

Alternative highway route around the Brynderwyns a priority for business

The damaged and blocked roads are causing major problems for Paul Jensen, owner of Waipu's Fresha Valley milk-processing plant.

Each day at least four and sometimes as many as eight of his trucks travel to Auckland with milk for the city's supermarkets. The larger trucks need to travel via Dargaville while the smaller ones can go via Oakleigh/ Paparoa.

Four trucks travelling via Dargaville to Auckland amounts to 600 extra kilometres each day. Truck drivers who were working 9 - 10 hour days now need to work 13 or 14 hours. There is extra stress for drivers taking tankers around the hazardous Oakleigh/Paparoa Road and extra wear and tear on trucks with all those extra kilometres.

Mr. Jensen said he couldn't pass these extra costs onto his customers as people are already struggling with the high cost of living and milk is a basic commodity.

The situation has improved since the north bound lane of State Highway One over the Brynderwyns has opened but having driven over this recently himself he is aware there are multiple fallen trees and slips on the hillside which might come down onto the road in the next heavy rain.

Ian Newey of Newey Transport Ltd. said the closure of the highway over the Brynderwyns is definitely a big problem for his company.

Cove Rd. at Langs Beach became impassable after torrential rain and flooding on Friday afternoon 24 February washed away the abutments to the Langs Beach Bridge leaving people living and working in that area with no route in or out.

Northland Transportation Alliance reallocated resources from other sites to repair the bridge, which was opened the following Wednesday 1 March. Maintenance and Operations Manager for the alliance Bernard Petersen said the contractors had found the soils to be more saturated than expected due to high groundwater levels and it took several extra days to excavate the saturated clay soil and backfill with rocks.

The rainstorm also caused flooding on McLean Rd in Waipu with vehicles swept off the road and drivers needing to be rescued by the Waipu Fire Brigade.

Its been so nice to have a series of days with no rain or wind -a little bit of summer at last, the world returning to normal hopefully.

The ponds on the seaward side of the Uretiti campground seem to be receding at last. There is a steep drop off to the beach and the dunes will take some time to recover, not helped by the heavy vehicles, which drive along at their base, churning up the sand.

After my morning coffee I am off to the re-scheduled Have a Go day at the Waipu Surf Lifesaving Club. this one had to be rescheduled ater it was originally planned for the Sunday Cyclone Gabrielle arived so I am not sure how it will go. I have been around a few of these events. Yesterday there were nine people trying out Croquet on a beautiful sunny morning at the Waipu club. 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Ratepayer groups call for more resilient routes into Northland

Both the Ruakaka and Waipu Residents and Ratepayer Associations are lobbying the Minister of Transport and local MP Emily Henderson to have one of the detour routes used in times when State Highway One over the Brynderwyns is out of action upgraded to state highway status and maintained by the New Zealand Transport Agency Waka Kotahi rather than the Whangarei and Kaipara District Councils.

All of the detour routes have experienced major problems during the weeks of the road closure over the Brynderwyns.

The route via Manawhai and Waipu Cove Rd. has been blocked six times by trucks which have not managed to take a tight corner on the windy road between Langs Beach and Mangawhai and then with torrential rain in the area on Friday 24 February had a bridge washout at Langs which closed the road to all traffic.

Gorge Rd has been blocked with slips and the unsealed Oakleigh/ Paparoa Rd. has suffered severe damage under its heavy load of detour traffic.

The ratepayer groups are also joining a chorus of Northland voices urging the Government to come up with a final solution to the unreliability of SH1 over the Brynderwyns.

Museum Board gives Menzshed notice to leave its building

The Waipu Museum has given the Waipu Menzshed group until May 2024 to move out of the building it occupies in the museum's historic precinct, where it has been based since its inception seven years ago.

