

Turning the sod for the new Ruakākā Recreation Centre building

Torrents of rain and strong gusts of wind battered the small group of people attending a sod turning ceremony for the new Ruakaka Recreation Centre on Friday morning 27 January 2023. Is this a good omen?

Phil Paikea and Ari Carrington gave their blessings to the project saying that the new facility would be something many people would benefit from.

Andreas Thirling, Chairman of the Ruakaka Recreation Committee, acknowledged that the build had taken some time to get underway but said now that it had finally begun he was sure any shortfall in funding would be overcome. In July 2020 the project was allocated \$2.5 million in the Shovel Ready Covid 19 recovery fund. The Whangārei District Council allocated a further \$1 million in its 2021 -2023 long Term Plan to build a parking area alongside the new facility

Sarah Simperingham thanked the Recreation Centre committee members for all the mahi they had put in to get to this stage.

"I have 100 children and this is going to be something that will benefit them all." Site foreman Johnny Wright of the company Earthworks attended the event and said he was pleased to be involved in such a great project.



Uretiti campground under water



The frog life is phenominal

"We need to change our name to the Uretiti Lakes," Uretiti Camp Manager Steve Farrow joked.

"How about Uretiti Water World? "replied a couple booking in for an extra night as they did not want to travel south as planned due to the stormy weather and all the damage on the highway

Big lakes have formed in the Uretiti campground and the land available for setting up tents or parking campervans and caravans has been greatly reduced.

Despite the best efforts of camp managers Steve Farrow and Adrien Chevrier, the lakes and flooded roads remain.

They have purchased pumps and brought in multiple truckloads of metal from the Mountfield Quarry in an attempt to keep the roads through the camp open. But the water just keeps rising.

"We are right at the bottom of the line here. We get all the rain washing off the road and from the farmland behind," said Steve.

Even after a week of dry sunny weather the ponds have kept filling.

He described how when he drove a spade down into some spongy ground a waterspout came up a metre into the air. There was that much pressure in the water

table below.

Its the prime camping locations closest to the beach which are the worst affected,

"The frog life is phenomenal. At night the noise of their croaking is deafening," said Steve. There are also ducks, herons and black swans.

At least there are no mosquitoes. All the tadpoles keep these under control.

He wonders if this weather pattern in here to stay. The camp was looking so good but trees and shrubs are turning yellow with their roots sitting in water.

The volunteer group of regular campers, which has done extensive planting in the camp is considering a change of tack – planting wetland species in place of dry land shrubs.

Over Christmas and New Year they reduced the camps capacity from 1000 to 750 individuals and set up new rules where vehicles had to be left in a designated area so there was more space on dry land for tents. To save space campervans and caravans had to be parked parallel to one another.

Steve has had to tow many vehicles out of the boggy ground.

Who decides how many cones get put out on a project? At \$2 per cone per day someone is reaping huge magins. I counted on one project over 250 cones, \$500 per day. I understand approximately 32% of the roading budget is now spent on health and safety. Whilst we want to protect workers and ensure their safety I think the number of cones could be reduced by 70% and still be very effective. The huge number of cones in some places actually create a hazard at night as the reflection can create confusion.

Last week a campervan and a caravan remained land locked unable to drive through the water that surrounded them.

Then on top of all this, Anniversary Weekend saw another 250mm of water arrive, 170mm of this on Friday alone. With State Highway One over the Brynderwyns blocked many people cancelled their bookings. In Anniversary Weekend of 2022, 760 people stayed at the camp. On Monday 30 January there were just 40 campers on site. With 600 people booked in for Waitangi Weekend Steve was wondering if they would be able to cope.

The camp has lost many tens of thousands of dollars in revenue and despite

this big drop in income it still has expenses.

"Everyone misses out. The campers miss out, the camp misses out and local business also lose trade."

When the campers don't come local business suffers

Anton Trist, manager of Camp Waipu Cove, was hoping for more settled weather over Waitangi Weekend.

The camp at capacity can cater for 900 people and had been booked out since Christmas but last week after all the rain, flooding and road closures there were just 50 people staying there.

Anton said all local business suffers, including restaurants, shops and service when the campers don't turn up.

The seven-day Civil Defence emergency declaration had led to many cancellations however, since this had been called offbookings were coming in once again. Camp Waipu Cove has 16 cabins and these have been fully booked throughout.

The cabins give the camp a year round income as while people are not usually keen on sleeping in tents over the winter months many still want a break away from home at the beach.

While most campers headed home when weather

warnings came through on Friday 27 January one brave man stayed through the night in his tent and appeared "not too worse for wear" in the morning. Staff at the Ruakākā Beach Holiday Park were also taking bookings in advance of Waitangi Weekend. Manager Anne-Marie Abel said the camps 350 sites weret two thirds booked by last Friday 3 February. . A family with two adults and two or three children had braved the torrential rain of Friday night 27 January in "a really good tent."

They commented the next morning that they had enjoyed the experience and were glad to be here in Ruakākā, rather than in the Auckland floods.

