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Road safety improvements underway alongside **Bream Bay College**

Bream Bay College Principal Wayne Buckland said in the 22 year's he has been at Bream Bay College there have been safety concerns about the safety of students crossing Peter Snell Road to the Ruakākā

Now after a petition was presented to the Whangārei District Council and in line with central Government's road to zero safety programme, action is being

Peter Snell Rd will be reduced to single lanes in each direction. Mr. Buckland said although there have been no serious accidents there was the danger that students crossing the road from the school to the shopping centre would be obscured behind vehicles in the outside lane.

New raised zebra crossings will be provided and the avenue of phoenix palms in the middle of the road will be removed.

The existing slip lane from Marsden Point Rd. into Peter Snell Rd., will be closed which will have the effect of reducing speeds.

Angle parking will be provided in front of the college whare to reduce the number of vehicles parking on the side of the road.

The work began last week and will continue for the two weeks of the school holidays.

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EDITORIAL

The importance of having a home to come back to

I spent a few days in Auckland last weekend. Apart from driving through on my way south I hadn't really been there for a few years and I was amazed to see how much residential building is going on there. I travelled from Glen Eden to Mount Eden by train and there were new or under construction multi storied apartment blocks everywhere. Surely there are enough homes for everyone who needs one by now but walking around the central city in the evening there were still lots of people hunkering down in shop frontages covering themselves against the night chill with sheets of cardboard. What is going on?

The Auckland City Mission has two central city buildings where homeless people can stay for up to three months and get help with problems such as addiction if this is what they want.

Downtown Auckland is so upmarket. I had a look around the Newmarket Westfield shopping centre with its polished floors, giant posters featuring beautiful stylish young men and women, computer screens to help you find your way around the shops. The rough sleepers outside seemed so incongruous. I heard an angry voice and turned to see a scruffy looking man in an agitated state violently punching the air and shouting obscenities. I stood back to let him walk out of the building and cross the street before I followed, but what struck me was how everyone else just acted as though this was normal. This is what it's like in big cities I suppose.

Te Tuāpapa Kura Kainga - the Government's housing dashboard informed me that there remained 26,000 applications on the housing register for public housing at the end of August 2022. Between June 2017 and August 2022 just 10,416 new public homes were added to the Government stock. At this rate the families and individuals waiting on state housing could be staying on that list for some time.

Between 2017 and August 2022 - 204,419 new residential building consents were issued nation wide. That's a big number, particularly when you consider New Zealand's population growth rate has slowed. It grew by just 12,700 from June 2021 to June 2022, the lowest growth rate since 1986. Who is living in all those new dwellings?

Having a stable home is so important for everyone really but particularly for families with children and for older people. Rentals don't offer this security, not here in New Zealand anyway where property ownership takes priority over human rights. I have known a few older people who have felt they had a secure relationship with their landlord and then something changes. What do you do when you face eviction at seventy years of age, have no savings and and no longer have the earning capacity to take out a mortgage?

Families too need housing stability. I hope Kāinga Ora hurries up and gets back to the people living in all those state houses in the Ruakākā Village where redevelopment is being considered. People need to be able to plan their futures.

I love my home. Nothing makes me happier than pottering around in the garden, dreaming about the summer display of dahlia I will grow, the rows of big juicy tomatoes. It is so good to return after I have been away, to come through the front door and see all my stuff. It must be heartbreaking to have the place where you have established yourself and built your memories and dreams taken away.

However it gets a bit wet and boggy in the

Parking in Waipu is becoming difficult to find with

some residents saying they prefer to travel elsewhere for their shopping.

The WRRRA has suggested that a section of the paddock be given a hard metal surface so that it can be used as a park and ride facility for people who car pool to travel to work in Whangārei or for all day parking for those who work in Waipu itself thereby leaving a few more available spots closer to the Waipu shops and cafes.



124 new car park spaces at the Ruakākā **Towncentre**

The excavation underway north of the Ruakākā Recreation Centre is to build an extension of Takutai Place linking it to Sime Rd.

Asked if this was in preparation for a new supermarket Ken Orr a director of the company which owns the Ruakākā Town Centre said the road would provide an access to the back entrance of the proposed new supermarket but he would leave the supermarket business owners to talk about when this would be built.

