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# Plans for a shared cycle/walking pathway between OTP and

Ruakākā

A plan is afoot to build an off-road shared path for pedestrians, cyclists, scooter riders etc. between Marsden Cove and the Ruakākā Towncentre.

A group has been discussing the proposal for about eight months and meeting with Whangarei District Council, Northland Regional Council, Northland Transportation Alliance and Bike Northland representatives to try to get the project underway.

Last month the group met with Whangarei MP Emily Henderson after a survey she ran on sustainable transport options for the district drew a big response from One Tree Point residents who said they would like a safe path to cycle on between One Tree Point and Ruakākā.

The group has been considering route options for the pathway. One possibility is that a section linking Marsden Cove to McEwan Rd. could be built as part of the development planned by Marsden Maritime Holdings. A safe way for riders and walkers to get across the McEwan Rd bridge would then need to be found – perhaps a clip-on extension.

Once on Marsden Point Road there is space for a path where the new sewer line has recently been laid.

The Northland Transportation Alliance already has a long-term plan for a cycleway between Waipu and One Tree Point. A draft of a possible route has this running parallel to the gas and fuel pipeline in the Bream Bay dunes. However the shared pathway group has decided that,, while the seaside trail would be a good tourist attraction, a more direct route would be of more use to local people.

# **Dune restoration planting at the Taotahi** Walkway

Approximately 30 people, including many residents of the Ruakākā Village, turned up to a working bee on Sunday morning 3 September. Over 1,000 spinifex and pingao plants were supplied by the Northland Regional Council and NRC staff as well as Carole Tilman of the Department of Conservation's community liason team came to help with the project. A fence was put in to define the path to the beach with materials supplied by NRC. The NRC's Coastal Co-ordinator Laura Shaft said the dune damage was mostly caused by people walking and riding motorbikes. She hopes people will respect the restoration effort and keep to the fenced path. The morning's mahi was followed by a shared barbeque paid for by DOC. Contact details of people willing to form a neighbourhood group for ongoing dune protection work were collected.

winter rain and mud, the grass is growing and there is pink blossom on the peach trees. It's hard to be too despondent.



# Seafarers' mission gets a revamp

The Marsden Bay Mission to Seafarers has had a makeover. There haven't been too many seafarers coming ashore to use the facilities over the past six months so the opportunity was taken to give the facility

The walls have all been painted, the carpet has been given a thorough cleaning and new furniture has been bought.

The chapel has moved out of the living room and placed on the side of the building with chairs donated by Lifepoint Church and a view of Mount Manaia out the side window. Facility Manager Graeme Johnson said the seafarers who come ashore are of diverse religions so the chapel can also serve as a quiet room for those who want some time on their own.

Reverend Lance Lukin, the Regional Director for the Mission to Seafarers in Oceania spoke of the hard life many seafarers face: separated from their families, working for around \$1.25 an hour and sometimes unable to come ashore for months on end. He said Covid, which is not going to go away any time soon, is making life particularly hard for seafarers, with many of them unable to come ashore at all. Mental health problems and suicide rates are sky rocketing. The New Zealand economy and our standard of living is dependent on the work these men do.

He said the Mission and its volunteers play an important cold here.

"We welcome searfares. We invite them to engage with us. They show us photos of their children. We enable them to use wifi to connect with their families. It makes a difference."


He congratulated the board and volunteers of the Marsden Point Mission on the upgrade and said this was one of the best centres he visited.

Although it depends on the individual captains and Chinese ships in particular are very strict about not allowing their crews to leave their vessels, seafarers are starting to come ashore once more as Covid restrictions ease

Joanne Van Kooten is the port welfare office and ship visitor. She does shopping and buys treats and fresh fruit for those sailors who are unable to leave their ships. She has put an appeal out for fresh fruit from local gardens, which she delivers to the ships. Sometimes o she drives groups of seafarers on sightseeing tours around the district.

