"A shame politics has dropped to this level"

Two odd things happened at the Meet the Candidates evening in Waipu held on Wednesday 7 September. The first was a large security guard stationed at the entrance to the Waipu Presbyterian Church Hall where the meeting was held.

There were over 100 people crammed into the hall to hear from the four Bream Bay Ward candidates, seven mayoral candidates and a single Māori Ward contestant who turned up. Some candidates had brought along an entourage from other parts of the district but, even so, is Waipu that dangerous a place?

Enquiries as to who had commissioned the guard pointed to one of the Mayoral Candidates, Fiona Green. Asked if she had hired the guard and why she felt she needed this protection her reply was a "No comment."

The other strange thing was a leaflet tucked under the windscreen wiper of my car after the meeting asking the question "Is Vince the VFF (Voices for Freedom) candidate?"

The Bream Bay News asked Councillor Cocurullo if he knew who was responsible for this. He said he did not but it had happened at subsequent meetings. I found the same leaflet under my car wiper after the Ruakākā candidates meeting on Tuesday 13 Septem-

Councillor Cocurullo said his team had access to security camera footage and are "progressing this through to the Police."

He said, It is a shame that politics has dropped to this level" and it is no wonder so many candidates are feeling intimidated and bullied and are considering pulling out.

Hayfever

for hayfever is allergic rhinitis - this means an allergy affecting the nose.

This allergy may be either seasonal. such as in spring when there is plenty of pollen or new plant growth which causes the allergy; or perennial which means all vear



round, when you are allergic to dust, pet hair or other irritant substances. The severity and type of hayfever varies from person to person, but can make you miserable if not treated and the symptoms prevented.

Those people that have allergies causing dermatitis or asthma are generally more likely to suffer from hayfever; but for everyone the answer to relieving hayfever is to minimise the exposure to whatever is causing the symptoms.

Most hayfever sufferers complain of sneezing, itching and burning eyes and throat, and either blocked or running nose. Other symptoms that may occur are aches in the jaw and teeth caused by the pressure of blocked sinuses, popping in the ears, headaches and generally feeling miserable.

When you have an allergy the body releases a substance called histamine, which is why the most common medicines used to treat allergies are called antihistamines. These block the effect of histamine and will prevent any more histamine release, which should prevent the allergy getting worse.

Avoiding the substance that causes the condition is always better than taking medicine to treat the result of the exposure, but unfortunately this is not always possible.

Other treatments for the nasal blockage and congestion of hayfever usually involve a nasal solution that may be either dropped or sprayed into the nostrils. These work by washing out the nostrils or by helping to dry up and prevent further secretions from the sinuses running down the nostrils or down the back of the throat. Decongestant nasal preparations should only be used for up to five days running as they can cause nasal congestion to worsen if used for prolonged periods of time. Seek advice from your community pharmacist as to the correct nasal spray that you can use to relieve and prevent ongoing congestion.

A cough may occur from persistent nasal secretions running down and irritating the back of the throat. This is called post-nasal drip, and may also be helped by antihistamines, as this should not be treated with medicines to stop coughing.

Talk to your community pharmacist about the right medicine to treat hayfever, and seek their advice about preventing as well as treating hayfever whether you suffer from this occasionally or every day.

I went to Keith Levy's talk about living in a small space at the Bream Bay Community Trust on Friday. He also spoke about the joy of having nothing and, while I didn't hear anyone say they were prepared to give away their belongings and move into a bus, there was general agreement that you didn't need a lot of money to be

One man said as a child living in the United Kingdom during the Second World War there hadn't been a lot of disposable income around and he had worn hand me down clothing. He hadn't even seen a banana until after the war and when presented with one didn't know what to do with it and took a bite with the skin still on.

"As kids we were happy. We didn't know any different."

Keith's idea that you can live well in a small space might not be convincing to those of us who love the homes we have with our spacious bathrooms, laundries and seperate toilets, but for people paying a large chunk of their income in rent or on a mortgage this might be a solution. If you are well organised and smart, small, even tiny homes, can be pretty nice and it can be liberating not having lots of possessions to worry about. The difficulty is finding somewhere to set up. Most subdivisions have rules about the kinds of homes you can build on them.

