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Medical centre staff copping abuse over mask wearing requirement

Staff at the Bream Bay Medical Centre are copping lots of abuse over the issue of mask wearing.

Practice Manager Kay Brittenden said, "I get that people are fed up with covid and mask wearing but I think some have forgotten that legislation says that a mask must be worn in a healthcare setting.

She wants to remind these people "We do have very sick people coming in and they are more vulnerable than most."

She said medical staff will still see people with mask exemptions but these people are asked to wait outside or in their cars until someone comes to collect them for their appointment.

Kay said she is strict about people wearing masks in order to keep other patients safe and also to try to look after her team.

"We need them working so they can care for all of us rather than being home sick"


She does want to thank "all the people who have been understanding" about the mask requirement.

Individuals unwilling to wear masks are also abusing staff at at the Waipu Medical Centre.

Dr Tim Malloy, Chairman of Coast to Coast Health Care, which now owns and operates this centre said what was happening at the Bream Bay Centre is also happening at Coast to Coast Health Care Waipu.

He said the Waipu Medical Centre staff agree with the problem as outlined by the Bream Bay Medical Centre Manager and are responding in the same way.

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

Find out before you vote

I have received a couple of text messages from Health NZ reminding me to book in for a Covid 19 vaccination booster. I will do that tomorrow. I am grateful that we have such a comprehensive medical service here in Aotearoa staffed by well-qualified people who understand the science behind viruses and vaccination. I feel a tad guilty that I have had to be reminded twice wasting the time and resources of our health service.

I watched the Paula Penfold Stuff documentary *Fire and Fury* this morning which helps to explain why the staff at our local medical centres are getting abuse thrown at them when they ask people coming into their waiting rooms to wear masks. The documentary looks at some of the on-line posts this country's conspiracy theorists are watching. In one a young woman wearing camouflage military style clothing is saying she is ready to go into battle when those evil medical people come to vaccinate her children. In case anyone reading this is of this pesuasion - no one is being forced to have their children vaccinated. There are some strong recommendations that vaccinations against diseases such as measles is a good idea but people are not going to forcibly abduct your children

Members of the Voices for Freedom group liken the administering of Covid 19 vaccines to the experiments carried out on prisoners in Nazi extermination camps, a comparison which I think is both ridiculous and highly offensive.

People with New Zealand accents call for the execution of journalists (like me), medical professionals and politicians. In one clip our Prime Minister is compared to a chicken whose head needs to be chopped off. No wonder its getting hard to find people willing to stand for political office these days.

Individuals with these extreme and offensive views are living amongst us. Whenever I write something in these pages on the subject of Covid 19 vaccinations or, more recently, on the futility of the protest at Marsden Point, I get a flurry of emails and texts wishing me harm.

The author of a particularly long and crazy text told me she and her fellow protestors are getting plenty of waves and toots from drivers passing by, which they take as proof of widespread support. Truck drivers do you really want to be cheering these people on?

We have local government and school board elections coming up and I think we need to look carefully at the candidates. It's not good enough just to vote, you need to know whom you are voting for. In smaller communities it is a bit easier to know the backgrounds of the people who are standing for election. Some of those mayoral candidates though, I don't have a clue about. Thank goodness we don't have that across the board Council voting system

There are a couple of meet the candidate evenings scheduled for Bream Bay: The first organised by Promote Waipu and the Waipu Residents and Ratepayers Association is scheduled for Wednesday 7 September at 7pm in the Waipu Presbyterian Church Hall, the second, organised by the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers, will be held in the Ruakākā Recreation Centre on Tuesday 13 September also at 7pm. The RRRA has also sent a set of questions to all the Mayoral, Bream Bay Ward and Māori Ward candidates and I will be running the replies to these in the next 8 September issue of the Bream Bay News.

All three of our local primary schools have just enough candidates to fill their board of trustee vacancies but Bream Bay College will be holding an election for the six spaces for parent representatives on its board. Parents and caregivers with students at the college can find profiles of the candidates sent out with the voting papers.

