hundred tickets for the event at \$120 each and was planning on selling 200 more. He said the Fight Night was for suicide prevention and the money would be going to two young men in his

boxing academy, who had lost parents to suicide. And he said that the young men whom he trained in his academy grew in confidence and pride. Police however suspect this is a recruitment exercise for his gang. Herbie said a number of different gangs would be represented at the event he was planning.

When it was suggested that this might be the reason Police are feeling a bit nervous Herbie replied that "The Police make us nervous. We get put in prison. They don't go to prison."

Herbie said he was determined to go ahead with the Fight Night. If he could not find a venue to hold it in he would be holding it in a paddock.

The Fight Night was, in fact, held at Herbie's Takahiwai home last Saturday 16 November. Police teams came up from Auckland to help keep the peace.

## No fees dilemma for Bream Bay College

Bream Bay College was facing a dilemma with the Government offer of paying \$150 per student to replace the annual request for school fees.

The school previously has set school fees at \$60 per student and \$100 per family but as these are voluntary and the school only about a third of the possible amount was realized with the school receiving between \$10,000 and \$12,000 annually from this source.

On the face of it Bream Bay College with 540 students stands to benefit by around \$70,000 each year by choosing the no fees option.

However, the school also asks parents and guardians to pay for a number of school trips and camps. The Shakespeare Camp in Whangaparoa for Year 7 and 8 students which costs families just under \$300 per student, a Year 9 trip to Wellington, a year 12 trip to Tongariro, a Panimals (steel pan band) trip to take part in a competition in Australia, a geography trip to Mexico planned for senior geography students next year which Principal Wayne Buckland said he expects to work out at \$8,000 per student.

Under the rules for receiving the no-fees grant schools cannot then charge for trips that are part of the curriculum. If the trip involves an overnight stay then schools can ask for a donation but parents do not have to pay this.

Mr. Buckland was concerned that the school would not be able to afford to send students on these trips without parents or guardians paying and he sought clarity from the Ministry of Education as to what qualifies as a curriculum related trip.

He has received advice that if the trips are made voluntary "if we are not telling everyone that they have to go" than the school can charge for trips away.

He said, "We will run on that basis until we are told otherwise."

In the meantime the school's administration team is looking at budgets to see where the extra funding might

In the spirit of the Governments no fees funding offer, which aims to make education in New Zealand more equitable, Mr. Buckland thinks the funding might be used to help families with tight budgets fund their students on some of these trips rather than just a blanket subsidy to lower the cost for everyone.

He said the extra funding would not be used to fund trips further afield such as the Mexico trip, although there might be some exceptional circumstances where this was warranted.

He gave as an example a family, which had fallen on hard times and couldn't afford to make up the shortfall after the student and parents had worked hard to fund raise towards an overseas trip.

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


Unfortunately the trouble did not end there. On Monday two jet skis and two

What is the matter with some people? Have they no respect for the law, no respect for wildlife? Its not as if there is not enough space within Bream Bay for everyone to enjoy themselves without endangering threatened birdlife, let alone endangering other beach



ing, respect them. They mean 'Keep Clear'. Follow the rules. Is that too much to ask? The Ruakaka Estuary is a designated Wildlife Refuge since 1958. Yes of course people can go there but only on the understanding that they do not disturb or evict wildlife.

## Happy to share but concerned about effects of transitional housing development on existing amenities

In response to article titled 'Ruakaka Village being considered for transitional housing units' dated 7 November 2019.

Activities associated with a building project (surveyors, council planners, geotech engineer) were observed at the corner of Tamingi Street and Te One Street. Bream Bay News contacted Alison Geddes of Whangarei District Council (WDC) for comment. Her response at the time - 'no formal application had been received for such a project but a conversation had been held over a potential site' - was published in this

The day after this article was published a geotechnical company was on the site all day taking roughly a dozen samples over the whole site. This same day a pair of arborists were there identifying, locating and sizing the trees on (and adjacent to) the site.

On the 15 November 2019 a letter from Kainga Ora (dated 14 November 2020) stating a Resource Consent application was about to be lodged for a transitional housing project consisting of 22 two-bedroom and 9 three-bedroom homes, a site office and community space on the site was received by some Ruakaka residents. This letter also stated that work was anticipated to begin on site mid-January 2020.