The morning after Keith's talk I went to the Pukapuka Party run by the Bream Bay Learning Community group at Bream Bay College where stalls with learning activities are set up for children to participate in for free. It takes a lot of work I am sure on the part of the organisers and I know that the Waipu and Marsden Bay Lions put \$500 each towards the day but seeing how many children and their families were participating this is pretty good value. This is much better than taking the kids for a day at Rainbows End. Here children can learn that lots of money is not essential to having a good time. 1

The Pukapuka Party confirms my belief in the importance and power of strong creative and connected communities. I congratulate all those who contriburted to this year's success. I love the fact that with a bit of imagination you can organise a low cost fun activity for children, like for example, the Guess What's in the Secret Forest box on the Educare Centre stall, where, without peeping, children reached into a hole in the side of a beautifully decorated mossy green box to guess what objects lay inside.

Another thing to love about the Pukapuka Party is the way it makes the statement that this community cares for all its children.



Waka Kotahi at Labour Weekend Market

Waka Kotahi (the NZ Transport Agency) will be at the Waipu Labour Weekend Market on Sunday 23 October to explain its redesigned plans for the intersections on State Highway One near Waipu. In brief: a roundabout is proposed at the Rosythe Rd./Nova Scotia Drive intersection, the Uretiti Road intersection is to be to be left in, left out only as is the Shoemaker Rd. intersection. The Braigh and Millbrook Road intersection will remain largely unchanged with some flexible median barrier at the northern end of the intersection and a wide centre line at the southern end.

BB College bans cell phones at school

From the beginning of next term students will not be permitted to bring their cell phones to school at Bream Bay College.


In his latest newsletter Principal Wayne Buckland said at a recent presentation Kathyrn Berkett, whom has an online Tedx Talk entitled *Neuroscience of Device Zombies* explaining how people can become addicted to social media and video games and how video games can encourage violence and risky behaviour. She suggested that if teenagers become distressed when asked to hand over their phones or leave them in a designated place outside their bedrooms overnight they are possibly showing signs of addiction.

Mr. Buckland said the new policy was in response to concerns about phones being a distraction, being used for cyber-bullying and preventing healthy face to face communication between students."

He said cell phones were useful at school when students did not have other devices such as laptops and chrome books but now all students have these. Also in the past the school was charged extra to make calls to the cell phones of parents and caregivers but now the school has a phone account which doesn't charge for this so if a student needs to contact a parent they can do this from the school office.

If for some reason students do need to bring their cellphones to school these must remain in their bags and turned off during school hours.

The school will be reminding students and parents about the new cell phone rules over the remaining weeks of term three and from the beginning of term four phones in use at school will be confiscated by staff and held for parents to pick up.

No space in the Waipu car park

Regarding a letter in the 8 September Bream Bay News, car parking is currently provided free of charge for short term parking in the main car park, for shoppers and visitors . On a number of occasions I have tried to park in this car park, on random days at random times and found that it was full. A number of my acquaintances have told me they don't even bother trying or waiting for a space and drive to Ruakākā or Whangarei.

This town is undoubtedly growing and a more covid free visitor season is approaching, which will make the situation worse.

I undertook a random survey, on different days during the week I noted several cars parked from early morning to mid/late afternoon. I concluded these were owners/employees of local businesses or, as somebody suggested, they are maybe using the spaces to park abd ride out of town. Only a few spaces but at peak hours say Mon - Fri & Sat morning, it's critical..

If visitors and shoppers travel elsewhere through lack of parking then that's so much less trade and \interest in our town.

But there is a solution already in place. The car park behind the Celtic Barn/ Coronation hall is available for parking all day(Excluding event days and Bank holidays). Parking permit tickets could be handed out, free of charge, where appropriate by those businesses with employees who need to drive to work.

A big fuss over nothing? Maybe, but the town is growing, hopefully with commercial infrastructure to match. Please let's park sensibly and where it's appropriate ,before we get to a pay and display parking situation ,which has already been suggested.

Wheelchair accessible swing coming soon to Waipu

Asked about the cost of the new children's playground in the Waihoihoi Park, Sue Hodge the Whangārei District Council's Manager of Parks and Reserves said this was \$96,000.

She explained, "We renew our playgrounds regularly as the maintenance costs start to increase to a point that we need more than scheduled weekly inspections." Sue said there was one more piece of play equipment to come, which is a swing accessible for children in wheelchairs.. The Northland based organization Children with Disabilities has fundraised \$10,000 for this with the Whangārei District Council meeting the remainder of the cost.

