\$2.5 million for new Ruakaka Recreation Centre but \$100,000 urgently needed for fire safety upgrade

The Ruakaka Recreation Centre committee received some exciting news at the end of last week when it was told \$2.5 million for a proposed new multi purpose building would be coming its way from a central government post COVID infrastructure fund.

The new centre has been estimated to cost \$7.5 million. Christine Thirling said by covering a third of this amount the government grant would enable the committee to seek further funding from the Lotteries Board and Foundation North. She had already made contact with these organisations and established that the next applications round will be in early in 2021.

A feasibility study for the proposed new building was carried out in the later half of 2017 with a \$400,000 grant from the Lottery Board. The plan is for a new single storey building with twice as much floor space as the present Recreation Centre to be located behind the Ruakaka Skatepark. It will be designed to cater for a range of indoor sports such as badminton and basketball with portable stages and seating enabling it to accommodate concerts and other performing arts and cultural events.

This good news, however, doesn't solve an immediate problem the Recreation Centre Committee is facing, after a fire safety report found the current building

Exhibition brings back memories

I went to see the Takahiwai school exhibition at the Whangarei Museum in Maunu last week and the photographs and text has got me reminiscing about my own primary school education at a little country school, not too different from the school at Takahiwai. We had those Janet and John readers with those immaculate children in white socks, polished shoes and buttoned up overcoats who seemed so alien to the wild bunch we were walking home along the dusty roads in shorts and bare feet.

The big brass school bell also brought back memories but more than anything a comment by Grant Pirihi how most of the children at the school were related and how the children from the Takahiwai Maori families, the children of several Dalmation families and the teacher's children all got on well together.

I can remember those crates with bottles of school milk and how in the wintertime some of the mothers would come in and empty them all into a big pot to heat up with some milo then serve it up to us in mugs.

Although we didn't have all the resources schools have today I think we were pretty lucky and most of the time

we were well taught.

It was interesting to learn how the people of Takahiwai had repeatedly asked the New Zealand Government to set up a school in their settlement and how well the school was supported once it was established in 1901. The families of Takahiwai are renown for having many highly educated, successful people in their ranks and I wonder if this stems from the support parents and grandparents in those early days gave to their school. Teachers are important and after reading through the memoirs of Joan Phillips who taught at Takahiwai from 1961 to 1964, I think she was one of the best, but to a large degree it is the belief in the value of education shown by the significant adults in a child's life that determines how successful that child will be at school.

So it was wonderful to see how well supported the children at Ruakaka Primary were when they gave junior and senior kapahaka performances last Thursday followed by a hangi to mark Matariki. There were many proud parents and grandparents in the audience and the children shone.

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Reprieve for Princes Rd. pohutukawa

The plan for a rockwall along the water front at Princes Rd. have been reworked to allow for the six pohutukawa trees along the foreshore to stay put.

An original plan would have seen most of them removed to make way for the wall but after forceful objections by some local people and a petition signed by over 500 the plan has been altered.

In a letter to Simon Ellison, one of the petitioner organisers, Whangarei Mayor.

The Mayor said. The consent proposing to remove the trees was withdrawn to “meet community expectation.”

She said another change to the design included additional and wider public access to the water. Lack of public access over a high rock wall was another issue raised by the petitioners.

Three phoenix palms, which are classed as pest species, will be removed and two more pohutukawa will be planted. Drainage will be replaced and the grassed area will be leveled.

Sheryl Mai said the six pohutukawa trees would be given the best chance of survival at the same time allowing for the protection of the public road and reserve. She thanked Mr. Ellison and all the petition signatories for their input into “this changed and improved outcome.”

Mr. Ellison, however, said while he is pleased the pohutukawa will stay he still had concerns about the rock wall and thinks that its construction is likely to damage the trees roots leading to their eventual demise. He didn't think the replacement of any pohutukawa that might be lost was as good an outcome as leaving the trees undisturbed would have been and is yet to be convinced that the additional and wider accessways would be sufficient to give adequate access over the rock wall.

Formal opening of new Croquet Club House

The formal opening of the new Waipu Croquet Club clubhouse will be held on 24 July, with Mayor of Whangarei, Sheryl Mai invited to attend.

The club which now boasts a membership of over 50 players and hosts four regional tournaments each year has been making do with a small year old building with a dirt floor, and no running water or electricity.