As a Ruakaka resident the little information provided by Kainga Ora and WDC so far seems to be inaccurate and misleading. There are questions below for Kainga Ora and WDC that should be answered to the satisfaction of Ruakaka residents before any further progress on the proposed development is allowed.

Questions for Kainga Ora (KO) and the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development (MHUD).

1.Does KO/MHUD know that there are already some people that would qualify for transitional housing staying across the road from the proposed site? Does KO/MHUD know the adverse effect this has had on the safety of the local residents? There has been a massive increase in the number of police visits to this part of Ruakaka and on one occasion our armed defenders squad was needed!

2. Can KO/MHUD assure us that, if the project goes ahead, that the new residents will have access to medical services, mental health services, public transport and social services here?

Questions for the Whangarei District Council.

3.Does the sewer system have capacity for 31 new households? Can WDC assure the local ratepayers that this development will not require an upgrading of the existing sewer system? Can WDC assure the local residents that increased loading on the existing sewer system will have no adverse effect on our health or enjoyment of existing amenities?

4. Adjacent road condition. Can WDC assure local ratepayers that 31 new households will not worsen the condition of surrounding roads, having an adverse effect on access to our homes and our safety?

5.Resource Consent due process. What rules of the district plan does the proposal infringe, triggering the need for a Resource Consent? What adverse effects have been identified to households adjacent to the proposed development? Does the zoning permit this type of activity at all?

6.As the site is Crown Land put aside for possible Treaty Claim settlements is it necessary for WDC to notify effected parties? Is that the local Iwi? It is understood that only a five year lease has been granted to Kainga Ora. What happens after that?

Ruakaka residents enjoy a wide array of amenities here. Of course we are happy to share so long as there is no negative effect on the amenities we currently en-

# Steel Work NZ - a hobby turning into a fast growing local business

Cindy Hughes has a full time job and four children and somehow amongst all these demands on her time she has managed, with her husband Matt, to start what is fast becoming a successful part-time business.

Cindy makes steel artworks. The patterns are designed on a computer and profile cut by Matt from big sheets of 3mm Corten Steel using a steel plasma cutter. Cindy does the sanding and grinding and, on some pieces, painting and then takes the finished products to local markets in Waipu, One Tree Point and Ruakaka.

She works in the evening and says she loves the whole process including meeting the people who buy their work. Sometimes they get commissions and Cindy says providing a unique piece for someone is especially gratifying.

They have made decorative pieces for the walls of homes and offices, garden art, signage, letterboxes, house numbers, privacy screens and fence decorations.

There are birds, trees, fish, signs with words and human figures. There's a shaggy highland cow piece (a one off -made on commission) and lots of trucks. A recent piece is a large spherical fireball or brazier patterned with horseshoe and cowboy images.

They work in Corten or weathering steel, which forms a rust-like patina if exposed to the elements but does not corrode.

The business is named Steel Art NZ and has its own facebook page with photographs of pieces in stock and an option to purchase on line.

# Tony Jelas 2*1 August 1947 - 6 November 2019* "He dreamed big"

A memorial service for Tony Jelas, without whom the Marsden Cove Marina and much of the subdivision development of Marsden Bay and One Tree Point might not have eventuated, was held, appropriately enough, in the Marsden Cove Marina on Saturday afternoon 17 November.

Tony died on 6 November after a battle with leukemia. "He dreamed big" was a comment echoed by many

of the speakers who rose to the microphone to pay him tribute.

His brother Greg described how he had been inspired by Ian Hopper, the founder of Hopper Developments Ltd. after working for this company as a grader driver. Tony had taken the initiative in subdividing a family

owned property at Orewa and as he got to work with his grader on the roading network had commented to Greg that he felt like Ian Hopper. Leigh Hopper, the current Managing Director of Hopper Developments, said Tony had invited him to Marsden Bay to look at the possibility of building a marina development there. Tony had already done considerable work in researching the viability of this project and after some further investigations the Hopper's team had decided to develop the site. Mr. Hopper said Tony's profession, as a grader driver was one of the most exacting needed in civil construction.

Peter Batten said when he first met Tony and heard him talking about all the development he could see happening at Marsden Bay he "thought he had rocks in his head."

He said Tony was a "visionary."

Tony had been a founding member of both the Whangarei and Ruakaka Economic Development Groups and Jude Thompson of Northland Inc. said Tony was working on projects right up to his death and some of these would come to fruition in years to come.