Ten-year-old Alex and his mother Kylee Ostermann were disappointed to find the wheel chair swing in the Whangārei Town Basin playground had been removed.

The swing will be concreted into place and a wheelchair friendly path will need to be built from the carpark.

The swing is large enough for older people to use.

Kylee said, "Most people seem to like that swinging sensation. It would be something Alex could enjoy for the rest of his life."

Police Report

Burglary at Ruakākā Roundabout service station

At 3am on Sunday morning 18 September a thief smashed the office door in at the gas service station at the Ruakākā Roundabout. The man whose image was captured on CCTV attempted unsuccessfully to force his way into the cigarette cabinet and then grabbed a packet of biscuits. He also removed draws from the cash register and loaded them into a car, which Police have identified as one reported stolen in Auckland. Police enquiries continue.

Boundary fence cut at refinery complex

The boundary fence around the old Marsden Oil Refinery complex was cut overnight on 11 September. It appears from CCTV footage the offender was attempting to steal scrap metal but did not manage to remove any.

158kmph on State Highway One at Waipu

A vehicle reported as travelling at 158kmph on State Highway One at Waipu was stopped by Police at 6pm on Saturday 17 September. A 28-year-old Whangārei man will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court as a consequence.

Stolen car found burned out in Dargaville

A car was stolen from behind the shops in Waipu at 11am on 7 September. It was later found completely burned out in Dargaville. Police are following some good leads from available CCTV footage.

Digger trailer stolen

A digger trailer was stolen from Langs Beach on 2 September. It is described as a Tandem axle trailer with a blue ribbon stripe above the wheels.

Waipu Fire Brigade rescued man from overturned car

A man had to be cut from his car by the Waipu Fire Brigade after his vehicle flipped off the road and into a ditch on the side of Takahiwai Rd. at around 10pm on Saturday 17 September. Joe McNamara who came upon the accident on his way home that evening said he was impressed by the efficiency of the Waipu Brigade who had arrived on the scene just 15 minutes after the accident. The fire fighters had spread a sheet on the ground for the rescue helicopter to land however this wasn't needed as the man was found to be uniniure.

Thefts from rural mailboxes

Mail, including voting forms for the Local Government Elections, was found by the Rural Mail Delivery strewn on the ground around mailboxes along One Tree Point Rd between Carrs Quarry and McCathie Roads on Saturday morning 17 September and on Monday morning 19 September morning along Heatherlea Place. RD Contractor Joe McNamara has reported this to the Police and said people could deter would be thieves by clearing their mailboxes before dark.

Two crashes in Ruakākā on Monday morning

Learning about the lake





Bream Bay College Year Seven students and children from One Tree Point Primary spent the day at the Ruakākā Dune Lake (now known as Roto Pārera) on Thursday 15 September, learning about the creatures that live in the lake and in wetlands nearby, how dune lakes are formed and how to test for water quality.

Staff from the Department of Conservation and the Northland Regional Council set up stalls and were on hand to talk to the children as was the Patuharakeke Taiao environmental group, while Bream Bay Coastal Care members cooked a BBQ lunch for everyone.

In between looking at fish, invertebrates and peering through water turbidity tubes the children played a bull rush game with some taking on the roles of pollution, fishermen and birds and others being tuna (or eels) making their way up stream as tiny glass eels into rivers and lakes and then when fully grown back into the sea to spawn and facing multiple journeys on these journeys.

Ari Carrington of the Taiao group said he had found the name for the lake in some old papers. He explained Parera is the name of the gray duck and roto is the word for lake. Pārera are native to New Zealand, Australia, New Guinea and the South Pacific.



Waipu history report kept under wraps despite being paid for by ratepayers

Despite a report on the history of Waipu being paid for by the Whāngarei District Council: i.e: the ratepayers, this will not be available for the public to read until sometime next year when the Waipu Placemakers Plan, which it will inform, is completed.

The Council commissioned Dr. Vincent O'Malley and Dr. Joanna Kidman to prepare the report. Dr. O'Malley is a historian specializing in Treaty of Waitangi Research and author of a number of books on New Zealand History including "The Meeting Place: Māori and Pākehā Encounters." Dr. Kidman is Professor of Māori Education at Victoria University. She is currently working on a research project entitled He Taonga te Wareware: Remembering and Forgetting New Zealand's Colonial Past, which her website informs

us "investigates how New Zealanders selectively remember and forget difficult and violent events from our colonial past."

