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# Land purchased for Ruakākā cemetery

The Whangārei District Council has purchased 9.6 hectares of land at Ruakākā for a cemetery.

The purchase finally went through after several years of negotiations in mid April. The land was purchased from Bruce and Gaye Cann and is located high on a hill to the west of Marsden Point Rd. opposite the Marsden City development.

The Cann's have the land leased out until the end of December 2023 so development work on the ground is unable to begin until after this date.

Funding has been allocated in the Council's 2023-2024 budget for design work for the new cemetery. Development will be carried out in stages with money allocated in the Council's 2023/2024 budget for stage one.

Gaye explained that the cemetery land purchase was complicated by a Kiwi Rail requirement for the rail spur to Marsden Point.

Gaye and her husband Bruce had originally thought a piece of land that would be cut off by the railway line route was an ideal place for a cemetery but the Kiwi Rail position was that the railway route might need to be re-aligned and ended up purchasing this along with the designated land – a total of 24 hectares.

A cemetery for Ruakākā was first proposed in the 1980s when the late Mary Wassel told the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association that the Patuharakeke Iwi Trust Board was having to decline many requests for people who wanted to bury their loved ones at the Takahiwai Marae cemetery which has limited space and is reserved for people who belong to the Patuharakeke hapu

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

# **EDITORIAL**

# Building of the new Origin Northland shop in Waipu not helped along by Council

I am looking forward to the opening of Jennifer and David Rodrigue's Origin Northland shop in Waipu. The shop will sell food produced by local growers and manufacturers. Most will be sourced from Bream Bay with some more widely from Northland. I hope this is a roaring success and will receive lots of support from Bream Bay residents. David and Jennifer have put a lot of their own money and effort into this project, which I believe will have benefits for us locals and for visitors to this area.

It has taken a year for them to gain resource and building consents so the project hasn't been helped along very much by the Whangārei District Council. One frustrating hold up and added expense for the Rodriguez was being required to establish the existence of a sewer line, which the Council had no record of.

I can't help but contrast this example of an enterprising, new development, funded entirely by private individuals with the Oruku Landing Conference and Events Centre proposal. After 80% of 5,000 people who took part in a referendum opposed the Council granting \$57 million to this project its proponents have come back with a downsized plan. This will still need \$60 million of central government funding along with a further \$11 million from the Whangārei District Council, which includes: \$5 million for the building's fit out, an upgrade of roading and wastewater drainage to accommodate the development -\$3 million, and \$650,000 for each the first six years of its operation if the Council deems this to be necessary. I think we can assume it would be.

# Knowing a bit of history can enrich our experience of living here

A phone conversation with Rudy Papich, who was a small child when the road over the Brynderwyns was first built has stirred my imagination and I have been doing some delving in the Papers Past website to find out more.

Rudy remembers some big horse drawn graders or scoops that were used to cut out the road being lined up on some vacant land in Ruakākā. I found a photograph of one of these machines but need permission of the Alexander Turnbill library to publish this. I filled out the form and sent it off but got a message that it typically takes 14 days for a reply so, unfortunately, I can't use this image in this week's issue of the Bream Bay News., I found another photo which does give some idea. Reading through those old papers it struck me that some things haven't changed much since 1938. When the Brynderwyn Deviation as the new road was named was opened, Waipu Gorge Rd was downgraded from a state highway to a local road. One of the biggest advantages of the deviation was that traffic would no longer have to negotiate the "tortuous twists and turns" of the Gorge Rd. connection. In the winter of 1939 the Brynderwyn deviation had to be closed due to a slip. I hope to sit down with Rudy some time soon and talk about his childhood memories on the farm his parents owned at Marsden Point, where the refinery and port were built. Knowing something of its history will help to enrich our experience of living in this place and make us more appreciative of what we have.

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# Two lane bridges needed

The Waipu Riding Residents and Ratepayers Association has asked that priority be given in the Whangārei District Council's 2023- 2024 annual plan to four local projects: the replacement of the one way bridges on Cove Rd between Waipu and Mangawhai with two lane bridges, the sealing of McLean Rd., sealing of the top of Helmsdale Rd. and the completion of the Waipu to Waipu Cove Cycle and Walkway.

With Cove Rd between Mangawhai and Waipu being used as a bypass for State Highway One while the highway over the Brynderwyn Hills out of action the one lane bridge out of Waipu, and at Langs Beach have caused some major holdups.

The Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association has written to politicians asking that the coastal route from Wellsford to Waipu be upgraded and given State Highway status. The Waipu RRRA has requested that one of the bypass routes be given this upgrade.