The Marsden Bay mission has a group of knitters who make beanies to present to the crews. Jon Moore CEO of Northport said that knitted beanies are a feature of Seafarers Missions around the world and the warm woolen hats are well received as many of the ships crews come from warmer climates and find it very

# Parking changes needed to cope with Waipu's growth

The issue of parking in Waipu is and has been much-debated. Suggested solutions range from creating timed parking (180 minutes) to new marked parking areas down Nova Scotia Drive.

The problem is compounded for casual parkers when people park all day in the Museum car park. These people should really be parking out of the Museum car park in streets away from the Village Centre and walking to work.

The Museum car park could have a few more car parks if it were slightly reconfigured. If the entrance was only by the monument / toilet end and the exit only by the Museum, another 4 car parks might be created as the entrance and exit areas would be narrower. This would also make it safer for pedestrians negotiating the main walkway of the Museum car park next to the Museum as there would only be cars moving in one direction, not two as at present. Such a change could also prove safer for cars to drive into and out of the supermarket car parks as people would not be slowing down to turn in by the Museum.

Pedestrians along the footpath of The Centre also 'toddle the gauntlet' of cars driving into or leaving (often reversing) the parks in front of the dairy and supermarket. This situation, while legal, is very dangerous for the pedestrian as vehicles often move before the driver looks. We should examine how we might allow these businesses to have their car parks without endangering pedestrians on the footpath. Angle parking for the supermarket against the road similar to that outside the hardware store and parallel parks for the dairy seem the safest solutions, but would probably not be welcomed by the businesses. It would, however give them prime opportunity to landscape directly in front of their stores and this may attract more customers. Residents will undoubtedly complain about any changes made to parking, but one should make safety in the Village Centre paramount.

As a recent arrival to Waipu, I have also been intrigued by another aspect of driver behaviour in the Village Centre that is very dangerous for pedestrians - the u-turn. There is the traditional front u-turn, but also the reverse u-turn across the street. While this may be convenient for the driver, it is a challenge for any pedestrian to suddenly find a vehicle (or even two) swinging towards them across the street.

As Waipu grows we need to look at making changes to car parking in the Village as one aspect to enhance our built environment.

# Police appeal for information after man's body found near Brynderwyn waterfall.

Police are appealing for information after body found on SH1 on the Brynderwyns

The body of a man was found on State Highway One near the waterfall alongside the road on the Brynderwyn Hill at around 8.30am on Saturday morning 3 September. A vehicle was recovered nearby and it appears the man may have stopped and got out of his car when he was hit by another vehicle. Police want to speak to anyone who was in the area of the Brynderwyn summit and Artillery Road between 7pm and 10pm on Friday 2 September. Please phone 105 if you can help.

# Seventy seven year old escapes with minor injuries after crash at Ruakākā roundabout.

It took some time for local firefighters and ambulance staff to extricate a 77- year old Auckland man from his vehicle after at around 10am on 30 August while on his way from Auckland to Kerikeri he failed to negotiate the Ruakākā/SH1 roundabout, knocking over a lamppost and rolling multiple times into a nearby paddock. The man escaped with only minor injuries, possibly due in part to the modern, high safety rated vehicle he was driving. Police are investigating the cause of the accident.

#### Three-vehicle pile up at Ruakākā roundabout

There was a three – vehicle nose to tail accident in the south bound lane at the Ruak $\bar{a}k\bar{a}$  SH1 roundabout at 8am on 23 August. One of the vehicles was towing a digger. No one was injured but tow trucks needed to be brought in and it took some time to clear the road

#### Ruakākā man in custody

A 46 – year - old Ruakākā man is remanded in custody after neighbours noticed what appeared to be a burglary attempt at an address in Marsden Point Rd. at 4pm on Wednesday on 31 August. He is charged with driving while disqualified, drunk driving and possibly also with attempted burglary.

#### Possible arson at Langs Beach

Police are investigating a possible arson after a shed was badly damaged by fire at Langs Beach on Friday 2 September. The fire endangered a nearby dwelling

# Driving at 129kmph on the Brynderwyns while over the alcohol limit

A young man driving at 129km per hour on SH1 on the Brynderwyns was stopped by Police and breath tested. The 19 - year - old Wellsford man returned a reading of 297 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. He will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on a drink driving charge. 