Mr. Orr said the new stretch of road would provide for 124 new car parks on both sides of the road, which would enable people to park close to the sports fields alongside Sime Rd.

\$30,000 lottery grant for college pool

Bream Bay College has received a grant of \$30,000 from the Lotteries Board towards opening the school pool to the public again this summer.

This isn't quite enough to pay for the pool's needed repaint- \$22,000, running costs as well as for paid lifeguards.

Principal Wayne Buckland estimates an additional \$6,000 is needed and he is talking to the Whangarei District Council and Sport Northland to see if they can help.

The school is also asking the Council to provide some port-a-loos for sports clubs using its fields out of school hours.

Mr. Buckland said this would remove the need for someone to open up the school for these clubs use. He said the school did not get get any extra funding for this or for the extra maintenance of facilities this use entails.

No way should the Ruakākā Dune Lake be dredged because of the errors of local government, developers and residents

Unfortunately I did not see a copy of the 28 July 2022 edition of the Bream Bay News in time to write a letter re flooding of the Ruakākā Dune Lake on Monday July 25th. Your article showed how little Alan Jones knows about sand dunes and dune lakes. I am afraid ignorance is not a suitable qualification to make informed decisions

Dune lakes are dynamic features of the landscape, they wax and wane according to the height of the water table in the dunes. Regrettably this was not taken into account by the Northland Regional Council and Whangārei District Council when unwisely giving consent to development in the sand dunes in Bream Bay.

It has been known for centuries, nay thousands of years, that one should not build on sand. For one thing sand is extremely porous and so when it rains the water percolates down to the base rock to form an extensive aquifer. If one is unwise enough, dare I say stupid, to build on sand dunes one interferes with the natural drainage and over time leaching will take place in low lying areas including dune lakes.

This has already happened in the triangle of land between Marsden Point Road and Port Marsden Highway, Sime Rd. And the Ruakākā playing fields, for example. Not surprisingly it has now occurred at the northern end of the Ruakākā Dune Lake. What's more it has been made even worse by the residents living there. This is because they should never have unlawfully destroyed the dense

vegetation planted by the developer in the public reserve along the banks of the lake and then even illegally cut down raupo in the lake itself.

Vegetation protects dune lakes from flooding so I am afraid the residents in the subdivision bordering the lake have only themselves to blame. If only they had not destroyed so much vegetation, there is a good chance there would not have been so much flooding. Of course there should never have been houses there in the first place. What's more all the existing built development in the Ruakākā dunes, both residential and industrial will only make flood susceptibility worse in

low lying areas.

No way should the Ruakākā Dune Lake be dredged because of the errors of local government, developers and residents. Development has to stop, especially that which is proposed in the dunes beside the Ruakākā River and in the northern areas in the vicinity

People ignore the limitations of sand dunes at their peril.

What should really happen at the Ruakākā Dune Lake is that the vegetation in the public reserve there should be replanted next to the subdivision and the raupo, that has been cut back and even destroyed, allowed to replenish

More than four times over the limit

Police spotted a vehicle being driven erratically on Pt. Marsden Highway at 7.30pm on 25 September. The vehicle was pulled over and when the driver underwent a drink driving test he returned a read-

ing of 1,134 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath more than four times over the legal limit of 250mcg for drivers over the age of 20. A 30-year-old Ruakākā man faces a drink driving charge as a result.

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

He believes this space is needed by cyclists and walkers on the Waipu to Waipu Cove cycling and walking trail.

Cambridge wheelchair swing was removed because it was unused and rusting

When a wheelchair swing was first mooted some months ago via Facebook, I sought a confirmation of the numbers of children in wheelchairs in Waipu. Neither Kylee Ostermann nor Charlie German from Children with Disabilities would confirm the numbers. I suspect there are none, which is important to know as a wheelchair-accessible swing can only be used by someone in a wheelchair.

Why is it to be sited in Waipu with its population of under 3000 while Whangarei will be without one?