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Two local election meetings

There are four candidates for the two Bream Bay Ward seats on the Whangārei District Council. They are: Steve Bean, Ken Couper, Phil Halse and Shilane Shirkey. Brief profiles of each of these people are provided below and on page 12 of this edition of the Bream Bay News.

There are six candidates for the two newly created Māori ward seats: Deborah Harding, Pauline Hopa, Simon Mitchell, Phoenix Ruka, Zhairn Zee Tana and Nicki Wakefield and seven candidates for the single position of Mayor of Whangārei District: Mike Budd, Vince Cucurullo, Ken Couper, Brad Flower, Fiona Green, Nick Jacob and Shaquille Shortland.

Incumbent Rick Stolwerk has been elected unopposed as Councillor for the Coastal South area on the Northland Regional Council.

If you don't know who all or any of the Whangārei District Council candidates are you get a few chances to find out. A public meeting has been organised jointly by the Waipu Residents and Ratepayers and Promote Waipu on Wednesday 7 September from 7pm in the Waipu Presbyterian Church Hall (behind the museum car park). All 17 candidates who have put their names forward for elec-

tion as Mayor of the Whangārei District or to represent the Bream Bay and the Māori Wards of the Whangārei District Council have been invited to the meeting. Each will be given an allotted speaking time and will be asked to answer three questions put to them by the meeting organisers.

The Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers meet the candidates evening will be held on Tuesday 13 September at 7pm in the Ruakākā Recreation Centre.

Mayoral candidates will each get five minutes to make a pitch followed by a short period of questions from the

Candidates for the Bream Bay and Māori wards will each be allotted a two-minute slot following on from the presentations by the Mayoral candidates.

The RRRA has also sent a set of three questions to each of the candidates and these, with the responses, will be printed in the 22 September issue of the Bream Bay News.

Voting papers for the local government elections will be posted out on 16 September and must be returned to the electoral officer no later than noon on Saturday 8 October.

Steve Bean describes himself as a "grass roots person" who has had to work hard for a living.

"I know what its like to have just \$5 in the bank. A lot of people in the Bream Bay area are still struggling and I want to see what we as a community can do to help."

As a grandfather he wants to do what he can to look after this place for his grandchildren and for all young people.

He has been the stand-in coach for the Waipu Rugby Premier Team this season as was widely praised for the gracious interview he gave to New Zealand Sport Radio when this team was defeated in the grand final against Mid Northern at Seminoff Stadium in July. For 10 years Steve was the Whangārei District Council's Wastewater Manager and more recently worked on projects with Fulton Hogan. So has a good grasp of the issues around the Three Waters Legislation. He said that the Whangārei District Council has done a good job of keeping ahead of its infrastructure needs but some other councils have slipped behind and a massive amount of money is needed to bring their wastewater, stormwater and drinking water systems up to scratch.

Steve worked for a few years as a project manager in Vanuatu. He said what prompted him to stand for council is the changes he saw on his return.

Too much respect for fellow citizens to consider standing as a Councillor

I read with interest your editorial regarding the apparent lack of local government candidates this year. I admit I was almost ready to throw my hat in the ring.

Then I received an envelope in the post. There were two documents in the envelope, one was a Whangarei Council newsletter, the other a rates bill. The newsletter advised me the rates increase this year was 4.4%

The rates bill, on the other hand, indicated that the increase was actually 18%. One of the documents was obviously an inexactitude - dare I say, possibly even a lie.

When I questioned the extent of the increase with the Council I was advised that it was because our land values had "increased by so much". As if my patch of bush land earns me the moolah to pay for such an increase. I then did some online research, courtesy of the Council website. It appears I am not alone. Most people living in Waipu have seen their rates increase by a similar margin to mine. I urge everyone to check this year's rates bill carefully.