Both Anton and Anne -Marie didn't think the closure of State Highway One over the Bryndersyns would be a deterrent for Waitanig Weekend campers as many people preferred to come via the scenic route anyway.

Police Report

Fatal two car collison on Drink drivers One Tree Point Road

A 25-year-old local man was killed and a 42-yearold woman, also a local, was injured and taken to Whangārei Hospital by ambulance in a two car collision on One Tree Point Rd., near the Marsden City subdivision, on Thursday 26 January at around 5.45pm. Police are investigating but it appears one of the vehicles crossed the centre line.

Man's body recovered from the Waipu River.

Police responded to a report of a distressed person in the Waipu River near the Boat Club at around 10am on Monday 23 January. The Waipu Volunteer Fire Brigade and the Northland Rescue Helicopter also attended. The body of a 69 year - old man was recovered from the river. The death has been referred to the coroner.

Taxi taken in aggravated robbery found in Ruakākā

A taxi stolen from Onerahi on Wednesday 1 February was recovered in Ruakākā and two local youths aged 15 and 17 have been identified by Police and are being dealt with. The taxi driver was threatened and forced out of his vehicle by the two young men, one of them brandishing a screwdriver. The taxi has been returned to its owner and the two young men face charges of making a threat with a weapon and unlawfully taking a motor vehicle.

Series of crashes on Waipu Cove Rd.

With the closure of State Highway One over the Brynderwyns and the diversion via Mangawhai and Waipu Cove there has been a series of minor crashes with vehicles running off the road and in some cased flipping over on Waipu Cove Rd. By Friday 3 February at 9.30am the tally was five crashes but no serious injuries.

More than three times over the limit

On 20 January at 2.30pm Police stopped a vehicle on State Highway One near Mata after reports of poor driving by other motorists. The driver a 30-year-old Waipu man returned a breath alcohol reading of 940 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath and will be appearing in the Whangārei District Court on drink driving charges. The legal limit for drivers over the age of 20 is 250 micrograms.

Found driving with alcohol in breath on zero licence

On Tuesday February 2, a vehicle was stopped by Police on Marsden Point Rd. The driver, a 42-year-old Waipu man was on a zero alcohol license following earlier drink driving convictions. He returned a breath alcohol reading of 150 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath and will be appearing in court on a drink driving charge.

Drink driving infringement notices issued


• On 22 January at 6pm a vehicle was stopped by Police at Mata. The driver was breath tested and returned a reading of exactly 400 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. He was issued with an infringement notice and forbidden to drive in the next 12 hours. Police practice is to issue infringement notices to drivers returning breath test readings up to and including 400 micrograms of alcohol and to bring drink driving charges against those whose levels exceed this amount.

• On 22 January at 6.30pm a vehicle was stopped by Police on Plover St. in One Tree Point. The driver returned a reading of 354 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath and was issued with an infringement notice and forbidden to driver for 12 hours.

On 24 January a large red fishing kayak with a seat and pedals was stolen from the beach front of the Ruakaka Beach Holiday Park.

The family moved to Waipu in 2004 after Achmed had spent two years finishing work on a partly built house they purchased high on a hill in McAdam Rd., in rural Waipu.

Achmed began teaching local children circus skills fifteen years ago with regular Friday after school classes in the Waipu Coronation Hall. The young circus performers travelled with Achmed to circus carnivals, gave performances at local fairs, added a circus twist to Art'n Tartan shows and each year came up with a spectacular float entry for the Waipu Christmas Parade.



"The ship is afloat but the skipper (me) has left so the boat is drifting around", said Achmed.



Helmsdale and Millbrook Roads not fit for heavy vehicle traffic

With State Highway One over the Brynderwyns blocked by slips some truck drivers drove down Millbrook and Helmsdale Roads to get back onto the highway rather than follow the Oakleigh/Paparoa Rd all the way to Oakleigh.

This was a big concern to the roads' residents who say their roads are in no state to cope with so much heavy traffic. Jossie Turner, who lives on Grant Rd. off Millbrook Rd., said there are places where banks had slipped or are threatening to slip leaving clay and rubble partly blocking the road and sections where the road has fallen away reducing it to a single lane.

Josie said she hoped this situation would demonstrate to the Whangārei District Council that the sealing of Helmsdale Road needed to be higher up on its priorities list.

Neither WDC or NRC able to remove dead cow

The bloated body of a dead cow washed up on the bank of the Waipu River near the cemetery last week.

Dave and Maggie Wistrand discovered it there on Thursday 2 February, while out walking their dogs.

It smelt terrible and they phoned first the Whangārei District Council, which was unable to help and then the Northland Regional Council. The NRC sent a woman out to inspect the dead animal but she informed the Wistrands that the NRC couldn't do anything either. Next Dave phoned our NRC representative Rick Stolwerk who made some phone calls, including one to the NRC's CEO Jonathan Gibbard but still no action. At this point a group of locals took the matter into their own hands and used a jetski to tow the dead animal out beyond the river mouth.

It has since washed up on the beach north of Waipu Cove.