The Bream Bay News requested a copy of the report and was asked by Claudia Gonzales Pino, a Senior Planner with the Whāngarei District Council, what the purpose of our request was. She said any use of the report outside the Placemaking Plan project would need to be authorized by Dr. O'Malley. When told that we would like to share the contents of the report with Bream Bay News readers and that, as this report was paid for by ratepayers, we believe it should be available for people to read, she replied "I appreciate your interest in the Historic Overview report and in sharing it with your readers.

"However, the Historic Overview report was commissioned and prepared to inform the Placemaking Plan for Waipu which is currently in the making. Once the Placemaking Plan is completed and adopted by Council (First half of 2023) a copy of the plan and the Historic Overview report will be available in the WDC web page. At this stage we will not be sharing the report."

The Bream Bay News has sent in an Official Information Request for a copy of the said report. We have also asked how much it cost.

Some questions from the floor

Warren Daniel of the Ruakākā Resident and Ratepayers Association put the question to the seven Mayoral candidates — Should the Mayor's casting vote be used to change the status quo?

Mike Budd -"No if you can't get a majority than you are not doing your job as Mayor."

Shaquille Shortland - "If you elect someone as Mayor than you are trusting them to make wise decisions. I wouldn't use it much but there might be times when this is needed to stop issues coming back again and again.

Nick Jacob - "I don't really favour it. If you have to use it you haven't worked as a team.

Brad Flower - "The casting vote should be used to keep the status quo. You can then go back and try to work through the issues.

Fiona Green - People (on Council?) aren't reading though the material provided. You have to love reading to be on Counicl. If people read through the material you shouldn't have to use the casting vote.

Vince Cocurullo - I believe in democracy. The casting vote was used way to many times by the previous mayor. It should have been used to preserve the status quo. An example is the decision to change the ward situation. This decision was reversed by the Local Government Commission. He agreed with Fiona Green that it would be helpful if Councillors read their agendas properly.

Ken Couper - The casting vote is sometimes needed to move things forward. I don't believe we should get rid of it. If it is necessary it should be used to maintain the status quo.

Sue Jolly of Bream Bay Coastal Care asked the Mayoral candidates Should people continue to be permitted to drive vehicles on Bream Bay beach?

Mike Budd – I'm not for it at all. I don't understand why vehicles need to be driven on the Beach

Shaquille Shortland – I don't drive. I would support the wishes of the community.

Brad Flower – If the beach is designated as a road people can drive on it but we need to control the behaviour of beach drivers.

Fiona Green – This is something you need to get into the Long Term Plan.

Vince Cocurullo – If the local community decides it doesn't want vehicles on the beach then we need to abide by that decision.

Nick Jacob – I love four wheel driving but would never drive on the beach. Rules for driving on the beach are uninforcable.

Ken Couper - The time has come in this community to take a stand against vehicles on the beach.

The same question was put to the four Bream Bay Ward candidates at the Waipu Meet the Candidates evening on Wednesday 7 September.

Steve Bean - Many people get a lot of enjoyment by driving on the beach but vehicles do damage the shell-fish beds and I think there will come a time when they will no longer be permitted on the beach.

Ken Couper who is also standing for Mayor did not get the opportunity to answer this question at the Waipu meeting.

BB Community Trust hui to find out what the community wants

The Bream Bay Community Support Trust is holding two community consultation hui next month on: Tuesday 4th of October at 5.30pm and on Friday the 7th of October at noon following the regular community connection session.

Sharon Russell, the trust's CEO said she values hearing from people face to face. She said people can make suggestions on the trust's website or on facebook but these means of communication do not work for everyone.

We really want to hear what people want. In her previous occupation as a nurse she came to realize that unless you were addressing the concerns people felt most keenly she could not really help.

"I might be talking to someone about their diabetes but all the while their biggest concerns were housing or family issues."

The trust holds regular Community Connection meetings at 10 am each Friday and several new initiatives have come from suggestions made here. One participant taught others to knit and Peggy squares are being collected to sew together into blankets to give out to people who need these in the community.