The old clubhouse also had no toilets with visitors and club members alike having to use the toilets attached to the back packers accommodation next door.

Wilson dam at 73 percent last week

The rain over the weekend of 27 and 28 June gave a good boost to the level of the Wilson Dam, which last Thursday 2 July was 73% full. This is still short of its usual level for this time of the year, which is 92%.

Water restrictions for people on town supply in the Whangarei District have been lifted although the Whangarei District Council is still urging people not to be wasteful and to save water where they can.

needs between \$75,000 and \$100,000 spent on upgrades to meet fire safety standards. Mrs. Thirling said the centre "simply does not have this kind of money" but if the upgrades cannot be carried out fairly soon it may have to close its doors. She said a wide variety of groups and many hundreds of people use the centre each week. The youngest users are babies and toddlers who come with their mums to a pre-school music and play session, while some of the oldest attend a weekly exercise class designed to help retain good balance.

She said, "It would be really terrible if we had to close the centre down because we can't afford this fire safety upgrade." She has set up a give-a-little page entitled: Save the Ruakaka Recreation Centre and is thinking hard about further fund raising options. She said such is the demand for space by exercise groups, sports clubs and other community groups the current building would still be put to good use when the new centre is completed.

Let's have a constructive discussion

As a member and researcher for the Landowners and Residents Council of Takahiwai (LRCT) I would like to clarify some points raised in your article "Protest signs discourage potential buyers" from 25 June 2020. We are a council that represents a significant cross-section of the Takahiwai community – Maori and Non-Maori people who have chosen to live here because it is a community shaped by a no-exit road in a rural area with limited traffic. We have polled our community to assess the concerns of the people. The people have real concerns about the prospect and consequence of development. We share a common goal of preserving our way of life.

Importantly, our Council is reacting to the apparent marketing of the Fraser's land to buyers that are more likely to change the land's use. Your article sets out some of our concerns in regard to the marketing that points to the development of the land. We are also concerned about the statement that the Fraser property "... represents a gilt-edged waterfront opportunity for the savvy investor". (refer: <https://www.bayleys.co.nz/1050431>). We ask is this really language designed to target a farmer?

The Takahiwai community has lived side-by-side with the Frasers for a long time. We don't wish to harm them or their interests, which seems to be the insin-

uation in the article. But there are consequences for the Takahiwai community from the sale of the land to people who would change the land's use, particularly if the new use is a housing sub-division.

Therefore, the LRCT is not suggesting that the Frasers are building a through-road. We are suggesting that this is a potential consequence should the land be sold to a developer and this is now a greater risk of happening because of the land's marketing.

In fact, should the land be sold to a developer, the touted direct-access to One Tree Point through Takahiwai Rd is a much more pressing issue for our community. We could then see an increase in the quantity and quality of traffic using Takahiwai Rd to access the land – initially for construction purposes and then as a result of the increase in residents on the land.

We reiterate our call for the Fraser family to meet and discuss this issue with the LRCT and the wider Takahiwai community. We are a concerned community not a bunch of rabble-rousers. Let's have a constructive discussion that is respectful of each other's positions to try and reach an equitable solution.

I joined the hall committee with the goal of reopening my late friend, Rosie Prickett's inspirational idea of transforming the meeting rooms currently used by

the Bric a Brac into a community art and small group meeting space. Being a health practitioner, I was excited about the potential for connection, creativity and learning that such a facility would provide for all sectors of our growing community. My proposal was rejected on the grounds that the rooms belonged to the Bric a Brac on account of the fact it had been there for so many years.

I am now standing down from the committee, which I feel is not acting in the best interests of our community and, rather than welcoming new members, is controlling who joins the association and committee.

In the spirit of transparency it is important the people of Waipu know that although you are eligible to join the Association of our Public Hall and Library if you are over 18 years old and live in the area, you need to be pre approved by the committee. Emma returns to the museum

Emma the doll has returned to the Waipu Museum after being restored at a specialist dolls' hospital in Auckland. She was due to go back on display yesterday, Wednesday 8 July

The doll was stolen from the museum last April but then returned to the museum's letterbox a few days later unceremoniously wrapped in a bread bag tied up with duct tape with some of her hair missing and her arms broken. The doll dates from the 17th century and came to Waipu with three-year-old Emma McKay, who travelled on board the Highland Lass, which set sail from Nova Scotia in 1852. The story of Emma's theft and subsequent return caught media attention and was reported nationally as well as in the UK and Australia.