# Waka Kotahi to look at ways to make route into Northland more resilient

The Waipu Riding Residents and Ratepayers Association has received a reply from Ministerial Services Te Waka Kōtahi which said that the immediate focus is on restoring access, but went on to explain that in 2018 Waka Kotahii completed a Program Business Case for the Whangārei to Auckland corridor, which included identifying two possible routes for a bypass of the Brynderwyn Hills.

The email stated that this project is not funded in Waka Kotahi's current National Land Transport Programme, the agency is "looking into opportunities to fund the next stage of investigations into long term solutions for this section of SH1, which would also include surrounding detour routes.

"We acknowledge that this stretch of road is particularly susceptible to adverse weather conditions. As we move from the response phase to the recovery phase, we will consider ways to ensure this critical route can be more resilient. In the mean-time our crews are hard at work on the immediate recovery works in response to the recent weather damage."

Both the Ruakākā and Waipu resident and ratepayer associations had written to the Honorable Michel Wood, Minister of Transport asking for a more resilient road route into Northland.

The Waipu RRRA asked that "a secure route over, around or through the Bryndewyn Hills be built."

"The current situation where large trucks carrying products such as milk for Auckland supermarkets have to travel via Dargaville is placing enormous strain on our local industries."

The Ruak $\bar{a}$  Residents and Ratepayers Group asked that a more secure road route into Northland be provided.

"State Highway One north of Auckland is not, as it is often portrayed, a holiday highway to enable Aucklanders to head to Northland's beaches (although it is that too). Rather, it is a key economic lifeline for Northland. The recent closure of the highway at the Brynderwyns and then also at Mangawai has caused huge disruption and economic cost. It has also damaged alternative routes not designed as such."

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# An illegal rubbish dump and a graveyard for stolen cars

Department of Conservation and some Treaty Settlement Land is being abused by people who use it as a convenient rubbish tip

Trish Russell had her car stolen from outside her home in Tiki Place in the Ruakākā Village on 2 March this year 2023. She found it a few days later driven into the metal pile on Sime Rd. There was a young man leaning up against the car drinking from a bottle of Bourbon, which Trish surmised he had purchased with \$20 cash she had left in the car. When Trish's friend who had driven her to the site attempted to take a photo of the car and the young man he threatened to break the windows of her vehicle. Trish informed the Police she had located her car but before they could get down to gather evidence it had been set alight.

Trish is aged 72 years. She works three days a week at the Fresh Choice supermarket in Ruakaka to subsidise her superannuation and to help with the expense of feeding and de-sexing abandoned cats she rescues. Her car wasn't insured as she had urgently needed to pay a veterinarian bill for the de-sexing of four cats and had put of the insurance renewal.

Trish has since borrowed a car from a niece and tells herself there are people a lot worse off than she is. She is concerned about how the parcel of land behind the metal pile being used as a dumping ground for abandoned and sometimes stolen cars and about the amount of general rubbish that is deposited there. She regularly walks along the pipeline track with her two dogs and says the rubbish problem has got worse in recent times. She has counted eight vehicles that have been set alight there over the past few years. She finds it a bit upsetting to come across her own belongings including favourite books that had been in car boot strewn about in the bushes.

The land close to the metal dump is held by the Office of Treaty Settlement with Colliers International NZ currently having the contract for its maintenance. Bain McGregor, who regularly gets the job of clearing away rubbish on the Treaty Settlement land says it is a never-ending job. Further along the pipeline trail the duneland is part of the Department of Conservation estate.

She informed the Police but before any inspection by Police was made the car had been set alight. Trish regularly walks her two dogs along the Pipeline Track on Department of Conservation and Treaty Settlement land and has counted eight burned out vehicles there over the past few years. She said the land is a;so being used as a general rubbish dump and showed the Bream Bay News reporter many piles of old furniture and household rubbish that had been left there.

# Highway One over Brynderwyns re-opens

The highway over the Brynderwyn hills re-opened on Monday 1 May 2023 after being closed for two weeks while Waka Kotahi contractors worked on three over slips where the hillside was reformed and loose material was removed. Extra drainage was also installed to help to future proof stormwater resilience. Under slips were stabilised and pavement repairs were completed on other sections of the road, hydroseeding (planting) over slip areas and general maintenance was carried out.

Waka Kotahi will continue to closely monitor the road and weather conditions, and the road may be closed at short notice should conditions become unsafe for road users.


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# New shops in Waipu to open in August

However they stuck with it. The construction has been more straightforward taking just four months but it makes Jennifer wonder about the Whangārei District Council's commitment to supporting local business.