In a press release sent to the Bream Bay News, Heather Jacobsen, Chair of the Waipu Centennial Trust Board explained, "The museum has for a number of years grappled with the problem of lack of space to store and exhibit the treasures that have been given to it, especially the bigger items relating to transport, maritime and farming. These items are currently housed at different locations around the district in a number of cases in very unsuitable conditions. The museum board accepts that it can no longer defer the need to house these treasures appropriately." The press release continues - "The museum's financial position over the past three years has been under pressure because of the disruption caused by Covid, so the Board's only option is to best utilize the buildings it already has and for which it pays the associated costs. It reluctantly therefore decided that it would give the Menzshed notice that it would take over occupancy of the old hall/lodge in the middle of next year."

The Waipu Menzshed has a membership of 34 retired men who meet each Tuesday in the old hall, to work on a variety of community projects. Some of its members were involved in organising and helping with the 2015 shift of the building from Nova Scotia Drive where it had served since 1920 as the Waipu Masonic Lodge, to

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the museum land. The building has historic significance as Waipu's first community hall, built around 1870.

Menzshed members have also carried out maintenance and restoration work on this and other buildings in the precinct as well as helping to build the infrastructure needed for the relocations. Waipu Menzshed Chairman Gordon Walker said an earlier letter from the Museum Board acknowledges that work by the group's members has saved the Museum Board in the vicinity of \$200,000.

The Menzshed has been occupying the building rent free in appreciation of all this work but is now actively looking for new premises.

Gordon said, "As the Waipu Menzshed has lost the right to occupy its present premises we desperately need to locate to a suitable site and/or building to continue to offer the much appreciated service we give to our local community. We have a membership of 34 elderly gentlemen members who are very happy to continue serving our community the way we have been able to do over the last seven years. Vilification of our ex prime minister makes me ashamed to be a New Zealander

The vilification of our ex prime minister Jacinda Ardern has made me (a 74 year old woman) for the first time in my life ashamed to be a New Zealander.

The fact that a lot of vicious vilification came from other women was especially disturbing. Much of it was based on the quite erroneous assumption that in our system of government blame for any policy rests solely on the shoulders of the chief minister. This of course is entirely untrue and all government decisions through the Covid period, as with any other, were jointly developed through consultation amongst significant government members and our leading scientists.

Many of the "vilifiers" were people who claimed that the Covid 19 virus was overly exaggerated in its significance and much of chosen government policy interfered with certain kinds of "freedom" for very little reason.

Sadly this is simply not true. Under the dismissive policies of Donald Trump the loss of life in the USA was measured some time last year at 1 million people (from a population of around 330 million.)

If we had ignored and minimised the threat to life of

this virus as occurred in the USA, the loss of life in New Zealand based on a 5 million population would have equated to approx. 16000 lives – not far off the number of New Zealand lives lost in WW1.

(The loss of life in NZ at the time restrictions were lifted sat somewhere around 1500.)

This represents abundant evidence that the policies enacted by our government (accepting that some things in retrospect perhaps could have been handled differently) basically served to save an enormous loss of life in our population.

An inherent though rarely expressed sentiment behind some of this ridiculous minimising of Covid's threat to life, rests on a tacit under valuing of the lives of fit older members of the population many of whom despite their relative vulnerability in the face of the pandemic, continue (thanks to our government's policies) to provide a crucial source of voluntary labour in this country.

Many people are deeply thankful for the role Jacinda Ardern has played during her time as Prime Minister and for all the reasons that gained her international fame as the leader of a careful and "willing to listen to experts" government. The statistics bear this out!

A few pointers from a retired couple surviving on the pension trying not to touch their savings in case help for family or serious house maintenance is needed and funerals need to be covered in a few years.

We earn \$712. each per fortnight, totalling \$37,024 pa per couple.We are fortunate not to have a mortgage. We have a small section and we have solar powered hot water but any solar repairs are very expensive.The house is 20 years old so needing ongoing maintenance .The home ownership and contents insurance equal the rates demands. We have two older cars, one has third party insurance only, the other full.insurance.