Security cameras have now been installed at the museum.

Raising Breast Cancer Awareness in Bream Bay

Hollie McIntyre of Ruakaka is keen to raise awareness about breast cancer in young woman and hopes to spread the word by hosting a Pink Ribbon Breakfast.

Hollie, 30, is well known in the Bream Bay community through her work at Orrs Pharmacy Ruakaka. Last year she was diagnosed with stage four triple negative breast cancer. When she first discovered a lump in her breast in May 2019, she was told it was a benign cyst, but five months later the lump had grown and a second check revealed she had terminal breast cancer and was given only six months left to live.

Since then Hollie has undergone a range of treatments to treat tumours which have spread to her chest, spine, and ovary. Hollie now urgently wants to help other young women understand breast cancer and how it is diagnosed. "I wish I had pushed for a second opinion when I first discovered my lump and wasn't so relaxed about it. It possibly could have saved my life if I'd taken that extra step to investigate further, but there were so many things I didn't know about. I want to share my journey so that hopefully this doesn't happen to anyone else." She signed up for Pink Ribbon Breakfast to help raise awareness of metastatic breast cancers in young people, says Hollie. "And also keep myself busy and keep my mind off treatment. "I've set myself a target of raising \$2500 for the Breast Cancer Foundation. A few friends are helping me to organise things because I'll be in Auckland for my radiation." While Hollie and her friends are still working on the

details of her Pink Ribbon breakfast fundraiser, Land & Sea Café, Bar and Eatery have a Pink Ribbon High Tea planned for 17 July. Sue Robinson, co-owner of the restaurant with husband Trevor Hanson, says this is the third year running they have held a Pink Ribbon event.

"It's normally in May, but of course this year because of lockdown it couldn't happen. So when we got to Level 3 we held a big raffle and raised \$500." That money will go with the proceeds from the High Tea. Tickets are \$40 each and numbers limited to 64, with prizes for the best dressed guests. Just 17 tickets were left at the time of writing.

"The events are a way of giving back to our community and helping an organisation that doesn't get a lot of funding," Robinson says. "And it's always a lot of fun." Last year Land & Sea ran three "Fusion Fridays" with all proceeds going to Hollie McIntyre to help her with treatment costs.

Man knocked unconscious in assault at Ruakaka Tavern

A 60-year-old man was knocked unconscious when he was attacked at the Ruakaka Tavern at around midnight on Sunday 21 June. Head Hunters gang member Herbie Rata, aged 46 of Takahiwai has been arrested and charged with assault with intent to injure. He has been released on bail to next appear in the Whangarei District Court on Monday 13 July.

Service station burgled twice over three nights

A burglar (or burglars) broke into the Oakleigh Service Station twice in the space of three days with the intention of stealing cigarettes. The first attempt was made on Wednesday night 1 July when a door was forced open. On this occasion the burglar was unable to break into a secure cabinet the cigarettes were stored in and left with just a small number of cigars. Two nights later, in the early hours of Saturday 4 July a burglar once more broke into the store using a crowbar to force a back door open. This time he (or she) managed to find a store of cigarettes in an office. The burglary was filmed on the store's security camera but the thief had his (or her) face well covered.

Police have warned local service stations about the burglaries and are assisting them to beef up their security arrangement.

More than three times over the limit

A 50-year-old Hawkes Bay woman is due to appear in the Whangarei District Court on 22 July after she failed a breath alcohol test when stopped by Police on State Highway One at Mata at 5pm on 23 June. The woman returned a breath alcohol reading of 812 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath. The legal limit is 250 micrograms.

Burglary of Waipu home in broad daylight

A burglar entered a house in Waipu in broad daylight on Monday 22 June and stole a sum of cash. The house occupant was home at the time but was unaware of the thief's presence. A forensic examination carried out at the property has given Police a strong line of inquiry.

Three minor crashes

There were three minor crashes in the Bream Bay Police district over the fortnight Saturday 20 June to Saturday 11 July. All involved vehicles running of the side of the road. One crash occurred on the Brynderwyns, one on Waipu Caves Rd. and one in McCathie Rd. in Ruakaka. No injuries were recorded at any of these accidents.