# Building the Skyline Boulevard - Picks and shovels, horse drawn graders and at lease one mechanical excavator were used to carve the road over the Brynderwyns

Rudy Papich remembers when the road over the Brynderwyns was built. He was around six years old and he and his classmates would walk from Ruakaka School down to the beach for a swim. They walked past a collection of giant scoops mounted on big carts which had been used to cut the road.

Rudy never saw them in action.

"In those days everyone, even us kids were working hard. There was no time to go and look at things .We hardly travelled anywhere. We just stayed home and worked."

Rudy said a Dalmatian man named Matty Babich won the contract to cut the road. The scoops were pulled by draught horse. He is not sure how they were lowered from the carts to scrape out the earth, vegetation and rock to form the road.

The Brynderwyn Deviation (as the road was called) was opened by Sir Walter Nash the then Minister of Transport on September 27, 1938. Ministr Nash later became the 27<sup>th</sup> Prime Minster of New Zealand from 1957 -1960 in the second Labour Government.

There was a lot of excitement about the opportunities the new road, which took 20 minur=tes from the old route via Gorge Rd, would bring to Northland.

Trevor Davis Vice chairman of the Auckland Junior Chamber of Commers suggested it be named "the

Skyline Boulevard" which he said was a name that would appeal to the imagination and be an encouragement for people to come north.

Work had begun on the deviation in 1936 with up to 200 men recruited from the Whangarei Labour Department. The sum of 1,000 pounds was allocated to get the work underway.

The workers were housed in camps constructed for the purpose.

During the Depression years of the 1930s unemployed men left their families to stay in work camps on projects such as this. They were provided with food rations and in the case of those who were married, their wages were sent directly to their wives.

Don Ewen said although he cannot remember the Brynderwyn Deviation being built he remembers the remains of the work camp at the southern base of the hill where the Atlas Quarry is located.

Much of the work was carried out with picks and shovels with the horse drawn scoops used on the more difficult sections. Don said he once tried driving a horse drawn scoops and operating it was "quite tricky".

Don, who worked in earth moving from the age of 16 years, was told by a Mr. Bellingham that he had operated a mechanical excavator on the job as well. When the Brynderwyns Deviation work was complete Mr. Bellingham and his machine transfered to the Hunua Quarry.

Don was once called in to clear a slip from near the top of the hill just below the Sky Line restaurant in the 1960s. He recalls how there were trees underneath where clay and rock had been cut away to form the road.

"They had just pushed it all over the side which is why we get so many underslips. The following winter the road over the Brynderwyns was closed once again due to (you guessed it) a slip. There is a photograph from the NZ Herald at that time of a row of men with picks and shovels working to clear the rock and earth from the road. A supervisor in a white coat is directing proceedings. Apparently they had the road open again in a matter of days.

Don remembers a large kauri tree on the roadside which was named after the Ministry of Works Distrit Engineer Mr. DH. Packwood who had designed the deviation a Mr. Packwood. According to a report in the Auckland Star Mr.Packwood had been concerned to save some of the kauri alongside the new section of road. The tree became a landmark and when it was removed in 1965 because it was considered dangerous it was reported in the pages of the Christchurch Press. the tree was estimated to be between 400 - 500 years old and had a girth of 21 feet.

A writer for the Auckland Star September 1938 on the date of the Deviation opening waxed lyrical about the new section of highway

"A future generation of motorists sailing serenely oer the easy gradients of the Brynderwyn Deviation and pausing ot admire the magnificient view from the topp, will never know the ugly twists and turnd of the old road and excpet for those whose business takes them to Manungaturotom the Waipu Gorge will be just a legend."

# Learning how to test the health of our local streams and rivers

On 24 and 25 April the Whitebait Connection held a water quality assessment course at Langs Beach and Waipu providing information on how to test the health of streams, rivers, lakes, and wetlands.

Using one of the SHMAK (Stream Health Monitoring Assessment Kits) one can establish basic water quality parameters like water clarity, temperature, and conductivity as well as biological indicators like macro invertebrates. More comprehensive kits also include tools for measuring nitrates, phosphates and E. Coli. Over the course of the two days a group of interested local people learnt how to monitor and restore local waterways.

Patricia Clark, who ran the course said, "Its important for communities to be empowered to monitor their own local waterways and to be aware of the overall health of the water."

Graham Mathews, the local Bream Bay River catchment coordinator for the Piroa Brynderwyn Landcare Trust (PLC) said, "I want to find out how to get a base line data. These education days are a great way for communities to assess this information and create an ongoing testing system for the future."

The Northern Regional Council has provided funding for this action based environmental education programme. It is available for schools and communities who are interested in the health of the local waterways. Assessing a stream or river's health can help identify damage from water pollution and other human activities upstream. Early detection of problems in rivers is the key to quick repair, before larger damage might occur.