Further investigation of my rates bill advised me I was paying for water, waste and sewerage related improvements. This is despite the fact that like most others around here, I harvest rainwater and employ a septic tank system. I pay for the maintenance of the system while the waste water keeps the trees and flaxes alive to continue to absorb carbon dioxide and feed the tuis. I live 1.5 kms up a dirt road and we even have to pay to borrow library books.

The council charge for "democracy" is possibly stretching the bounds of consumer rights. The words "ward" and "councillors" immediately spring to mind. Like or dislike it, that decision cannot in any way be described as promoting democracy. Did those who voted for this change ever consider that their "customers" have actually paid for Democracy as a line item in their rates? Are they even aware that they are legally obliged to provide what they are charging for?

The council has seen fit to significantly increase our financial load during a time when my fellow citizens can least afford it. In case they hadn't noticed, we are currently struggling with at least 7% inflation, brought about by huge rises in fuel, food and just the basics in life. I have always considered such dramatic increases, 18% for example, to be a form of mental violence. What's more, it comes at a time when many people in Bream Bay have been rendered "unemployed" by politicians—who somehow claim they have the best interests of the people at heart.

So it's a no brainer for me. I have too much respect for my fellow citizens to consider standing as a Councillor. My conscience prevents me from forming any association, monetary or otherwise, with an enterprise that sees fit to blatantly deceive while pouring captive misery on those it professes to serve.

If all the above constitutes off-line abuse in any way, do forgive me. I am labouring under the misapprehension of an expectation of accountability.

Mural unveiled at OTP School

Five boys at One Tree Point school worked for a term resilience; manawanui (unrelenting determination), with Mike and Linda Tupaea of Whetu Design to develop a new school mural.

School Principal Julie Winters said while working on the project the boys were encouraged to think about the qualities of resilience, determination, courage and leadership.

The boys along with the two Whetu Design tutors unveiled the mural in front of their schoolmates, teachers and whanau at a special ceremony on Tuesday 9 August.

Mr. Tupaea explained the symbolism of the design. The background layers symbolises the Pātiki (flounder) which depicts the prosperous harvest of our hauora (wellbeing) - physically, mentally, relationally and spiritually.

Within each of the Pātiki are Mangopare (hammerhead shark) patterns which embodies the qualities of mātātoa (courage) and (rangatira) leadership.

The layer furthest back is the wairua, representing our spiritual connection to our tipuna and Te Atua who watch over us on our journey.

In the foreground is the representation of our whale tail; affirming our school's CARE values of Confidence (Whakamanawa), Aroha (love), Respect (Whakaute) and Encouragement (Whakatītina), guiding the students as they journey through school and beyond.

Above the whale tail are the five manu: Kākariki (Parakeet), Pīwakawaka (Fantail), Kūkupa (Wood pigeon), Kāhu (Hawk) and Kōtare (Kingfisher). The manu act as kaitiaki (guardians) over their environments. Each boy had chosen and made a cut out shape of a different manu each with different qualities.




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
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Dune planting to restore the dunes alongside the Taotahi Walkway



Pania Moulton's family has lived in the village since 1972. Her mother helped instigate the original dune plantings which have helped to keep the dunes intact until now. Pania says the best way to prevent the dunes from being damaged is to keep vehicles and motorbikes off the beach and dunes.

Residents of the old power station village are wondering how close can the beach

Sand is spilling onto the grass strip between dunes and houses as a result of the four big easterly storms last summer. An adjacent blowout has reached the top of the dune and is spilling back toward the houses. The walkway, which just last year was an easy concave shape and well defined path has turned into a hill to be climbed.

Further north at the carpark by NIWA the last weather event created sand stalactites and covered trees and fence posts in sand.

Exposed in the blowout are the remnants of wind cloth and posts put up by NZED when the power station was built in 1968. These were put in place as a foundation for the creation of a dune to protect the 60 brick houses it provided for employees and their families.