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Want juicy, succulent berry fruit this summer? Now's the time to plant them!

Strawberry plants are in stock now at Waipu Hammer Hardware. Remove flowers for the next couple of months to encourage strong plant growth, and stop berries growing before the plant can support them. Plant on a small raised mound as strawberries hate having constantly wet root systems. Mulch with pea straw to keep fruit clean.

Raspberries, boysenberries, and blackberries should be planted now so they can get established before spring flowering. Don't like the thorns? Don't worry! Try Incredible Edibles Thornless Jewel. Birds a problem? Try Incredible Edibles Raspberry Ivory, I never have to cover it as the birds don't steal the peach coloured fruit.

A great variety of blueberries to suit any garden are in store now. Blueberries love acidic soil, so good news if you live in the Ruakaka or One Tree Point area! If you don't have acidic soil, add peat or compost generously when planting, but don't use lime-based fertilizer!

Prune grape vines, peach, and nectarine trees. Spray with Copper and oil as a winter clean up. You can't cure brown rot in the summer, so now is the time to spray to prevent fungal disease that will spoil your harvest.

Don't forget to water your new plantings! Rainfall is still not consistent, and frosts and wind can deplete moisture from plants. Keep watering, so they can develop strong root systems, which will save you watering so much in the summer.

Cold showers made for a miserable start at Bream Bay College's cross-country races last week – the sun showed up as the morning progressed but it was still muddy underfoot for the runners.

Bream Bay's cross country is normally held in May but was this year delayed by the Covid-19 pandemic, with schools closed for four weeks and sports activities curtailed through Alert Levels two and three.

Competitor numbers were 144, down on last year's 153 runners but up on 2018's 119 participants. Younger students ran a 4km course while the seniors ran 6km.

The winning house was Sutherland with 109 points.



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Combining forces to boost player numbers

Two Bream Bay coaches from different sporting codes have hit on a novel way to boost player numbers.

Takahiwai Rugby League Club under-13 coach Ed Wilson and Waipu Rugby Club under-13 coach Ali McKay were both struggling with low player numbers and decided a possible solution could be to get boys playing both codes.

Last week they brought their teams together in Waipu for a game of two different halves – one league, one rugby.

Both coaches agree helping each other out is the best way forward. “We are two local clubs, these boys all go to school together,” says McKay. “Our idea was that if they enjoy rugby or league, they could play both.”

Last season the two club’s premier teams played a similar match against each other early in the season. “Both teams ended up going along to watch and support each other’s games during the season,” says McKay. “And both ended up winning their finals.”

Wilson played in that premier match (he has since retired from playing). “It drew our communities together,” he says. “This was a recreation of that for the juniors, and I hope the result will be the same.”

On the juniors’ game night, it was all about participation, not the score. “In the end I think rugby won by one or two tries,” says McKay. “But we weren’t focusing on the score too much, it was more about the fun.”

“It was fantastic, most of our guys watch a bit of league, so they were excited to have a go,” he says. “I was reffing the second half and went over time. I didn’t want to stop but the kids had to get home to bed, they had school in the morning.” Wilson says it has been a real challenge, Northland-wide, keeping youngsters interested in sport. He has coached some of his players for the last six years since nursery grade and watched player numbers decline as they lose interest in playing or move out of the area.

“It’s a shame, but I know across the board it’s been difficult for everyone to get players, you have to keep fishing for new talent.”

McKay agrees, saying while kids seem to be playing more sports and numbers in the under 12s are high, fewer older players are turning out. “By the time they are teenagers it is only the ones who are really keen who are left. Kids have more options now and are not all playing traditional sports.” Wilson was thrilled that last week’s game was already paying dividends: “Two or three rugby players came straight up to me and said they’ll come to training – I was pretty rapt with that. It makes life easier to have a few extra.” And McKay says some league players approached him about joining rugby.

Both coaches agree helping each other out is the best way forward. “We are two local clubs, these boys all go to school together,” says McKay. “Our idea was that if they enjoy rugby or league, they could play both.”

McKay and Wilson are kicking around another idea to bring the clubs closer – a festival day where all the clubs’ teams play each other, from nursery grade to premier men.

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