Allowing for non expensive clothing, doctors visits and medications and doing own garden maintenance to cut down on costs, we are left with \$16,600 per annum divided by two [couple] to save and help out family members. How do people manage with a mortgage as well as all of the above? It must take every dollar. If Whangarei District Council increases the rates which is likely to happen with all the destruction that has occured, there will be decreases made in food, lack of car maintenance etc,. no WOFs or registrations and consequentially fines. Please think carefully Whangarei District Council. We are sitting in the OK basket but its not much fun.

Ruakākā's new Deputy Fire Chief



Warren Marshall is Ruakākā's new Deputy Fire Chief

Warren Marshall is the new Deputy Fire Chief for the Ruakaka brigade. He succeeds Colin Turner who has retired from the role.

Warren first became involved with the New Zealand Fire Service 17 years ago when at the age of 24 he joined his local brigade on the Te Atatu Peninsula. He has been with the Ruakaka Brigade for six years.

Over those 17 years the name has changed to Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) reflecting the new expanded role fire brigades have taken on.

This summer, for example there has been more call outs to weather related events in Ruakaka than there have been fires. Fire fighters also attend medical emergencies when there is no ambulance available.

Warren is married with three daughters and his day job is with the Marsden Maritime Holdings haulage team, transporting boats between the Marsden Cove Marina and the hardstand facility nearby. He said the Ruakaka Volunteer Fire Brigade is dependent on and grateful to the local employers who allow brigade members to leave work to attend emergency call outs.

It's a busy life but Warren said "it's a good mix" and he enjoys helping his community. He said, if it wasn't for the volunteer brigades in Waipu and Ruakaka in emergency situations "help would be a long way away."

He sees his new role as making sure the brigade's fire fighters are well supported and can function effectively. "The brigade has a strong team spirit. We all have one another's backs. It's a fairly young group of fire fighters. Many of us have young families so the brigade is very family orientated. We all get together for pot luck dinners once a month."

The volunteers all put in long hours. As well as attending call outs, there is Monday night training, the occasional weekend training course and community engagement attending fairs and markets with the brigade's bouncy castle and toy fire truck.

The strong spirit of comeraderie. Making sure everyone involved is appreciated and supported is part of Warren's new role.

If I didn't enjoy it I wouldn't be here.

Celebrating new seal on Glenmohr Rd.

Liz Perales is ready to celebrate. She began campaigning to get a kilometre of seal on Glenmohr Rd. back in 2014 and earlier this month just weeks before the cyclone hit the job was completed.

Liz has a yellow ribbon ready for an official opening and is inviting local residents, members of Parliament Dr. Emily Henderson and Dr. Shane Reti, Bream Bay ward Councillor Ken Couper, former BB Ward Councillor Shelley Deeming, and everyone else who helped to achieve the roading upgrade.

Along with fellow campaigner Linda Glibbery she collected 620 signatures on a petition, which they presented at a Whangarei District Council meeting. They gathered testimony from the likes of former Waipu Fire Chief and tow truck operator Trevor Vaile who said he had lost count of the times he had had to pull vehicles out of the roadside drains or from over the steep banks. They also presented evidence about the harmful effects of dust generated from the gravel road on people's health. One family could not have their daughter home for the weekend because the dust exacerbated her asthma. And they made the argument that Glenmohr Rd is used as a detour when there is an accident on State Highway One between Waipu and the Brynderwyns.

Once the work began to show her appreciation to the road workers Liz baked muffins and Christmas tarts for their morning tea.

Each homeowner with a driveway onto the section of newly sealed road paid \$5800 towards the upgrade. "It just had to be done", said Liz.

"Its not a problem created by anybody but Mother Nature and its no use blaming anybody. We all have to be a bit patient. It's no use bitching about the situation. I am a person who just concentrates on controlling what I can. I can't fix the road. I don't have the skills. But it's definitely a challenge. "

Newey trucks travelling via Dargaville to bring logs to Marsden Point are travelling extra 117 kilometres per trip.

