Meeting to discuss concerns over housing development

At a rough count, 60 people turned up to a Ruakākā community meeting to discuss the proposed Kainga Ora 50 home development planned for Tamingi St., Peter Snell Rd., and Tiki Place. It was a warm evening so people did well to sit it out

The consensus of the meeting seemed to be that people did not oppose the development outright but were concerned about its density and the effect on their "close knit community "of all those new homes.

Mandi Brown said it was hard for people who had lived in the same homes for 42 years to learn that their house would now be demolished. The homes meant a lot to them. They had raised children and grandchildren in them and held tangi for family members.

She was concerned that the proposed new houses had no space for children to play in and would not have garages.

Mandi said, "We lost three people last year and village residents were

Frightened about what the new development would bring."

She said some private house owners have put their homes on the market and are moving away. There were three homicides in the village in 2023. Two infants were killed at their home in Peter Snell Rd. in May and 24-year -old Teina Pickering was found dead in the same street on the morning of 12 October.

Mandi said she had received online criticism from people outside Ruakākā who had told her it was selfish

EDITORIAL

White sands and an old man's welcoming features in the contours of Mount Manaia

It was quite a sight the cruise ship Regatta coming into berth at Northport this morning (Sunday 4 October) just as the sun rose over Bream Head. As cruise ships go the Regatta is a small one but, nevertheless, with her multi storied rows of cabins she loomed large as she came into the harbour.

This is the first cruise ship to come into our port and extensive arrangements were in place to make sure the visit went smoothly.

Luckily the weather co-operated. If the windy conditions of yesterday had persisted then the ship may have simply bypassed us on her way to the Bay of Islands.

I had a brief conversation with the ship's Italian captain Giulio Ressa and I asked him what his initial impressions of Marsden Point were. He said he had first noticed the white sands of our beaches and as he came past Manaia he saw in the contours of the mountain the features of an old man welcoming him.

I am reminded once again that markets, art centres and museums are all very well but our most important assets, what our visitors value most, are the natural features of this place and we need to put more effort into restoring and caring for these

Justice for Teina

I have been trying to find out if there have been any developments in the Police investigation of the death of 24-year-old Teina Pickering in Ruakākā Village on 12 October last year.

The young man's body was found in the street in the early hours of the morning. Residents reported the sound of a vehicle driving away at speed.

I never met Teina Pickering but I have a son of around the same age and I feel deeply the tragedy of this young man's death.

I think it is important that we establish how and why he died and hold the people responsible to account. It's not just a matter for the Police. Justice is something the whole community should be asking for. If anyone is withholding information I think you should come forward. We need to understand how and why this happened in order to try to prevent it ever happening again.

I have been phoning and emailing back and forth between the media departments of the Police and the Ministry of Justice but not getting terribly far. As far as I can make out, the two men who were arrested shortly after Teina's death are being held on firearms charges and, in the case of Ethan Hokai also on resisting arrest and assaulting a police officer. Mr. Hokai has been convicted on these charges and is waiting to be sentenced while the other man, who has name suppression, will appear in court next month. That's all I know.

First Cruise Ship to arrive at Northport

The first scheduled cruise ship to come into Northport arrived in Whangārei Harbour just as the sun rose over North Head on Sunday 4 February.

Waiting to greet her were members of the hapu Patuharakeke, kapahaka performers from Bream Bay College and a line up of politicians including: Vince Cocurullo, Mayor of Whangārei, in his mayoral robes and chain, Whangārei MP Shane Reti, who said he had predicted many years ago that if the Hundertwasser Centre was built the ships would come, and the Minister of Tourism, Matt Doocey, who with a similar hair style to Christopher Luxon imagined that the ship's passengers watching from balconies above would be texting home to say the Prime Minister of New Zealand had turned up to welcome them.

At the end of the formalities plaques were exchanged between the Regatta crew and Northport representatives: a photograph MS Regatta from her crew and from Northport a picture of the port set on a rimu plaque sourced from an old school desk at One Tree Point school. Jon Moore, CEO of Northport, told the Bream Bay News this is a tradition when a ship makes a first visit to a port.

Meanwhile behind the seated officials cruise ship passengers filed down the gangplank to board waiting buses transporting them to a variety of destinations including the Whangārei Town Basin and the Matakohe and Waipu Museums. The Regatta departed for the Bay of Islands at 8pm on the same day.


This was the first of three cruise ship visits scheduled for Northport this summer. Another five are booked for the 2024/2025 season and a further three in early 2026.