One of the first residents of the village, Grant Efford, remembers a major storm, somewhere around 69/70 when sand was blown right up to just under the window sills of the front row of houses. "A dog was sitting on the roof" Grant said "It had run up there on the pile of sand beside the garage"

In the hope this won't happen again, some residents have asked Northland Regional Council to provide plants they can put in the blowout to help redefine the accessway to the beach.

"Native dune plants spinifex and pingao are perfectly adapted to growing in the harsh conditions of the sand dunes. They trap and hold sand, stopping it from blowing inland and help the dune rebuild after erosion, providing protection to land and property" said Laura Shaft, CoastCare Co-ordinator at Northland Regional Council.

A healthy dune can recover but needs to be left to do that. The plants and dune are easily damaged by feet and wheels so its important people stay off the planted area. Plants are provided but volunteers are needed to plant them. A community planting day will be held at Taotahi Walk, Marsden Village, Sunday Sept 4th at 10.00 a.m., followed by a BBQ. Any one who wants to help is welcome.

WHO AM I? (IN BRIEF)

Retired Dairy farmer from Mata. Married to Flo.

Present Whangārei District Councillor for the Okara Ward in the city and now returning to the Bream Bay Ward. Northland's most experienced local body politician. Twice Deputy Mayor, past Acting Mayor for several months. I have held the standing committee chairmanships: Works and Services, Te Karearea (Māori relationship committee), Co-Chair of a cross council committee that includes Kaipara, Whangarei, Auckland Councils and the Northland Regional Council.

I was Chairman of the former Inner City Development Committee that undertook and delivered the Hatea Loop walk way, and Te Matua A Pohe bridge.

Commissioner and Ward councillor of the team that led the design of the Marsden Point structure plan. This document is the base on which Ruakākā developments co-exist and develop in harmony, allowing zone changes and land use to enable Port expansion and areas for industry to develop while ensuring residential areas and key infrastructure are well planned.

I am a cross code sports facilities advocate and have been chairman of the Northland Event Centre Trust. I had direct involvement in building the Aquatic centre, McKay Stadium, and the Trigg Arena (gym and athletic track). I am a former Northland Rugby Player, Chairman, President, Patron and Life Member of the Northland Rugby Union and a former Board member of the Chiefs and Blues Super rugby franchises.

ASKED BY MANY BREAM BAY RESIDENTS TO STAND AGAIN IN THIS WARD

It is important that rural wards have strong leadership. I can provide this, as I am experienced at council and unafraid to speak out on issues.

I have in many ways not left Bream Bay. I am a current Trustee and Councillor appointee on the Stonehaven and Saorsa Retirement Village Trusts. Both of these trusts, run by volunteer trustees are positive and are well set up and run. Both have development plans ahead of them.

I am a sponsor and long time member of the Waipu Rugby Club, including a spell as a assistance coach of the Championship winning Premier team.

I have spent the last ten years as Chairman (relinquishing this role in July) of the Ruakākā Holiday Park (Northland's biggest camp ground). Coming through the Covid restriction years in a sound financial position has allowed fees for this summer to be held at last year's level.

The Ruakākā Library and Ruakākā Recreation Centre proposed expansions, both require attention and further funding to proceed. The Caledonian Park requires new lighting. I am well known to these groups and have knowledge of their requirements.

This Bream Bay Ward is the powerhouse of economic development in Northland: Winstone's aggregate, Marsden Cove Marina, Marsden Maritime Holdings, Golden Bay Cement and North Port being major contributors.. The Port expansion with the possibility of the dry dock are key drivers for Northland.

A lack of funding for roading is a big frustration for many of us. Late delivery, cuts to subsidies, lack of funding for key projects, wastage with work often needing to be re-done, lack of accountability and Wellington based ideas all contribute to this problem. Experience has shown me that we have to create our own plan and get far more political. A well thought out vision of what we wish for, supported by our community, is a far better approach than waiting for Waka Kotahi to deliver what they think is good enough for us.