"We are travelling further to achieve less. Ultimately it's our customers who will have to pay."

The railway is out of action with a massive slip on the line at Tahekeroa between Helensville and Wellsford, which will take months to clear.

"We need an alternative highway route around the Brynderwyns. That road is just not up to the job. If we get more heavy rain it will be closed again. This needs to be our priority. A four lane highway to Whangārei is important but what use would this be if we can't get over the Brynderwyns."

Bruce Larsen of the Northpine timber mill said it's been difficult for some of his employees who live in Mangawhai or Maugaturoto.

"If you start work at 6am then its pretty hard to have to travel all that extra distance. You have to get up pretty early."

Logs have continued to come into the mill and some

timber has been able to go north but it has been almost impossible to send timber down south.

"We have had to work out agreements with trucking companies so we share the extra cartage costs. The whole of the Northland Region is very vulnerable to transport disruption

David Finchett, Commercial manager of Northport said has been in contact with Waka Kotahi, the New Zealand Transport Agency urging it to reinstate the highway over the Brynderwyns as soon as possible and to build in resilience.

"It's a tough situation and many of our customers are finding it very difficult."

Some are looking at coastal shipping or shipping directly from Northport as a way around the blocked highway problem and Northport is doing what it can to facilitate this. There is already a regular coastal shipping service from Northport to Tauranga, Nelson and Lyttelton.

Some forestry companies are choosing to delay harvesting. Trees blown over in the cyclone can be left on the ground for a few weeks before salvaging but this job cannot wait too long.

Mr. Finchett said no big container ship has come into Northport with hundreds of containers needing to be transported to Auckland in the past few weeks.

Start of year school rolls for 2023

On Thursday 2 March 2023, Bream Bay College had 572 students enrolled, an increase of 12 on its start of year roll in 2022.

Waipu Primary School has had a sizeable jump in roll numbers, starting the year at 240, 20 more children than were enrolled at the school at the beginning of the 2022 school year.

One Tree Point Primary had 182 students enrolled last Thursday, a drop of 24 on its 2022 start of year

roll. This is mostly due to a particularly large cohort of children in the 2022 Year 6 classes who have gone on to secondary school.

Ruakākā Primary had 315 children enrolled as of last Thursday, just two more than were enrolled at the start of 2022.

In total 1309 children and young people were enrolled at Bream Bay's four schools last week, an increase of just ten on the 2022 total of 1299.



Will our rates be going up as a result of cyclone damage ?

John Horrocks of the Waipu Riding Residents and Ratepayers Association put this question to Deputy Mayor Phil Halse at the association's February meeting. Councillor Halse replied, "We will be doing a lot of work at Council over the next few weeks on our annual and long term plan." He said the district had got through Cyclone Gabrielle reasonably well because of previous investment by the Whangārei District Council in its infrastructure. "Do we want to borrow or put the rates up?"

Waipu Primary children the first to try the new Waipu Caves Farm Park

Two classes from Waipu Primary were the first to visit the Waipu Caves Farm Park, which is now open for cave tours.

Ian and Cindy Fox have been developing their 120-hectare property in limestone country on Waipu Caves Rd. into an adventure park, which will eventually offer camping, bush walking, swimming in a river hole, rock climbing and caving.


The cave tours side of the business is now up and running, while some of the other aspects of the farm park still await resource consent.

On Wednesday of last week 28 February the children were taken in groups into what Ian and Cindy have named the Cathedral Chamber of their Milky Way Cave. With their torches turned off the children were able to see thousands of glowworms decorating the walls and on the dripping stalactites. Ian explained that the population of glowworms in this cave had been washed away by floods. He transferred around 150 worms from nearby caves and these had reproduced so that now there are thousands. A narrow opening at the inner end of the cathedral chamber has been widened to prevent flooding during heavy rainfall. Steps and railings have been installed to enable easier access into the chamber.