Another initiative is a cancer support group, which meets regularly with people coming together to offer one another support.

Sharon said she wants to dispel the myth that the community trust is just for a certain demographic. She recently spoke at a Bream Bay 60s up meeting where people were surprised to hear about this open door policy.

"We want to hear what the needs are in the community."

Help needed at Ruakākā's Alzheimers daycare programme

Alzheimers Northland is looking for a volunteer who can help with a day program at the Ruakākā St John centre on Tuesdays and Fridays from 10am to 3pm. Alzheimers Northland's community advisor Gaye Chaplin, said two staff run the sessions but are unable to take lunch breaks and it would help to have a volunteer to cover for them. Already a volunteer helps out one day a week so the new person would only need to commit to one day a week and would not necessarily need to stay for the entire session.

As the people who come to the program are often elderly the volunteer would need to be fully vaccinated against Covid 19 and (as for most volunteer positions where you work with people) would need to undergo a Police check.

Ten people suffering from Alzheimers attend the sessions, which give their caregivers a break.

Gaye said there is a waiting list of people who would like to join the program but "we can only do what we can."

Waipu Lions donations total \$17,304 over six months



The Waipu Menzshed -

Each Tuesday the old Masonic Lodge building in the Waipu Museum's Heritage Precinct becomes a hive of activity as the members of the Waipu Menzshed roll up their sleeves and get to work.

They stop at around 10am for a coffee break and last Tuesday morning they were joined by Gavin Clapperton, the Kauri Protection Specialist, with the Northland Regional Council who had come to inspect a prototype design for a roof structure to go on top of some kauri hygiene stations. The idea is the structures with sloping roofs will collect water, which can be used in remote locations to top up the spray disinfectant mix. The NRC supplies hygiene stations free of charge on private land where there are walking tracks near kauri to help prevent the spread of the disease. The Menzshed has already supplied the NRC with wooden stands for the stations.

Another big production item line is wooden boxes for rat and stoat traps. Waipu Menzshed boxes can be found in forests all around Northland and as far south as the Coromandel.

A new line is a kitset box, which they give out to local schools and the Ruak $\bar{a}k\bar{a}$ Scout group for children to put together themselves.

Nothing gets wasted. Thin strips of timber cut from planks used for the trap boxes are stapled together to make trellis, which is sold to local gardeners.

The Menzshed is a non-profit organization. Any money raised goes back into maintaining the centre and buying new machinery.

Before it became the Masonic Lodge, the building the group occupies was Waipu's original hall and it now belongs to the Waipu Museum.

"We are grateful to be able to use it," says treasurer Grant Erp but it's a mutually beneficial arrangement as Menzshed members are always ready to help out with museum projects.

Northpine, the Waipu timber mill, is very generous with donations of timber so items can be supplied to community groups at very good prices.

Some Menzshed members have skills in fabrication and metal work but rather than risk welding sparks in the historic wooden building a workshop has been set up nearby using some shipping containers.

Waipu Menzshed donates to Daring restoration

The Waipu Menzshed has donated \$1,000 to the Mangawhai Daring Trust to help with the restoration of the 17 metre-schooner which was exposed in a remarkably intact condition by shifting sand on Muriwai Beach in 2018

The Daring was built in a shipyard at Mangawhai in 1863 by the young Nova Scotian boatbuilder Donald McInnes.

Nova Scotia was renown as the boat building capital of the world and these skills accompanied the Scottish migration to Waipu. An article by the Classic Yacht Charitable Trust describes the quality of craftsmanship in The Daring as "stunning".

Diggers were brought in to free The Daring from the sand and she was carefully lifted and transported to a safe location, initially at Hobsonville.

In 1865 she had been purposefully beached during a storm. Her captain's plans to retrieve her when the storm abated were quashed as a second storm blew up the following day. The fact she was at anchor as well as the exceptional quality of her construction have been attributed to her remaining intact under the sand for 153 years

The Daring worked as a coastal trader transporting goods such as timber, agricultural products and supplies for the New Zealand wars around the west coast of New Zealand. Hessian bags of grass seed were found in her hull.

After various arguments about where The Daring's final resting place should be she has been returned to Mangawhai where she is being restored with the hope that a purpose built museum can be constructed where her story can be told.

John Noakes, who was instrumental in arranging the donation, said the ship is an important part of our history.