Or perhaps it could be located in One Tree Point where I note a new playground is to be built. One Tree Point has a larger residential population and is growing fast. The Council surely need to build the swing near the greatest number of potential users not where someone would like to have it built

I was informed that the swing would make Waipu a most desirable destination as people would flockhere to use it. Apparently adults will be lining up to use it as well.

How does the Manager of Parks and Reserves for the Whangārei District Council justify spending a large sum of money on a swing that may only be used on rare occasions?

What will the ongoing maintenance costs be for a swing that weighs 250 kg?

It will need to be securely fenced for safety reasons and locked so it can only be swung by those with a key. A 250 kg swing can do a great deal of damage if it hits someone hence the fence.

What if someone wishes to use the swing but they do not have a key? Perhaps Kylee or Charlie will be available to unlock and lock the swing for the crowds of people coming to use it?

No doubt the WDC will also fund and install security cameras around and above the swing to ensure that such an expensive facility is not subject to undesirable attention. Ratepayers would not be pleased if vandalism meant the swing could not be used.

We have discussed the idea of a swing with relations in other parts of New Zealand. Cambridge (population 20,000+) had a swing but it was removed and taken to a school with a number of disabled children because it was rarely used and rusting.

One questions the wisdom and ultimate cost to the ratepayer of the Council's decision given what has occurred in other towns in New Zealand with wheelchair accessible swings.

Trialling flotation devices for unpatrolled beaches

Have you seen the flotation devices at Langs Beach and Waipu Cove?

The Waipu Cove/Langs Beach community is part of a trial for Surf Lifesaving New Zealand to help determine which flotation device will be rolled out around

Local residents supported the initiative and purchased six yellow devices. These have been used successfully several times at Langs Beach.

DR Mick Kearney, National Coastal Safety Manager for Surf Life Saving New Zealand is involved with "what happens outside of the flags' so his research and recommendations on the best device and the associated messaging on the devices situated away from patrolled beaches is important.

The Waipu Cove club is hosting a 'Have a go' at

Langs Beach on Saturday 22 October at 4pm

Findings from that session will be forwarded to Dr. Kearney to help him make his proposal to the various groups involved with water safety such as Police, Coastguard and Local and National Government etc.

Presently Langs Beach is trialing two types, the yellow ones, which are used in Hawaii while the pink ones, which are used in South Africa.

Waipu Cove Surf Life Saving Club is hosting this event in association with local residents.

Catchment groups needed to clean up Waipu's Rivers

Waipu Waters is a community-led, not-for-profit group that has been looking into Waipu's somewhat murky rivers, gauging their health, ecology and history. They're bringing a local focus to a nationwide conservation movement to improve the water quality in New Zealand's inland waterways.

Waipu,is blessed with five rivers feeding into one of Northland's most important estuaries, home of the critically endangered Fairy Tern. Still, after years of

our rivers are not the clear, ecologically diverse waterways they once were.

The primary motivation for cleaning up these waterways has been the increasing frequency and duration of the algae blooms plaguing the beaches of Bream

There is a consensus in the literature that both temperature and nutrients are the main contributing factors to bloom events


In order to reduce or eliminate blooms, limiting nutrients may play a central role,"

Additional motivation for clean water is the support

and preservation of NZ's rarest bird, the Fairy Tern (Tara-Iti). There are only four sites in NZ where the Fairy Terns breed, and the Waipū river mouth is one of them. Their primary food source is the whitebait (Inanga) population which spawn in the lower catchment of the Waipu river and this means that good water and habitat preservation for the Inanga upstream has a direct impact on the survival of the Fairy Tern. Thus, Waipu Waters, in conjunction being treated as glorified irrigation ditches and drains, and other groups, is embarking on a long-term proj-

ect to establish catchment groups that will work towards reducing sediment and nutrient inflows and monitor thewater quality of the rivers. The main participants in this will be local farmers and other landowners. With this in mind,

Waipu Waters has established a community nursery with an aim to be able to supply native plants for waterway planting and enhancement. It is envisaged that in time school children will also participate in various planting events with a community focus on improvement and sustainability.