Recycling changes from 1 February

Lids, caps, bottletops and spray cans are now excluded from Council's red recycling bin collection, following government recycling rules that came in on 1 February. We will still be collecting rinsed 1, 2 and 5 plastic bottles and containers and tins

in the red crate and of course, glass in the blue crate. Aerosol cans often still contain flammable or poisonous gases and other chemicals that can escape when the cans are crushed. Very few recycling plants in New Zealand are set up to manage the fumes and risk of fire.

Small lids are being excluded because they are often too small for recycling plant machines to sort. From a health and safety point of view, leaving lids on bottles or containers also traps liquids or food and that contaminates the recycling.

Just a correction to your article on the Gateway service centre. The land between Ranburn and the fire station that Coralie and I went through the resource consent process with was not 'rural production" land as Councillor Ken Couper is reported as having said. It was in fact 85% living one zone (housing) with the other 15% being the business three zone that we needed for the planned project. Prior to that it had been a site of commercial activity as the local sale yards and show grounds for decades and then as part of Ranburn single men's village for the refinery expansion. I'm not sure that a horse paddock counts as rural production.

When Councillor Couper was chair of the Waipu Centennial Trust Board, he objected on their behalf to our proposed development on the grounds that it would have a negative impact (and I quote)

"The impact on the vibrancy of the Waipu village main street"

"Waipu is included in the WDC long term structure plan as an historic village. We believe the proposal compromises the stated aims of this long term plan"

"Village character - the museum plays a large part in developing the character and atmosphere of the village. This proposal does neither".

That small group who battled to stop our sympathetically designed, small addition to the fabric of Waipu should have their hands deep in their pockets again to mount a similarly funded defence of the village to prevent a new town springing up on the other side of the highway.

Now that really would have a negative impact.

Sunflowers amongst the maize

Craig and Ann-Maree Roberts have a nice display of sunflowers in the maize paddocks along their State Highway One boundary fence just south of Waipu. The flowers are catching the eye of passers by and drawing attention to a sign advertising subdivision lots at the rear of the paddocks. Craig said marketing was the reason for planting the flowers and, what's more, it seems to be working with lots of enquiries coming in. The sunflowers are edible by cattle and will be harvested along with the maize and go into the feed

A big eight-row planter was used to get the sunflowers and maize crop planted simultaneously, with the eighth feeder bucket filled with sunflower seeds.

A good year to be a farmer

There's a lot that can go wrong with a maize crop but this summer the plants are tall and deep green and it looks like a good harvest coming up. This is in sharp contrast to last summer when maize paddocks were under water for much of the season with the crop stunted and yellowing

Graham Hargreaves has planted his usual 35 hectares in maize. There have been a few challenges. He planted early and about half his seed was lost in a cold wet spell of spring weather. There was also some rodent and bird damage and up on his runoff half way up Helmsdale Rd. wild pigs swam across the river and dug up and gobbled the seed.

"They say corn seed is like cocaine for pigs" he said. They can smell it in the ground and find it irresistible. He had to replant about half his maize fields. The price of the seed was covered by the seed supply company's insurance but the other expenses were borne by the farm.

The replacement seed has done well and providing the fall armyworm doesn't arrive or the big storm forecaster Ken Ring has predicted doesn't come about, there should be a good harvest.

Last week crop assessors were looking through the maize plantings to check for pests. A tiny parasitic wasp has been introduced to combat the army worm so hopefully this is having an effect.

Mr. Hargreaves said spraying for the catepillars will also kill off the wasp so he will have a tricky decision if the assessors tell him he needs to do this. There is also a withholding period before you can harvest after insecticide has been applied so sometimes you need to make a decision to harvest early before there is too much damage.

"In Northland we always need to be ready for floods in the winter and droughts in the summer. But so far this year the weather has been good. There is plenty of grass and we have good crops of silage. This year its good to be a farmer and we can make up for some of the damage caused last summer.

Graham is still making repairs after the destruction of Cyclone Gabrielle which brought down many trees and fences.

An update on Meridian's Ruakākā Energy **Park**



A drone photograph supplied by Meridian of the four hectare site o at the intersection of Rama Rd. and Port Marsden Highway in Marsden Point where a battery storage system capable of of storing 100 megawatts of electricity, enough to supply the whole of Northland's 60,000 homes with two hours of electricity on the coldest night of the year.