FRAGILE LOCAL POLITICAL SITUATION

It is tough being a councillor at present. Ongoing Government changes like *Three Waters*, changes to the RMA, Local Government reform, a big push to include *Co-Governance* with Māori on most activities within council, the forced order to fluoridate our water supply, the withdrawal of roading projects and funding, Covid restrictions, senior staff being poached by Government agencies and a general lack of support, have taken a massive political toll.

Northland's political leadership has never been so fragile. Our three District Council Mayors are stepping down. All three councils have new CEOs appointed. The Regional Council also has a new CEO and its Chair will be chosen by elected members after the election.

In Whangārei, five elected members are standing down: our Mayor Sheryl Mai, Deputy Greg Innes, as well as Councillors Murphy, Cutforth, and Deeming.

Two seats will be filled by new Māori elected members so we are already changing half of the council before the elections

No board of directors would make changes as drastic as these on a \$200m business that employs 370 workers as in Whangārei's case.

It is time to balance council's membership with my experience, and institutional knowledge with the keenness and excitement that newcomers bring. Proven skills in leadership and financial management are key attributes that make councillors effective in council.

I led the build up and the terms of reference for Council's Māori Relationship Committee. I was elected Chairman of a Standing Committee of Council - Te Karearea, made up of 8 Hapu Reps plus 8 councillors, including our Mayor and Deputy. This is working extremely well with a focus on hapu development, building a partnership at our local level and addressing what the Government is dropping down to Local Government. This is set up to retain the "local" in local decisions and is facing the next challenges of Co-Governance across Council's activities as mandated by central government.

I was also elected Chairman of the Airport Noise Management Committee to address issues with the proposed relocation of the Rescue Helicopters from Kensington to Onerahi. These changes required extensive skills to lead such as: endeavouring to listen to local residents, manage change, and put in place the best possible solutions to mitigate adverse affects.

When asked by our Mayor to head these committees, the first thought that came to me was YES - we have one chance to do it and get it right. I believe you need to take the people with you, take time to get all issues on the table and provide strong guidance and make sure all participants have an opportunity to have their say.

Bream Bay Garden Maintenance

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John and Bjorke Troost - from Holland to Canada to Maungaturoto and finally Waipu

When John and Bjorke Troost arrived in Auckland in July 1968 they were astonished to see hibiscus flowers and oranges and mandarins on trees.

Bjorke remembers "We stopped and got out of the car to see if they were real."

They decided right there and then "This will do us."

Originally from Holland they had travelled to Auckland by ship from Canada where John had worked as a veterinarian. From Holland to New Zealand had been a long and arduous journey.

John made the decision to be a vet while working on a farm in his school holidays. There was a cow that was having trouble calving and the

farmer didn't call the vet but instead called the neighbours. They all pulled and pulled and eventually got the calf out but the cow was so damaged she had to be shot. The calf was also dead.

"I thought I could do better than this."

Several of John's friends had decided to go to Canada to study forestry and John thought he would go with them. There was no shortage of vets in Holland at that time and it was difficult to get a scholarship to study this subject and his parents couldn't afford to finance

When he got to Vancouver where his friends were enrolled John discovered that the only vet school in that country where the tuition was in English was in Guelph, Ontario. However he was told he couldn't enroll that year but should work to build up some savings all the while improving his English language skills.

It was a time of high unemployment and he found it very difficult to find a job.

He worked briefly on a tobacco farm in the summer – "It was hot as hell" and he once had a job collecting worms from a golf course to send to America where

> they were used as fishing bait. John said he didn't last long at this either.

"You went out at night with a light on your head and a tin strapped to your leg. I think I only got about two worms all night."

He found a job as a clerk in a bank but was a bit startled when he learned the bank manager kept a loaded pistol in his desk drawer.

Thanks to his teachers at secondary school in Holland John passed the entrance examination to the veterinarian school with flying colours. His English mark was a bit low but good enough to win him a

John and Bjorke are regulars for morning coffee at Waipu's Goody Goody cafe

He settled into his studies receiving the occasional letter from friends and family back home in Holland.