Stormwater drain a safety hazard

This large tree became uprooted from the rain soaked ground and toppled over, falling across South Rd overnight on 1/2 February, blocking traffic until it was chainsawed into pieces and removed by Whangārei District Council contractors.

overflowing after the heavy rain that fell on Friday.

After hearing about the drownings in flooded culverts in the Auckland floods Carole Calvert, who owns two properties backing onto the culvert, was concerned a similar tragedy could happen here. Storm water from surrounding sections in Glenn Wallace Rd. drain into the culvert, which Carole said she tries to keep clear of leaves and other debris. Carole is hopeful that with the increased development of residential housing in the Ferry Rd. area the storm water system there will be upgraded.

Waipu water main replacement

Some major water main replacement work is underway in Waipu.

The project involves the replacement of water main pipes in Braemar Lane, Shoemaker Road, Ferry road and the Braigh. The Braemar Lane section has been completed and the Shoemaker Rd /Ferry Rd section is well underway.

In total, a kilometre of pipe will be replaced.

The old water main was between 50-60 years old and mostly made of asbestos cement with some smaller diameter alkathene as well. The new pipe is made of



polyethelene. It is the same size as the existing lines or slightly larger. The size varies depending on each site but the replacement pipe is a mixture of 50mm, 100mm and 150mm

Whangārei District Council's Water Distribution Technician Tim Gibbs said the new water main replacement will reduce water disruptions caused by increasing maintenance needed on the old pipework. It will also reduce leaks and water loss in general."

Northern Pipe and Civil are carrying out the work at a cost of \$445.228.

"I'm big fan of our native birds, plants, and sea-life." Evan states. By isolating every part of a body the animator could piece it back together to create a workable, moving character. This experience helped shape Evan's style.

Robert Patrick Peni 15 May 1945 – 16 January 2023

Tributes from former colleagues and fellow sports club members are flowing in for Bob Peni, a teacher, school principal, sportsman and dedicated family man who died on 16 January after a long illness.

Judith Boyd, who as school administrator worked closely with Bob when he was Principal of Ruakākā Primary School, recalls what a gentleman Bob was.

"He was always very appreciative and called me his 'guardian angel.' You can do things for people and they hardly seem to notice but Bob always did." Judith has kept some of the kind notes Bob wrote for her as mementos in her "box of treasures."

She said a line Bob wrote in the foreward to the Ruakaka School reunion book "sums him up for me." The line was, "Iha koa he iti he pounamu" - The little things we do make a difference.


Paul Ramsay, former Principal of Waipu Primary and fellow tennis player said, "Bob was Principal of

Ruakākā Primary School when I came to Waipu in 1999. He was very welcoming and having a common interest in tennis we got along well. Most Friday nights we headed to Thomas Neale tennis courts to play Interclub. Even in his 50s Bob rarely lost a match and I certainly never beat him in our "hit ups". "Bream Bay principals were a tight professional group. Bob, myself and Adrian Smith (former OTP Principal) were the instigators of the Bream Bay Gifted and Talented Group. This was known as "The Great White Sharks " and run by Michelle Parsons-Sim. Even when he retired Bob remained the social coordinator of the principal's group and always turned up with a rose for the ladies when the occasion came up.

"Even after suffering a stroke five years ago Bob maintained his positive outlook and sense of humour. More mai ra e Te Rangitira"

Bob was born in Shannon on 15 May 1945, the second son of Archie and Tiriwa Peni. It was a big family with Bob one of 10 children. He attended Shannon Primary School and Te Aute College in Hastings but finished his secondary schooling at Taumarunui High when his parents moved to farm on family land there.

Bob, along with his siblings, excelled at sport. As a

in Hawkes Bay, Lynda and Bob returned north to settle at One Tree Point where they brought up their children Matt and Kara.

Bob was Principal of Portland and Maungatapere Schools before becoming Principal of Ruakākā Primary from where he retired in 2007. He continued to teach as a reliever, mostly at Ruakākā School where his grandchildren attended, and helped Lynda in her real estate business as well as spending time with his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

As a sportsman he was always highly competitive. He was the Waipu Tennis Club's men's champion for six years from 1991 to 1996. He won 14 titles in Aotearoa Maori Tennis and played in the New Zealand veterans' tennis team many times.

He was a keen squash player and played rugby for Waipu. He was a single figure golfer and a long time member of the Waipu Golf Club up until he suffered a severe stoke five years ago.

Bob never gave up his determination to stay fit and to walk again. He exercised in his wheelchair, attended weekly training sessions as well as a stroke aquatics class until the Covid 19 mandates took this opportunity away. He wrote in his diary every day, read and constantly watched Sky Sport.

Just before Christmas 2022 Bob was diagnosed with

Having completed his high school education he went on to Ardmore Teachers College where he continued to enjoy a wide range of sports.

Bob met his wife Lynda in Tokoroa when they were both teaching at the same school then followed her North to start their married life in Waipu in 1971. After several years teaching in small country schools terminal cancer. He was determined to spend one last Christmas at home with his family around him and this was made possible with the help and support of Hospice and Health Vision carers.

A service for Bob was held at the Takahiwai Marae on Thursday 19 January followed by his internment at the Waipu Cemetery.