Chris More, Head of Renewable Construction, with Meridian Energy has provided an update on the Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) under construction at the intersection of Port Marsden Highway and Rama Rd. in Marsden Point. He said, "Construction works continue onsite, mostly focussed on the equipment foundations and buildings, and the installation of underground ducts". "The first two shipments of 18 batteries each (out of 80 in total) are currently in transit from the manufacturer in China, and are due to start arriving in early February. Up to 30 people are usually working onsite comprising teams from Meridian, United Civil and Arco Group. Mr. More said the onsite installation and commissioning

of the batteries and associated equipment will begin soon and then we will see teams from Northpower, Saft , the battery supplier and Mackay Electrical teams will be working onsite.

Meridian has also purchased a nearby farm where it is proposing to build a 170ha solar farm. Mr. More reiterated this would produce roughly 120MW of electricity, "providing a significant and reliable power supply in Northland and reducing the reliance on electricity generated from other parts of the country." He said this part of the Ruakākā Energy Park project is still in the consenting phase, and Meridian hopes to provide more information in a few monts time.

Nova Scotia Road upgrade part of the Road to Zero programme due to fatal crash there in 2022

A major safety upgrade is underway on Nova Scotia Rd. in Waipu. The construction company Ventia has the contract to widen the road's shoulders, lay down bypass route. some new high skid resistance pavement, install safety barriers and upgrade the drainage.

All going well, the drainage work will be completed prior to the Brynderwyn closure on 26 February.

The remaining work will be completed when the section of State Highway One over the Brynderwyns re-opens in early May.

The total agreed project cost (as of January 31, 2024) is \$540,754.28. The New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA)has subsidised about 53% of this equal to

\$286,599.77.

Nova Scotia Rd. will form part of the Brynderwyn

There is also a plan for a roundabout to be installed at the Nova Scotia Rd./ SH1 intersection, which will also channel extra traffic along the road.

However Peter Phung of the Northland Transportation Alliance said the NZTA funding comes under under a "Low Cost Low Risk Road to Zero programme 2021-202", and" is a localized safety treatment due to a fatal crash that happened in early 2022", and is separate from the roundabout project.



Improvements made to the Mair Rd. beach access sand ladder

Department of Conservation senior staff met with members of the Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association on Thursday afternoon 25 January to discuss the Mair Rd beach access.

A sand ladder with steps made of half round posts bolted to two lengths of heavy chain had been installed

> down over the dunes just prior to Christmas to replace a set of wooden stairs smashed by Cyclone Gabrielle in February 2023.

Members of the RRRA had complained to DOC that the sand ladder was not fit for purpose as it was difficult for many people to climb up it over the steep dune face. Furthermore, sand was eroding from underneath, leaving the half rounds exposed and likely to cause someone to trip.

Prior to the meeting, some improvements to the sand ladder had been made. The ladder had been lengthened to go all the way to the beach and the gaps under the half rounds had been filled with sand.

Peter Hope, of the RRRA, while agreeing the adjustments to the sand ladder were a big improvement but easer to use asked said the stairs had been installed by the Marsden Oil Refinery and he asked if it would be possible for the community to rebuild another set of stairs.

However, DOC's Head of Operations in Wangārei, Matiu Mataira said storms like Cyclone Gabrielle are likely to become more frequent and a wooden structure would be unlikely to remain in place for any length of time. Senior Ranger Anh Nguyen explained that a sand ladder is a floating structure and can adjust to the shape of the dunes.

Community liaison officer Matthew Hemara

said a sand ladder at Pataua Bay had survived Cyclone Gabrielle and over time had become stabalised with vegetation holding the sand under it in place. Mr. Hope asked if the DOC staff thought the ladder

was suitable for everybody to use. He said while reasonably fit people could negotiate it, it might be difficult for mothers carrying children or older people. However. Mr. Mataira said DOC can't make all its tracks accessible to everyone there were other beach access points along the length of Bream Bay which are

easier for people with walking difficulties to use. Robyn Armstrong (RRRA0 pointed out that the beach at Mair Rd already excludes some people as she can't take her grandchildren there because of the vehicles driving on the beach.

Mr. Hope said that motorbikes would be able to get up and down the sand ladder but Mr. Mataira asked, if there weren't many other places along the stretch of coast between Mair Rd and Ruakākā where motorbikes already illegally criss cross the dunes.

Grant Brown of the RRRA asked if the Department of Conservation would carry any liability if someone got injured on the sand ladder.

Mr. Mataira said a sign could be erected warning people that a reasonable level of fitness is needed to use the ladder. He said his rangers would carryout regular checks on how well the sand ladder was performing. Mr. Brown pointed out that the barrier blocking off where the stairway used to be is very flimsy and unsafe and Mr. Mataira said a new barrier would be built further back from the cliff face and some broken bollards which were placed to prevent vehicles driving to the edge of the dune face would be replaced. He said although funding was tight he would see if he could

find the resources for some upgrade work on the Mair

Rd. beach park.