Analysing the fish and invertebrates in a stream is a

good indicator of the overall health of the water as each species responds differently to changing environment and pollution.

Ron Haynes, coordinator for Weed Action Piroa-Brynderwyns and one of the participants of the course, said, "The reason for monitoring rivers is to find out how healthy they are. Rivers are the breeding ground for fish and eels, the healthier they are the more fish end back out in the ocean."

"Its interesting to note that locals assumed there would be very little life in the water after the floods – but things can be restored pretty quickly due to the fast life-cycle of insects. They lay larvae many times a year and fish are drawn in to eat them, and so the reconstitution of river life goes on."

Over one evening nets laid caught two eels – one long fin, one short fin. Many bullies and a variety of invertebrates were caught in other smaller nets. The testing was taken at the stream that flows down to the beach just off Taranga Road at Langs beach.

A test in the same location showed interesting results for nitrates and phosphates. Near the storm water outlet the nitrates level was 0.4 mg per litre, above the storm water drain however the result was 0.2. The phosphates reading was 0.15 mg per litre. The workshop team also tested the Waionehu Stream on South Rd for E.coli. The result recorded was 600 CFU per 100ml of water, which is dangerously high - At 550CFU the NRC needs to be informed immediately. In microbiology, CFU- colony-forming unit is a unit which estimates the number of microbial cells in a sample that are viable, able to multiply via binary fission under the controlled conditions A Bream Bay Catchment project has been started by Waipu Waters who have teamed up with NRC to conduct an extensive water quality-monitoring program of all the rivers in Bream Bay. A base line of data will be established to show the state of water quality of the rivers, which will be compared to on going results following riparian planting and possible improvements of land use. It can take around ten years to show definitive results.

Waipu Waters now has a SHMAK test kit available to use for the Bream Bay community, which will allow you to identify sources of water degradation - E.coli, nitrate, sediments, and phosphate.

Rob began running at the age of 32. He was training for his first marathon and thought he was in with a chance to go under the qualifying time needed to compete in the Commonwealth Games. However this wasn't to be. He started getting chest pains and it turned out needed heart surgery.

On his recovery he would go on to run three more marathons, the first in Wiri on a flat course where he did a very respectable time of three hours and 22 minutes, the second, the second The Rotorua Marathon 3.26 minutes and the third in Auckland on the year the Harbour Bridge was available to runners – 3hours

and 40 minutes. In those days he was addicted to running.

"It's like being addicted to smoking. If for some reason you can't go out and you see someone running along the street you just want to join them." Rob attributes that Harbour Bridge race to some ongoing spine problem he has experienced. The run was out and back on opposite sides of the road so he was running for all that time on a camber which put pressure on the same side of his body. He believes other people who participated in that event suffered similar problems.

However he had some unfinished business with Round the Bays. He had competed in this race twice before – the first time coming 136 in the 70-80 years age group and the next time moving up to  $16^{th}$  place. I would have liked to have got first but then there were two years when Covid intervened and the event was cancelled.

These days Rob walks rather than runs and he thinks the Round the Bays event will be his last. He has purchased an electric bike so will try getting out and about on that instead.

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

# Waipu Resident and Ratepayer group, after a long discussion, opts to support the 10.9% rate rise

After a long discussion at its monthly meeting held on Wednesday evening 26 May The Waipu Residnt and Ratepayers Association has opted to back the 10.9 % rate increase as muted in the Whangarei District Council's 2023-2024 annual plan over the 7.9% increase as was prescribed in the Long Term Plan.

Councillor Phil Halse said after all the road damage caused by cyclones and storms sticking with the lower rate increase would result in a drop off of services.

Councillor Ken Couper said the Council is facing some large cost increases, including a bigger wage bill as it needed to pay more to retain staff.

Neil McLeod, who is a member of the Council's Positive Aging Advisory Group, raised concerns over the effect the larger increase would have on home owners but said retired people like everyone else needed to have safe roads and proposed the group support the higher rate increase.

Questions were raised about some of the items the Council is spending money on including its support for the Oruku Conference Centre. Councillors were asked why the WDC was giving funding to this project when 80% of people who took part in a referendum said they were opposed to the Council granting \$57 million to this.

Councillor Halse said this was a different proposal with the WDC now asked to provide just \$5 million for the new centre's fit out plus an annual running costs grant for five years if this is needed. This is on top of an earlier decision to put \$3 million into roading and infrastructure upgrades needed for the new development.

Councillor Couper said Whangarei needed more facilities of this nature if it is to attract industry. He said Kelly Tarlton's Underwater World could have been built in Whangarei if the Council of the day had supported it.

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




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