He remembers. "In those days phone calls were expensive and you only made one if it was something important. Otherwise we just relied on the occasional letter to keep in touch."

John first met Bjorke when he was 17-years-old and Bjorke was just 15. John had spent his school holidays working on a farm. Bjorke's family was friends with the farmers and she would sometimes visit with them. Bjorke in John's words was "extremely good looking". However, she wasn't interested in boys.

Bjorke said she had lots of attention from young men and thought, "No I can't be bothered."

Later she felt bad about how she had treated John and wrote him a letter when he was studying in Canada.

When John went back to Holland to spend Christmas with his family

he visited Amsterdam where Bjorke worked in a shoe shop. He made the excuse of going in to buy a set of shoelaces.

"That was all I could afford and I needed an excuse to be legally in the shop."

They were married in Amsterdam in 1965. Bjorke travelled back to Canada with John.

By this time John had graduated and set up a practice in Manitoba. When they arrived at the airport in Winnipeg John couldn't find his car, which was completely covered in snow. The temperature was minus 30degrees, which with the wind chill was more like minus 50 degrees. Bjorke was so shocked she couldn't speak. Life was pretty hard in that remote part of Canada. John said the farmers, many of them peasant people from Ukraine or Germany, would often call him up in the middle of the night when one of their cows were calving. The cattle went out to pasture for just three months of the year and each farmer only had around a dozen animals.

By contrast New Zealand farmers, who had bigger herds were much better organised. They were also better educated and knew more about good animal husbandry.

In his sole practice John found he couldn't get any time off and Bjorke, a city girl, found it difficult to live in such an isolated place.

They moved to Alberta where John worked in a practice with two other vets. It was there they met a Canadian teacher who had spent some time in New Zealand. She had enjoyed working here and encouraged John and Bjorke to make the move.

They travelled to Auckland by boat, which John said was "lovely" for him but not so much for Bjorke who was pregnant with their first child and was sick throughout the voyage.

There was a shortage of vets in New Zealand at that time so they thought they would travel around a bit and find a location they liked. One of their first calls was to Maungaturoto where the Vet Club had a vacancy.

They travelled as far as Te Awamutu but as Bjorke's pregnancy was advancing decided they had better settle somewhere.

The Maungaturoto job came with a house, which had a long drive down to the road and Bjorke decided this would be a safe place to bring up their children.

They spent four years there but when Waipu's vet Brand Leeuwenberg

got sick in 1972 they moved here.

Bjorke had made many friends in Maungaturoto with other young mothers and was sorry to leave

John said, "It was great being the vet in Waipu. I was

the only vet here so I was quite busy"

Despite this there was no problem with holidays as vets from Maungaturoto or Ruawai, all part of the Vet Club, would cover for him.

Over the years John and Bjorke have made trips back to Holland and their parents have come out for visits.

Bjorke's father, who was a cabinetmaker, made a good friend of Waipu cabinetmaker Ted Smith who allowed him to use his workshop to make furniture for John and Bjorke.

John said Ted couldn't speak a word of the Dutch language and Bjorke's father couldn't speak English but they became good friends regardless.

After 30 years in mainly farm animal vet practice John's back told him that it was time to switch to a

physically less demanding job. So he joined MAF as meat veterinarian in Moerewa and Dargaville. He worked for MAF t for 15 years, including two years in Vanuatu. He then retired, spending his time with Bjorke on their lifestyle block in McLean Rd, gardening, entertaining kids and grandchildren and helping with their farmer son Neil's cows

The Waipu Cove Surf Lifesaving Club hosted an event on Sunday 14 August aimed at encouraging more women and girls to get involved in the powercraft area of Surf Life Saving -"Wāhine On Water". Wāhine came from all around Northland, with the Bream Bay Clubs well represented to develop their Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB) skills for crewing and driving the rescue boats. 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