Keith said with some of the terrible events such as murders and stabbings, which occurred in 2023 in the Ruakākā Village, he wanted to do something to make

everyone feel a bit better.

So what does he love about Ruakākā?

"The people and the beaches", he replied.

"There are some beautiful souls living here, particularly the people at the Bream Bay Community Support Trust."

He initially had 100 car stickers printed but if the demand is there, will print another batch.

Waipu Cove Surf Lifesavers rescue family from cave

A family of three became trapped by the high tide in the cave between Ding Bay and Langs Beach on Monday afternoon 22 January. They managed to call for help using a cellphone and were rescued by the Waipu Cove Surf lifesavers who arrived in an inflatable rescue boat.

Surf lifesavers Rick Stolwerk and Torrin Linkhorm entered the cave with rescue tubes. They swam a woman and a young girl aged about 10 year to the IRB which transported them to shore. Then they reentered the cave to rescue the father who they towed to shore with the aid of a rescue tube. Mr. Stolwerk who was involved in the rescue of a dog from the same cave last year, said this was a much more dangerous situation.

"The waves were lapping up the walls of the cave and the three were clinging to its sides."

The Waipu Fire Brigade was first on the scene and was preparing to lower ropes to the family in the cave below when the surf lifesavers arrived.

Police Report

Waipu man in court on a charge of presenting a firearm

A man has been charged following an incident at a rural Waipu property on Tuesday afternoon30 January 2024

The incident occurred between two men known to each other after 3.15pm.

During the interaction a firearm was presented by one man before the other left in his vehicle.

Police responded to the address and arrested a 65-year-old man.

He has been charged with presenting a firearm and will appear in the Whangārei District Court this week.

Police kept busy with family harm call outs

Over the past two weeks the time of Bream Bay police officers has been taken up predominantly with family harm incidents. In the 12 days Monday 22 January to Saturday 3 February attended nine family harm incidents in Ruakākā, two in Waipu and three in Maungaturoto.

Five mental health crises call outs

There were also a number of mental health crises incidents: four in Ruakākā and one in Waipu. In all these incidents Police attendance was sufficient to de-escalate the various situations and the people involved have been referred to partner agencies.

Truck crash in Paparoa

On Tuesday 23 January there was a truck crash in Paparoa. No other vehicle was involved and no-one was injured

Truck crash in Waipu

On Friday 2 February there was a single vehicle crash in Waipu involving a truck. No-one was injured.

Drowning victim named

Police have released the name of a man who drowned after getting into difficulty at Ruakākā Beach on January 18. He was Robert Vaughan Allison, aged 72, from Milford.

Investigation into Ruakākā homicide "ongoing"

The body of 24 year old Teina Pickering was discovered in Peter Snell road in the early hours of Thursday 12 October.

Two men were arrested and remanded in custody shortly afterwards. They were charged with a range of offences but none of these in direct relation to the death of Mr. Pickering.

Ethan Hokai has now been found guilty of assaulting a police officer, possession of a knife in a public place and possession of two shotgun cartridges. He awaits sentencing on these convictions On his arrest in October Police said further charges were likely but none appear to have been laid as yet.

The second man, has name suppression, and is charged with possession of a firearm. He is due to appear in the Whangārei District Court on 26 March.

Questions put to the NZ Police media services by the Bream Bay News confirmed the inquiry is ongoing but that the police "are unable to go into any detail about it at this time."

Work on Kainga Ora development going ahead as planned

In response to questions about the Ruakākā Village development going ahead despite a review of Kāinga Ora operations, Jeff Murray, the agency's Northland Regional Director said, "Work on the proposed redevelopment is progressing as planned."

He said, "Our first priority was to share the draft proposal with the community, which we did late last year, at a series of well-attended, local engagement events.

"The team are now finalising plans and working through the required resource consent application, which will be lodged with Whangārei District Council in the coming months for their decision."

He said, "Kāinga Ora has very high standards for our new homes and is proud to have a reputation for delivering well-designed, safe, quality homes.

And he gave assurances, "While the proposal would see people living closer together than previously, we know this style of living works when done well, and I can assure the community that considerable expertise has gone into these plans."

He said he is happy to meet with individuals or groups from the community that have questions or concerns regarding our proposal.

to oppose a development that would provide homes for people who needed them but her priority is to look after people who already live in the village.