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# The Ruakākā Residents and Ratepayers Association sent a set of three questions to each of the candidates standing for the Whangārei Mayoralty Here are their answers.

#### Mike Budd



What will you be bringing to the office of Mayor which will make the district's ratepayers vote for you?

A tireless working approach that listens to the ratepayers and represents their needs. A business background to ensure every dollar is spent wise-

ly to support ratepayer services and growth. A leader who ensures that responsibility , accountability and deliverables are where councillors and WDC staff start their day. Focus on our roads and fight against three waters.

Hold quarterly community meetings where councillors and WDC staff meet with ratepayers. Also by, introducing quarterly key actions that need to ne monitored and met. A project will have a) A councillor who is responsible for the project b) a WDC person who is accountable for the project and c) a set of actions that are to be achieved by a certain time.

How will you ensure that delays in resource consenting are reduced?

This is not a silver bullet fix. We need to employ staff to handle the work load and also "keep" good staff in our organisation. To start this we need to assess remuneration and benefits to hold and entice new employees to want to work for the WDC.

### **Vince Cocurullo**



What will you be bringing to the office of Mayor which will make the district's ratepayers vote for you?

Experience; nine years' experience working on Council as an elected representative, 15 years' experience working with the community get-

ting projects through Council, over 22 years' experience working with businesses and local people dealing with their technology issues, 10 years' experience working in Civil Engineering designing and supervising construction projects, and all this experience has shown me that generally the local communities know how to fix their own issues, they just need the funds to do it.

Strength of Character; I stood by my principals by keeping local voices heard in Council, when some voted to disband the local wards, I stood against that and together we had that overturned. I will always stand up to central government on issues like Three Waters, as I firmly believe that the assets are owned by our residents, and I voted against taking the Three Waters "Better off funding" which I saw, and still believe, as a payment for our silence.

How will you ensure that delays in resource consenting are reduced?

# **Ken Couper**



What will you be bringing to the office of Mayor which will make the district's ratepayers vote for you?

I bring experience as a sitting Councillor, local businessperson, and rural farmer. I also bring strong, fair leadership to guide the Council to

work for the needs of ratepayers. This leadership and experience comes in many forms, like bringing decision-makers together, being present, having knowledge, listening, guiding the Council staff, and working with central government in Wellington. My priorities for ratepayers are: driving value for rates, more and better jobs, and strengthening communities for a family friendly, safe environment.

How will you ensure that the executive is fully accountable to the Council?

I believe that Whangarei deserves strong, fair leadership to guide the Council to work for the betterment of the district. We need to set a clear strategy that elected members and Council staff back 100%. This includes amendments to the district plan, which must include measurable deliverables. Working to get everyone on board is key – when the Council sets its collective efforts on something it can be a powerful driver positive change. I think the other key is consistency: once the direction is set and the plan made clear, we must stay the course and review progress regularly.

How will you ensure that delays in resource consenting are reduced?

Having personally worked on subdivisions, I know the delays are an issue and I acknowledge that consenting is taking too long. We must recognise the causes, which are a shortage in planners and the heightened demand from growth in the district (which is ultimately a positive thing). I think there are two keys here. First, getting the consenting department more capacity is a priority. Second, I believe that there should be streamlined services offered for cookie-cutter projects and for mum-and-dad investors that allow these groups to navigate the system as a matter of priority.

# **Brad Flower**



What will you be bringing to the office of Mayor which will make the district's ratepayers vote for you?

I will be bringing over 30 years of experience working in and on behalf of the community with diverse groups. I have the skills and experience to remove the current

dysfunction from the council chamber and ensure as a collective we move the District forward together.

The process requirements for resource consents (as it stands) needs to be enforced and look at where the 'blockages' are. If it is as simple as a lack of people resource then council needs to ensure the gaps are filled.

#### Fiona Green

Empathy, Administration and management skills, inclusive practices as extra support to some of the systems in place including modifi-

Shelley apologized for not letting people know sooner that she would





# Ken Couper for Mayor of Whangarei District

Ken Couper is a community man. He spends much of his time working with local community organisations, speaking with local people and helping those around him. 