Marc Sands spoke on behalf of the Ruakaka Recreation Centre and described some of the smaller community projects Tony had lent his expertise to.

He had overseen the building of the Ruakaka Skatepark.

"He was the first one on the site in the morning and the last one to leave at night. Other people played a part but without Tony's expertise and determination I don't think this would have been achieved."

Tony had also overseen the installing of improved drainage for Recreation Centre sports fields and had more than once graded the Recreation Centre carpark when it was full of potholes.

On one occasion when people were complaining loudly about the state of the bus stop at the Ruakaka State Highway One roundabout Tony had taken the initiative of borrowing a grader and smoothing out all the big potholes.

Todd Hamilton, a professional trapper and Backyard Kiwi Project Manager in Whangarei Heads, will give advice and practical demonstrations. He will cover the range of traps available for stoats, ferrets, weasels, feral cats, possums and rats, how to use them safely and effectively, where to put them and what baits to use. Steve Henderson, Biosecurity Officer from the Regional Council, will also be on hand to advise on the support Council makes available.

Information on pest plants affecting the area and opportunities to help control or remove them will be provided by Weed Action Coordinator, Nancy Chaves.

Peter Hunt works with the Waipu Kiwis trapping group and together with Ann Neill co-chairs Piroa-Brynderwyns Landcare. He says, "We are keen to involve as many people as possible in assisting kiwi recovery in our project area. Kiwi chicks are mainly killed by stoats and feral cats so eliminating these predators is a key focus.

Kiwi were released on the Marunui Conservation block at the south eastern side of the Brynderwyn hills in 2013 and 2015. As they extend their territories beyond the intensively trapped area they were released into it is vital that predator control is undertaken in the wider area to help them survive.

In the year to date volunteer groups and professional trappers working in 17 projects in the wider Brynderwyn area trapped or otherwise removed 114 stoats, 7 ferrets, 27 feral cats, 65 weasels and well over 2000 possums and 962 rats.

Over the same period Marunui Conservation reported a catch of 77 stoats, 23 feral cats, 2 ferrets, 130 weasels and hundreds of possums and rats from both within the reserve and a Ring of Steel traps surrounding it. John Hawley of Marunui said "These numbers show how many predators are out there."

Piroa – Brynderwyns Landcare operates under the umbrella of Kiwi Coast, a collaborative inisitiative linking 120 community led conservation projects along the east coast of Northland.

## Waipu Lions buy a trike for Cameron

The Waipu Lions have made one young man, who lives at a rural address in Mata very happy.

Cameron Telfer is a cheeky, energetic 13-year-old. He enjoys doing tricks on his trike, riding it backwards and accelerating and then stopping with a big skid.

Cameron rides a trike rather than a bicycle because he has Downs Syndrome and cannot balance on two wheels. He was lent a trike for three months by Parafed Northland to see if this would work for him and he took to riding this like a duck to water.

When it was time to give the trike back, his grandmother Diane Stanton with the help of Sharon Carroll who

works for Parafed tried to find a way of sourcing some funding so she could buy him one of his own. This didn't prove to be easy. The Child Mobility Foundation, which the Waipu Lions fundraise for with an annual Fun Run and Walk at Waipu Cove provides aids for children with cerebral palsy and similar disabilities but Cameron's Downs Syndrome didn't quality under this heading. Parafed Northland also works specifically for children with physical disabilities.

An offer of a second hand trike came from a woman in Whangarei. The trike is worth approximately \$3500 but the woman only wanted \$500 for it and the Waipu Lions agreed to meet this cost.

Sharon and Lions President Trevor Murray delivered the new trike to Cameron on Wednesday afternoon 6 November.

Cameron has two sisters who like to cycle around the Hatea Loop. Now with his trike Cameron can go with them.

Sharon said helping a child with a disability become more mobile has benefits for siblings as family activities are often curtailed because it can be so hard for the disabled child to participate.

## Freedom campers invited to give something back to communities they stay in

Freedom campers staying in the Whangarei District are being encouraged to give back to the communities in which they stay by way of donating some of their time and energy to help with local conservation projects.

The Council will once again be operating a freedom camping ambassador scheme with volunteers calling daily at the various freedom camping sites and handing out leaflets with advice and a list of rules to campers.

This summer there will also be a suggestion the campers make contact with a local environmental organization with an offer of some volunteer assistance. 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