Brynderwyn slip repair work to continue into next week

The subsidence on the south side of State Highway One over the Brynderwyn Hill has been found to be deeper seated than originally understood and work to avoid further slippage damaging the road will continue this week until Friday 7 October . Work is also planned ffrom 6am - 5pm on Wednesday 12 October when concrete will be applied to the slips surface.

A notice from Waka Kotahi states "It remains critical that we complete the slip repairs as soon as possible to avoid further movement which would impact the lane and require more invasive and lengthy repair work."

Traffic management and a temporary speed limit of 30km/h will be in place between Atlas Quarries at the south side of the Brynderwyn Hill and the summit while the work is in progress.

While SH1 will remain open, current delays of approximately 10-15 minutes are expected to continue while this work takes place. General maintenance will be also undertaken while traffic management is in

Buses and over-dimensional/heavy loads will be given priority through the stop/go

Work is conditional on there being no weather events or other disruptions

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Scott McIndoe of LegaSea at the Marsden Cove Fishing Club

Scott MacIndoe, the outspoken founder of LegaSea, visited the Marsden Cove Fishing Club last week (Tuesday 27 September) to warn its members about the Fisheries Amendment Bill, which is currently before Parliament.

Mr. McIndoe had some harsh things to say about Fisheries New Zealand bureaucrats who he calls the Mahi Kehu. He was more approving of Fisheries Minister David Parker, who he said gets a bit confused by what the Mahi Kehu are telling him.

The LegaSea concern is that a clause in the amendment bill will take

away the minister's obligation to oversee the management of the fishery to ensure its sustainability and his ability to act at his own discretion as he did last year when out of concern for severely depleted scallop beds in Northland and the Coromandel he closed these fisheries to give the beds time to recover. It will also remove the public's ability to lobby the Minister.

Current legislation protects the rights of recreational fishers and Māori customary fishers and sets the Total Allowable Commercial Catch after allowances have been made to these interests.

The bill proposes preset decision rules across the board. The allocation for recreational fishers would lose its priority protection and would be set alongside the commercial allocation.

While celebrating another section of the bill, which makes it mandatory for commercial fishing boats to carry cameras recording fishing activity, LegaSea is concerned that there is a trade off in the downgrading of the priority for public fishing rights.

Mr. McIndoe said it has been proven that preset rules, which are likely to be based on estimations of the size of the remaining fish stock, don't work as they are open to manipulation.

He told the meeting how he had taken issue with the author of a report in favour of the pre set rule change. He had told her that the allocations needed to be based on retaining 50% of the available biomass of the various fish stock.

She had replied that being this restrictive would make it unaffordable for many New Zealander to be able to afford their Friday night fish and chips.

In return he had asked how creating abundance would make fish unaffordable.

He said fishing companies are not making the best use of the fish they catch and there needed to be more processing in New Zealand to make our fish exports more profitable.

For example his favourite eating fish is trevally and "Year after year we export 800 tons of trevally, which is frozen whole."

This fetches a price of just \$3 a kilo.


"It is shipped not flown, so it's not going to be in great condition when it gets to market either."

LegaSea is a not for profit organization with the stated aim of restoring the abundance, biodiversity and health of New Zealand's marine environment and ensuring that future generations will be able to catch fish.

Mr. Mcindoe thanked the Marsden Cove Fishing Club for its support of LegaSea's work and urged members to write to the Minister of Primary Industries the Honoarable David Parker. pointing out problems in the Fishereis Ammendment Bill.

Roadworks to improve safety near college



Safety concerns at the northern end of Peter Snell Road, between the shopping centre and Bream Bay College, will soon be addressed by major changes to the road's layout. Starting on 1 October, works will include installing new raised platforms, lighting, zebra crossings,new kerb and channel and improved footpaths, followed by new road marking to provide clearer directions to road users about the need for care in the area. New road markings will ultimately extend the full-length of Peter Snell Road. To minimise disturbance to residents, the work has been scheduled to be completed during the two weeks of the

school holidays.

The Road to Zero safety

project's aim is reduce vehicle

speeds around the school to comply with national speed limit changes recently implemented by Central government and responds to a petition signed by about 170 locals.