As well as the caving experience children swam in a hole in the river and went on a bushwalk.


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Over 40 nominations for Bream Bay Sports Awards



Rod McKay, a fifth generation Waipu farmer, and prominent member of the Waipu Community was farewelled in the Waipu Celtic Barn on Saturday afternoon 25th February.

The Reverend Warner Wilder, a former Chaplain at Kings College, led the service. He said Rod McKay "was an immensely decent and wise man."

"He was successful in every sense of the word. He was always very humble and his humility served to enhance his mana."

After spending his primary school years at Waipu School, Rod attended Kings College in Auckland. He excelled at sport and was a member of both the school's premier rugby and cricket teams. He then went on to Massey University where he gained a bachelor's degree in Agricultural Science and played representative rugby for Manawatu.

He returned to Waipu to take over the running of the family farm in Rosyth Road from his father Sir Donald McKay, who was a cabinet minister at the time. In 1966 he married Joy Hanna.

Rod and Joy's good friend Lachie McLean said, "They had total support from each other with their zest, enthusiasm and tireless devotion to everything they did together."

Rod continued his involvement in sport, playing in the Waipu Premier Rugby team and the Senior Springfield Cricket team as well as playing tennis and squash. He was the Patron of the Waipu Golf Club excelling in this sport also and in his earlier years spent many hours on his tractor helping to shape the course.

In addition to his many sporting interests he had extensive involvement in the Waipu Community. He served as President of the Waipu Lions Club, as a member of the Marsden St Johns Ambulance Association, Chairman of the Waipu Primary School Committee, the Otamatea Veterinary Club, the Waipu Museum and the Waipu 150 Trust, overseeing the 150-year celebrations to mark the arrival of Nova Scotian settlers in Waipu.

Lachie McLean said he had the pleasure of working under Rod's leadership at the Waipu Museum and stated, "We took on various projects including the planting of the main street, securing the Heritage Precinct and the Old Manse, plus staging various events including the two Grand Pageants which played to crowds of 12,000 people over three nights."

Patsy Montgomery who was Musuem Manager at the time Rod was Board Chairman said, "At the beginning of his tenure we decided to revitalise the museum and turn it into a modern "Story telling" Museum. I can only describe his personality with superlatives. He was kind, extraordinarily astute, and, in the

words of another era "one of nature's gentlemen". Rod was a natural and discreet leader.

"Most notable was his careful decision making. He would weigh up the pros and cons around a choice to be made and you would always find it difficult to disagree with his conclusions. He liked humour and if you told him something slightly hard to believe his favourite expression was, 'You're joking!"

Ali McKay said his father was "immensely proud of his Nova Scotian heritage".

Rod was also active on the Northland wide stage. He was a member of the Northland Harbour Board from 1977 - 1989 and was Chairman from 1986 to 1989 as well as a member of the New Zealand Ports Association. He was elected to the Northland Regional Council (NRC) in 1989 and was Deputy Chairman of the NRC from 1989 to 1998. He also held a number of governance roles including being a director of AFFCO and on the Board of Governors of Kings College.

His long time friend and collaborator Peter Couper, at the funeral service said, "Thank you for the contribution you made to the community. You gave unselfish service."

He was a successful farmer and developed his ancestors' farm to its full potential. He was always interested in new ideas and tried many business ventures, of which in the words of his friend John Parker, "some were more successful than others."

Despite these many commitments and interests he spent time with his children and grandchildren. His sons remember an idyllic Waipu childhood with summer holidays spent at Langs Beach, enjoying the company of many friends young and old. With his wife Joy and a select group of friends Rod enjoyed many trips and adventures overseas.

Rod is survived by Joy, his three sons John, Alasdair and Cameron and ten grandchildren.

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
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