Ella Armstrong asked who would get the new homes. She said it would be important to make sure they went to people who already lived in the area.

She told the meeting a group of local people had got together and formed an n action group around this issue. She invited others to join and said a range of skills are needed. She felt it was important to have a good line of communication with Kainga Ora and to get accurate information to share with village residents about the development.

Some wondered if the coalition government would halt the development, pointing out that the Minister of Housing Chris Bishop had raised concerns about Kāinga Ora's debt level and that former Prime Minister Bill English had been appointed to lead an inquiry into the housing agency's efficiency.

Val Baxter said she had returned to her home in Ruakākā Village after looking after her elderly mother in Whangārei. She had hoped this would be her "forever home" but for 18 months had had to put up with unruly Kāinga Ora tenants in a house nearby. She had twice been attacked by their dogs and on numerous occasions had been woken in the early hours by screaming and people running around half dressed in the street shouting abuse at one another. On one occasion she thought she heard a series of gunshots and in the morning discovered that every window in the kāinga ora house had been smashed along with the windows of vehicles parked in the driveway. It had taken 18 months for the housing agency to move these troublesome tenants on and she was concerned that all the extra tenancies available in the new development would bring more trouble into the village.

Tui Roman raised the issue of aging sewer pipes in the village and wondered if the system would cope with the 50 new homes.

People also asked if local schools and the Bream Bay Police would be able to handle all the new people who would live in the development

However, Mark Domican said it would be better "not to go outside the square" and to concentrate on the development itself, looking at issues such as the density of the homes, the lack of garages, whether or not pets would be allowed."

And Councillor Phil Halse said part of the reason for the decision to put this development in Ruakākā was the infrastructure: water supply and wastewater capacity, was taken care of.

He said there is a need for affordable housing in Ruakākā so people can move here to work in the area's industries. He said it has been a long held rule of thumb that houses shouldn't cost more than seven times a household annual income.

"All those million dollar houses down at One Tree Point are out of reach of many working families."

Three brigades battle fire on Ruakākā's Lakeside Industrial Park



Waipu lost one of its hard working volunteers earlier this month with the death of Keith Bishop. Keith was active in Lions where he was the administration officer and was largely responsible for the publication of the Bream Bay telephone directory for the last four years. He was also active in the Bridge Club as well as in the Scottish Dancing Association.

Keith was born in Gloucestershire. and raised in Spalding Lincolnshire, where he was Head Boy at the local high school. Following a gap year in Spain and three years at university studying Portuguese and history he became a project manager for a variety of companies whose work involved setting up and developing oil refineries.

He first worked on a con-

tract for the Air Force in Saudi Arabia, where he met his wife Ann who was working there as a nurse. After completing his masters degree in science back in England, his work took him to Portugal and the Haigh in Holland, where the model for the Marsden Point Refinery was built.

During this time Keith and Ann had three children - each born in a different country – Rebecca in England, Emma in Portugal, and Alexander in Holland.

Eventually, he was appointed to New Zealand so he and Ann with three children on board arrived in this country where Keith set about helping with the establishment of the Marsden Point Refinery.

Once ther refinery was up and running, his job was done, but he and his family liked New Zealand so they decided to stay. They moved to Auckland where Keith worked initially for Fletchers, but gradually, as he came to know the area, he moved into self-employment as a project manager, while at the same time he and Ann ran a Bed and Breakfast at Karekare.

He set himself the goal of walking all the tracks in the Waitakeres, a goal that was almost achieved had it not been for kauri die-back disease and the tracks being closed.

His other great interest was motorbikes, and at the time of his death he was a proud owner of a Royal Enfield.

Volunteering his time and skills had long been a part of Keith's life. In Auckland he was a Rotarian, he chaired AIM (Adults in Motion - a support organization for young people with disabilities), he helped train people to work on School Boards when Tomorrow's Schools came into being, and helped in the organization of HUGS (Helping Understand Grief through Suicide) started by his friend Diane Hay. When he settled in Waipu 8 years ago he immediately got involved in the Waipu Lions through his friends from refinery days, Robert and Idabelle Webb. Idabelle had been Keith's secretary at the refinery and Robert was his sponsor in Lions. He also loved Scottish dancing, and served as treasurer and secretary in that organization. He enjoyed playing bridge, and walking his dog, Felicity who was devoted to Keith.

Keith was always keen to get involved. He was able to work alongside people in all walks of life and his death has certainly left a hole in the lives of many in Waipu. We will miss him.

Keith is survived by his wife Ann and their three children.