The new zebra crossings will be on raised platforms across Peter Snell Road between the school and the shops.
An avenue of phoenix palms (now considered noxious weed species) will also be removed.

The existing slip lane from Marsden Point Road into Peter Snell Road will be removed to reduce vehicle speeds and provide more onroad parking on Marden Point Road outside the shopping centre.

Peter Snell Road will be reduced to a single lane in each direction and the space previously occupied by two

outer lanes will be used for new bus parking. New angled parking will be installed along Peter Snell Road for the sports parks, local skate area and school (overflow parking for the shopping centre as well). New lighting will be installed to support improved pedestrian crossing facilities and over the next few months Council's team will be consulting with the community about further safety work including investigating on-road cycle lanes.

A large electronic sign board will be placed in the area over the next few days to advise locals of the upcoming disruption and changes to lane layouts during the work.

How to put your old newspapers to good use

Dave Bell of the Waipu Lions wants old newspapers, as many as possible dropped off at his home at 13 Inverness Way, Waipu. Dave will deliver these to Orewa where the Lions Club has an arrangement with a company called Erosion Control.


This company shreds paper and mixes it with grass seed and a sticking agent to make a product, which is sprayed onto new cuts on the roadside, in new subdivisions etc. to prevent the exposed clay washing away in the first rainstorm. The absorbent quality of newsprint paper helps to retain moisture to give the seeds a chance to germinate. Those green coloured roadside banks visible along State High Way One are examples of this product's use. Erosion Control pays \$5 for 15 kilograms of newspaper, which the Orewa Lions uses to sponsor young people on voyages on board the Spirit of New Zealand.

Dave has an arrangement with Orewa that some of the proceeds from newspaper collected here comes

back to Bream Bay. The Waipu Lions already subsidize several local young people each year on the ten-day sea voyages and Dave is hopeful the newspaper collection will enable more local youth to benefit.

He encourages people to collect their newspapers in banana boxes as a full banana box equates to around 15 kilos and makes it easier for him to keep a tally. He has a collection of boxes if anyone needs one for this purpose. He suggests neighbours band together to fill boxes and is willing to pick up the papers if there is a reasonable amount. Otherwise boxes of papers can be dropped at his address. Dave's phone number is 09 432 0861.

"It's dirty work" said Liz Grace, "but it feels good and we always have a laugh". The nursery only started three months ago but already has nearly a 1000 plants growing for community projects including the Waipu to Waipu Cove cycle trail and the Waipu River Walk. The sessions run from 9am to 12noon at Tahamoana Farm, 566 Cove Rd. All are welcome. Bring your own mug. Call nursery manager Coralie for more information or to discuss donating eco-sourced seeds: i.e: seeds from old trees that are growing here naturally and not purchased from nurseries. Coralie's number is 0274 320 293.

She is partiuclarly keen to get hold of some puriri seeds as she thinks these trees, which are a favourite of possums were once common along Waipu's waterways. Puriri can be hard to germinate and Coralie advises that you need to look out for piles of pigeon poo. Once the seeds have been through a pigeon's digestive system they spring up more easily.

School election results delayed

The results of the Bream Bay College Board of Trustee elections have still not been announced.

The school's Principal Wayne Buckland explained that after setting up an electronic voting system the school has had to resort back to postal voting as a necessary permission from the Ministry of Education for electronic voting had not been obtained. Consequently a new time line for the election has been set.

Eight people were nominated for six spots on the board. The names of the successful candidates will now be announced on 24 October.

Tsunami sirens all in working order

Tsunami testing around Northland went off without a hitch on Sunday morning 25 September. All the local sirens were found to be working although some coastal residents inside their homes with double glazed windows didn't hear them.

Waipu's Civil Defence co-ordiantor Maryann Huisman said she had received a report that the sirens could not be heard in Waterman Drive at Langs Beach.

Northland Regional Councillor Rick Stolwerk said the sirens are intended to be one on a number of tsunami warning systems. People will also receive warnings on their phones and if they want can purchase a siren for their home at \$150.

He said Northland's sirens are about to be replaced with new louder sirens that will give spoken instructions. However this might not solve the double-glazing problem for everyone, as they will be more spaced out with just half the number of current sirens.
